MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR



This Annual Report 2006 – 2007 outlines Council's activities and services for the year. The report also contains information regarding achievements and Council priorities for 2007 -2008.

I am pleased to acknowledge the achievement of Youth Services being in the top five finalists for the Local Government Youth Week Award 2007 for Best Small Council Youth Week Program and Best Local Youth Week Program. Youth services are an integral operation of community services and provides on going structured programs for the youth within the Shire.

The HACC Centre in Lightning Ridge was completed in September 2007. This centre will house service providers who coordinate and provide specific services to older residents and people with disabilities within the community. A funding application of \$0.9million for a Dementia Day Care Centre is currently submitted with the Department of Ageing, Disability and Home Care and will provide a further extension to the building if the application is successful.

Burren Junction residents witnessed the first stage of the upgrade of Burren Junction Bore Baths and the ongoing increase in visitors to the area to experience first hand an artesian bore bath. The bath has decreased in size to preserve water consumption but its attraction and appeal to the public has been maintained.

Council was pleased to receive the Auslink funding of \$5.6 million to enable the Carinda to Walgett Road to be completed and for capital works on the Burren Junction to Collarenebri Road. This funding to be spent in the next three years will see Councils continual commitment to maintaining and upgrading road infrastructure. Council has also been notified of \$2.1 million to reconstruct and seal 25 kms of the road between Collarenebri and Mungindi.

Council's financial position has remained sound with a net operating result of \$6.5 million for the year ended 30 June 2007. A major reduction in the outstanding rates and charges percentage to 10.57% has been the result of Council's ongoing debt recovery processes.

I would also like to take this opportunity to acknowledge members of the community who have taken the time to provide input to Council and to those who have donated their time towards shire wide activities.

MESSAGE FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER



The 2006-2007 financial year has been a very productive period with Council continuing to provide services and facilities which meet the needs of the entire Shire.

Council has finalized the financial year with a sound operating result for the year and pleasing results in the Statement of Performance measures especially with Rates and Annual Charges Outstanding Percentage down from 15.94% to 10.57%.

It was pleasing to have an Aboriginal Liaison Officer and Economic Development Officer added to the Organisational Structure with these positions paramount for the development of the Shire in both the short and long term. The School to Work Program has also been a successful program with four students from Walgett Community College attending work experience at the Council one afternoon a week.

Council has commenced work on the installation of water meters throughout the Shire to enable Council to convert to a user pay system. It is anticipated that this system will be in place by June 2008.

Council has seen a number of other projects completed throughout the year including the Lightning Ridge HACC Centre, Burren Junction Bore Baths upgrade, extension of the seal on the Walgett to Carinda Road and the extension of the Burren Junction to Collarenebri Road, south of Rowena.

Council looks forward to a productive upcoming year with an extensive capital works budget in excess of \$11 million dollars.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the community, agencies and business that have interacted with Council and assisted in the achievements contained in this report. I would also like to extend an appreciation to the hard work and dedication of the staff employed by Walgett Shire Council.

WALGETT SHIRE SNAPSHOT

WALGETT IN BRIEF

Walgett Shire Local Government Area is located in the far north west of New South Wales and covers an area of 22,007 square kilometres.

Walgett Shire borders with Queensland to the North, Moree Plains and Narrabri to the East, Coonamble to the South and Brewarrina to the West.

The Shire is located on Gamilaraay country in the southern and eastern sector and to the north is on Yuwaalaraay country. Acknowledgement of the traditional land is displayed on signs along main roads entering into the Walgett Shire.

The Shire is geographically on the productive black-soil plains of New South Wales, part of which is in the Central Division and part in the Western Division. In the north and North West of the Shire is opal bearing country.

Walgett Shire comprises of thirteen towns / villages / hamlets spread throughout the Shire. There are seven villages and two rural divisions and the preserved opal fields of Grawin, Glengarry and Sheepyard. Each community has its own identity, through cultural expression, cultural diversity and economic structures and development.

POPULATION

The population of the Shire is very difficult to collate due to residents who choose not to complete the census. There are also a number of people who reside in the mining areas for different periods of the year but whose main residence is in other Local Government Areas.

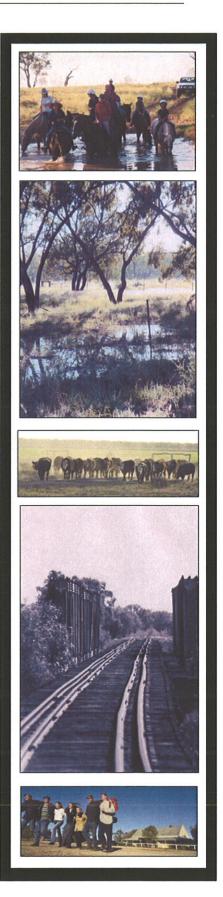
According to the last Census completed in 2006, the population of Walgett Shire according to Postal Areas is 7503, with 29.37% being of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander decent.

GETTING HERE

Walgett is located in Northern NSW and has an intersection of 3 major Highways, the Gwydir, Kamilaroi and the Castlereagh. These highways provide a major route for transportation from Melbourne to Brisbane and Adelaide to Brisbane, as well a route for local carriers to and from Dubbo, Coonamble, Narrabri, and Moree.

There are two main airports in the Walgett Shire and these are located at Walgett and Lightning Ridge, which is serviced by AirLink, with flights, scheduled 6 days per week. As well as these airports, Council have Aircraft Landing Areas at Burren Junction, Collarenebri and Carinda.

Lightning Ridge and Walgett are also serviced by CountryLink, who offer an extensive network of rail and coach services from Dubbo 7 days per week. This service continues from Dubbo and includes an XPT rail service to Sydney.

HEALTHY LIVING

Walgett Shire provides its residents with three main health services in Collarenebri, Lightning Ridge and Walgett, as well as numerous general practitioners.

Other than medical services, Walgett Shire also offer Domiciliary and Pallative Care, Visiting Medical Specialists, Home Care, Meals on Wheels, Aged Hostels, ACAT Nurse and community transport

TOURISM

Walgett Shire attracts approximately 80,000 visitors per year with a majority of those visiting the town of Lightning Ridge. Walgett Shire offers a range of activities to see and do while visiting the area, such as fishing, hot artesian bore baths, and various opal tours as well as range of sports activities.

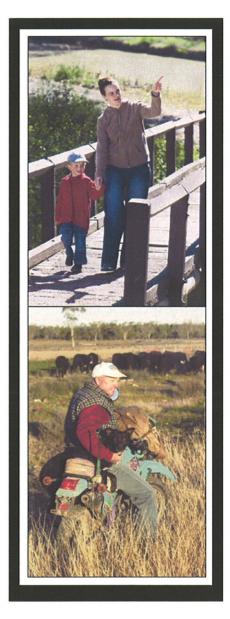
The major Tourism drawcard for Walgett Shire is Lightning Ridge home of the Opal, Australia's National Gemstone, with many visitors flocking to the region to try their luck at fossicking for a rare and precious stone.

Walgett Shire has accommodation to suit the needs of most travelling visitors, ranging from Hotels, Motels, Caravan Parks and even Hostels catering for the backpacker market.

EDUCATION

Walgett Shire offers a range of education facilities throughout the entire region; these include Primary, Secondary and Tertiary education, as well as Early Childhood facilities such as preschools, and child care centres.

Walgett Shire also offers a Distance Education to families in rural and remote areas. Walgett Shire distance education is operated by the Bourke School of the Air.

FINANCIAL REPORTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2007

RATES AND CHARGES WRITTEN OFF DURING THE YEAR

Council has continued its intensive rates recovery processes. As a result, the Rates & Charges Outstanding percentage has declined from 15.97% in 2005, 15.94% in 2006 to 10.57% in 2007. The total amount of rates and charges written off for the period from 1 July 2006 to 30 June 2007 totaled \$41,594.78. The total legal fees written off for this period were \$2,995.52 and the total interest written off was \$14,909.56.

SUMMARY OF LEGAL PROCEEDINGS

Following the termination of contracts of two former employees, Council incurred direct legal costs of \$46,325.38 (\$31,132.88 in 2007) in relation to these proceedings in the Industrial Relations Commission of New South Wales seeking amendment under section 106 of the Industrial Relations Act. These matters were finalised on 29 November 2005 and 1 August 2006 with Council settling on two payouts being \$28,000 and \$21,000 respectively.

MAYORAL AND COUNCILLOR FEES

All civic offices of Walgett Shire Council were declared vacant on 30 June 2004. Mr Mr Hugh Percy was appointed as Administrator. Mr Percy was replaced with Mr Vic Smith on 30 June 2006. The appointment of Mr. Vic Smith is for a period of two years, ceasing immediately before the first meeting of the Council held after the fresh election on 27 September 2007. The Administrator expenses for the period ended 30 June 2007 totalled \$65,432.70. The total cost of telephone calls made by the Administrator totaled \$23.50 and the estimated provision of dedicated office equipment is \$4,000.

COUNCIL'S POLICY ON PROVISION OF FACILITIES — COUNCILLOR EXPENSES

The Payment of Expenses and Provision of Facilities for Council Policy was presented to Council on 16 October 2007 to be placed on public exhibition for a period of 28 days with the policy to be presented to Council for adoption on 11 December 2007.

OVERSEAS TRAVEL

No overseas travel was undertaken by the Administrator, General Manager, Council staff or other persons representing Council.

SENIOR STAFF

In accordance with the provision of Section 332 of the Local Government Act 1993, the position of General Manager is the only position at Council to be determined to be a senior staff position.

The total salary package applicable for this position including the salary component, employer's contribution to superannuation, motor vehicle, subsidised rent and allowances totals \$120,007.50. The total non-cash benefit for the use of a motor vehicle was \$6,185.61 with total fringe benefits tax for non cash benefits of \$2,876.31.

SERVICES AND ACCESS FOR PEOPLE WITH DIVERSE CULTURAL AND LINGUISTIC BACKGROUNDS

Council recognises that people from culturally diverse backgrounds may face issues in relation to access to services and participating in the wider community. Council is committed to providing equitable and accessible services, facilities and activities for the whole community. The Local Ethnic Affairs Priorities Statement (LEAPS) and Action Plan 2006-2009 was adopted within the Management Plan 2006-2007 on 22 June 2006. This Plan is due to be reviewed by December 2007.

Council staff underwent Cultural Awareness Training in May 2007. This training included procedures within Council to provide interpreter services. Council has also displayed a language board to assist in identifying certain languages.

In 2006-2007, five (5) people became Australian citizens at Council ceremonies.

SERVICES AND PROGRAMS FOR CHILDREN

Council offers equal opportunity to all young people within our shire, striving to achieve positive outcomes for the benefit of all youth in the Shire.

Council directly operates the Family Day Care Scheme, youth services and vacation care. It also provides recreation and sporting facilities such as sporting fields, swimming pools and parks and provides child related library programs.

Council provided an interest free loan of \$350,000 to Walgett Pre School Long Day Care Centre which was repaid on 17 May 2007. This centre is now fully operational and has assisted in alleviating issues associated with a lack of child care facilities in the area.

ACCESS AND EQUITY NEEDS

Council has an obligation to all residents to ensure that access and equity activities meet residents' needs. Council meets these needs by:

- Consulting and communicating decisions effectively through Councils website, press releases and information flow to Precinct Committees and Community Working Parties.
- Opportunities are provided to the public to address agenda items at every meeting.
- Strengthening and maintaining the involvement in the delivery of services to the community through transparent process of networking and partnerships.
- Consultation with shire residents and other local organisations when adopting formal policies and publishing newly amended or approved policies on Council's website within thirty days of adoption by Council.
- On going audit and assessment of Council facilities.

PRIVATE WORKS

There were no private works carried out by Council in 2006 – 2007.

GRANTS AND CONTRIBUTIONS

Council contributed a total of \$75,809.45 to 52 organizations under Section 356 of the Local Government Act 1993.

STATEMENT OF HUMAN RESOURCES ACTIVITIES

RECRUITMENT

During the 2006/2007 financial year Council's recruitment function has been working towards filling vacancies and reducing Council's staff turnover rate.

Recruitment activity for the 2006-2007 involved 47 new staff commencing employment with Walgett Shire Council.

The turnover rate for the period 2006-2007 was 24.82%. Whilst this rate is unacceptably high, Council has implemented flexible working conditions, corporate uniform, salary packaging, subsidised housing rental and additional training in an attempt to attract, retain and develop suitable staff.

SCHOOL TO WORK PROGRAM

Walgett Shire Council has implemented a School to Work program in partnership with Walgett Community College and the Walgett/Collarenebri Community Facilitator for students at Walgett Community College.

Five (5) students started work experience at Walgett Shire Council on 6th May 2007. These students will continue the program until the end of Term 4. The program will be implemented annually and it is anticipated that it will begin in Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri in 2008.

This program has been introduced to assist students in choosing a career path within Local Government. Students have been assigned to a 'buddy' to assist them whilst at work and are offered training and development to improve their skills.

WORK FOR THE DOLE PROJECTS

Walgett Shire Council has undertaken a number of Work for the Dole projects to assist unemployed people to re-enter into the workforce, develop their skills and understand good work ethics.

These projects have provided good results within the shire improving community facilities such as the "Tracker Walford Walkway" with some participants have gained further employment with Council.

TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

Council continues to encourage employees to participant in training and development. During the period 2006/2007 Council expended \$181,539.67 on training and conference expenses to ensure that all staff are continually improving their skills and to remain up to date with legislative requirements.

EEO MANAGEMENT PLAN

Activities undertaken during the period July 2006 to June 2007 to ensure Council continues to apply the principles of Equal Employment Opportunity legislation:

EXTERNAL BODIES EXERCISING COUNCIL FUNCTIONS

Castlereagh Macquarie County Council have been delegated the responsibility for the management of noxious weeds within the Walgett Shire Local Government area.

CONTROLLING INTERESTS IN COMPANIES

Council held no controlling interest in any company during 2006 – 2007.

PARTNERSHIPS, CO-OPERATIVES AND JOINT VENTURES

- Northern Regional Library The Northern Regional Library and Information Service is based in Moree and is administered by Moree Plains Shire Council. It exists to provide an information and recreational resource to the residents of the Shires of Brewarrina, Moree Plains, Walgett and Gwydir. The annual contribution paid by Walgett Shire Council in 2006 – 2007 was \$135,843.65.
- Statewide Mutual Insurance Group —
 Members of this scheme join together to
 form a self insurance mutual. Members
 include Councils, the Local Government
 Association and the Shires Association. Its
 objective is to ensure protection of its
 members through stable premiums, cost
 containment and spread of risk.

- Barwon Darling Alliance This alliance was born out of a desire of the Murdi Paaki Regional Council of ATSIC and the participating Shire Councils to address their common regional concerns regarding high unemployment and serious quality of life issues. The mission aim of the alliance is to combine its members' resources to support and maintain sustainable economic growth and employment in the region and to develop positively the social capital and the lifestyle and culture of its people.
- Northwest Weight of Loads Group Moree Plains Shire Council administers this RTA and Council joint venture. The key challenges of this group include the prevention of overload vehicles, concentrated high volume harvest periods, seasonality, 24 hour 7 days per week operations, recovery of fine revenue and negative regulatory image.
- Rural Fire Service NSW Walgett, Coonamble and Warren Shire Councils operate and manage the Rural Fire Districts as the North West Zone under the terms of a Service Level Agreement (SLA). In accordance with this SLA the councils have agreed to delegate certain functions, powers and duties to the Fire Control Officer.
- Orana Regional Organisation of Councils (OROC) – This partnership between a number of north west councils collaborate on matters of common interest including research, regional strategies, resource sharing, advocacy and brokering.
- Namoi Local Government Group (NLGG) —
 The area of operation is within the Namoi
 Hydrological Catchment and its mission is to
 facilitate effective management of natural
 resources using a collaborative approach
 between local government and the Namoi
 CMA within the hydrological catchment of the
 Namoi River.
- Hunter Councils Inc Regional Procurement Initiative – This initiative has been established in response to a need for a collaborative approach to regional tendering and contracting.

BUSINESS ACTIVITIES

Council does not have any Category 1 business activities. Council has two (2) business activities declared as Category 2 business activities with total annual operating revenue less than \$2 million. These business units are Walgett Shire Water Supplies and Walgett Shire Sewerage Services as contained in Special Purpose Financial Reports marked 'Appendix A'.

COMPETITIVE NEUTRALITY

The disclosure requirements are reflected in Council's pricing and financial reporting systems and include taxation equivalents, council subsidies, rate of return on investments in business units and dividends paid.

Council utilizes its website as a mechanism to handle competitive neutrality complaints. No complaints have been received for the 2006 – 2007 period.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT SERVICES

What we achieved in 2006/07

No specific stormwater management activities were undertaken in 2006/07 and expenditure on routine maintenance was about \$74,000. Small lengths of failed kerb and gutter were replaced where adjacent road shoulder reconstruction was being carried out. Council has not, as yet, moved to introduce a stormwater management charge as is provided for in the Local Government Act.

What we are planning for the future

No specific stormwater management activities have been proposed in the Management Plan, other then routine maintenance including drain clearing, gutter sweeping and associated activities. No firm proposal, to develop a specific stormwater programme and introduce a stormwater management charge to cover this activity, has been brought forward. However, this is likely to change in the future as there are a number of open drains within Lightning Ridge which involve risks to Council that must be addressed. The Budget provides significant funds to address this issue from 2009/10, however smaller amounts have been provided from 2007/08 to erect signage appropriate to the risks evaluated by Council.

COMPANION ANIMALS ACT AND REGULATION

 Council lodges an annual return with the Department of Local Government which shows the numbers of impounded companion animals.

Key aspects of this years return include:

- 118 dogs and 46 cats were seized.
- 210 dogs and 50 cats were surrendered.
- 5 dogs were released to their owners.
- 343 dogs and 100 cats were euthanized
- Council spent \$113,300.00 on companion animal management related activities in 2006 -2007.
- Council participated in the RSPCA Companion Animal Welfare Scheme (CAWS) for the first time. The scheme included education sessions for school children, desexing and microchipping programs for dogs.
- The vast majority of companion animals that are surrendered to, or seized by, Council are euthanized. Council's regulatory staff seek new homes for any animal that is trained and/or in good physical condition but it is unfortunate that very few animals meet such criteria.
- A single off leash area for dogs was established by Council some years ago in Euroka Street, Walgett, near the aerodrome.
- Council did not access any Companion Animals Fund money during the period.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION

During the period Council received one (1) application for information under the Freedom of Information Act. The information requested was provided in accordance with the requirements of the Act.

PRIVACY AND PERSONAL INFORMATION

The Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998 was introduced to provide central safeguards to an individual's privacy in relation to a wide variety of personal information held by the public sector agencies such as Council.

The procedures in complying with these requirements are contained in Council's Code of Conduct. No review was conducted by or on behalf of the Council under Part 5 of the Act.

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006 -2007

Nominated in the top five finalists Local Government Youth Week Award 2007 for Best Small Council Youth Week Program and Best Local Youth Week Program.

Completion of Walgett Fitness Track.

School to Work Program implemented to employ five local students.

The MAD Project – Music, Art and Drama Project focusing on drug and alcohol abuse in youth was developed in partnership with Attorney General's Department, Walgett Crime Prevention Committee and Walgett Shire Council.

Library Depots established in Carinda and Burren Junction to enable access to library services in the villages and outlying communities within the Shire.

Improved signage and promotion at Walgett and Lightning Ridge libraries including the purchase of new furniture and book displays.

A Job Expo Day was held in Walgett in partnership with NSW Premiers Department. This day addressed the difficulties in recruiting and retaining staff with many government departments participating in this expo.

Local Ethnic Affairs Priority Statement (LEAPS) was included in Council's Management Plan 2006/2007.

"Happy Families are Best" calendar launch held at Walgett Youth Centre. This program was in partnership with Barwon Cottage.

Harmony Day was held at Walgett Swimming Pool with youth from all over the Shire attending.

Murals painted by local youth in Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Grawin.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

PCYC Services secured in Walgett Shire.

Purchase of a Community Bus to be utilized for services such as Youth Services, Family Day Care and Community Services.

Upgrade of Walgett Youth Centre including refurbishment of a Chill Out Room.

Gradual replacement of playground equipment around the Shire.

Increase and review of library opening hours.

Continually provide ongoing programs such as Harmony Day, Youth Week, Children's Week, PCYC programs and vacation care programs.

Introduce new youth programs focused on Healthy Lifestyles and education.

Stage Cricket NSW Indigenous Cricket Camp to promote and develop cricket within the indigenous youth.

Establishment of a Youth Council to assist in establishing a voice for the youth within the Shire.

Adoption of Aboriginal Community Strategy in consultation with local aboriginal community.

Establishment of an Aboriginal Employment Strategy (AES) office in the Walgett Shire. The AES specializes in placing and mentoring Aboriginal people into employment.

CORPORATE SERVICES

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006 -2007

Walgett Shire council was removed from the Department of Local Government financial monitoring list in June 2006.

Council's financial position was maintained with cash and investments (excluding external and internal restrictions) being maintained between \$1.5 million and \$2.5 million.

Rates and annual charges outstanding percentage was reduced from 15.97% in 2005, 15.94% in 2006 to 10.57% in 2007.

All statutory reporting requirements were met within the required timeframes.

The Management Plan 2006 – 2007 was updated into a five year plan encompassing 2007/2008 – 2011/2012.

The Conquest Asset Management system was installed and is fully operational. This system provides Management more detailed and accurate information regarding Councils infrastructure and assets.

A review of the rates and annual charges system has seen the revision of rating category "Mining" to "Business – Mining". Council was advised by the Department of Local Government that opal mining does not fall within the meaning of *metalliferous mine* as defined in Section 517(1) of the Local Government Act 1993, Categorisation as mining.

The rating model adopted for the rating year 2007 -2008 includes water exclusive values. This model was adopted following discussion with external bodies where it was agreed that the proposed model was fair and equitable.

The Revaluation of all water and sewerage infrastructure and assets.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

The continuation of sound financial management including quarterly review and revision of the budget.

Ensure the sound operational direction and financial viability of Council through the Management Plan.

To undertake a further review of the rates and annual charges following a land revaluation by the Valuer General in 2008.

Maintain Councils intensive debt recovery procedures to assist in a reduction in Rates & Annual Charges Outstanding Percentage to an acceptable level of below 9%.

An increase in the commitment towards staff training and development.

Further development and improvement in the service provision provided from Civica Pty Ltd.

Maintain Unrestricted Current Ratio above 3.5:1. This ensures that Council has the ability to meet their debts and obligations as they fall due.

TOURISM

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006 -2007

Adoption of the Walgett Shire Tourism Destination Strategy and the Walgett Shire Tourism Signage Strategy.

Introduction of a level 3 accredited Visitor Information Centre at Collarenebri.

Hosted three community workshops: Book Easy – Booking & Distribution Seminar, Tourism Development Workshop, Go West Community Service & Business Development.

Staff attended Caravan & Camping Trade shows in Brisbane, Melbourne, Sydney, and Dubbo.

Hosted the Walgett Shire Business Awards.

Reprinted the Walgett and Lightning Ridge tourism brochure, using the new cooperative marketing design supplied by Outback Regional Tourism Organsiation.

Participated in Cooperative Marketing Project with Tourism NSW, Kamilaroi Highway Project Launch.

Hosted community events: Sir Roden Cutler Wheelchair Roll, Kiss Me Kate – Musical Opera, Bangers and Mash – Theatre Production, Clean Up Australia Day, Business Clean Up Day.

Assisted with government funding for the Come By Chance amenities block.

Developed and maintained the Walgett Shire Council website.

Hosted the 100 year anniversary, Centenary of Council.

Installation of Visitor Information Kit and the Walgett Visitor Information Centre.

Promotion of Walgett Shire in Publications: Caravanning Australia, The Caravanner, Country-Link, Qantas Magazine, NSW Traveller, Gregory's UBD, and the Overlander 4WD.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Continue with implementing signage Audit.

A marketing strategy will be developed in conjunction with Outback Regional Tourism Organisation , local Tourism Associations and operators.

Development of a tourism logo.

Create display material to be used at tradeshows.

Development of tourism brochures targeting niche markets: iIndigenous culture, bird watching, bore baths, fishing and opal.

Develop more cooperative marketing opportunities with local tourism operators, and regional operators.

Continue with developing the Burren Junction Bore Baths.

Continue with beautifying the townships in the Walgett Shire.

TRANSPORT

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Routine maintenance on state, regional and local roads.

Council completed two significant road upgrading projects within its regional road network.

Approximately 8 kilometres of the Walgett to Carinda Road were upgraded and sealed.

A little in excess of 3 kilometres of the Burren Junction to Collarenebri Road was upgraded and sealed.

Improvement works along the three State Highways within Walgett Shire to the value of approximately \$3 million.

Road shoulders in Euroka and Pitt Streets, Walgett were reconstructed and sealed.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

\$7.7 million has been provided by Commonwealth Government's AusLink Programme to complete extensive upgrading along Council's regional roads network over the next three years.

\$11 million will be spent to complete the sealing of the Walgett to Carinda and Burren Junction to Collarenebri Roads.

Sealing 25 kilometres of the Collarenebri to Mungindi Road from the Queensland border.

Replacement of timber bridges over Pian Creek (Burren Junction to Collarenebri Road) and Castlereagh River (Walgett to Carinda Road) are planned over the next two years.

Reconstruction and sealing of Burren Junction streets, to the value of \$200,000.

PARKS AND GARDENS

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Excess of \$500,000 was spent in maintaining parks and reserves in Walgett, Lighting Ridge, Collarenebri and several smaller villages within the Shire.

Rehabilitation of the Burren Junction Bore Baths.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Provision of an automatic watering system for Number One Oval in Walgett.

Automatic watering systems for Gray Park, Walgett and Len Cram Park, Lightning Ridge are proposed for later years; however these may be brought forward if applications for Community Water Grants are successful.

Rehabilitation of the amenities block at the Lightning Ridge Bore Baths, at an estimated cost of \$60,000.

Provision of perimeter fencing at Lightning Ridge Bore Baths.

\$80,000 has been provided in each of the next five years to replace non compliant playground equipment in Council's parks.

PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND COUNCIL ASSETS

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Routine maintenance on both fixed and moveable assets, such as public buildings, staff dwellings, works depots, Walgett Town levee, plant and vehicles, and aerodromes.

A commencement on the construction of a multi purpose facility for Home and Community Care in Lightning Ridge.

An upgrade, costing nearly \$50,000 was undertaken at the Walgett Works Depot to provide for more efficient operations.

Approximately \$20,000 was spent at Wolseley House in Walgett, to provide roller shutters in an effort to combat vandalism and broken windows at night.

Council accepted a proposal from the NSW Department of Commerce to undertake pre-construction activities associated with the rehabilitation of the Walgett town levee.

Nearly \$700,000 was spent on replacing plant and vehicles, including a construction grader at a cost of nearly \$250,000.

A new truck, to collect domestic waste from the kerbside was purchased at a cost in excess of \$200,000.

A long term plant replacement programme was adopted by Council.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

A new dwelling, to be used as staff accommodation, will be erected in Euroka Street, Walgett on the site where the former SES Headquarters were destroyed by fire.

Additional staff accommodation on vacant land in Arthur Street, will be erected in 2007/08 at a cost approaching \$1 million.

Further improvements at the Walgett Works Depot will be undertaken in 2007/08 including provision of a new wash bay at an estimated cost of \$90,000.

Specific maintenance will be undertaken to the Walgett administration building, including replacement of fascias and guttering at a cost of \$40,000.

\$7,500 has been provided to improve security at the Council Chambers, in the light of recent vandalism attacks on the building's windows.

\$30,000 has been provided for a Rural Fire Service building in Burren Junction.

Additional measures will be taken to improve security for Council plant and equipment away from the works depot, at a cost of \$10,000.

Council is seeking funding from the Commonwealth government, with a local contribution contained in future budgets to provide for hall replacement at Burren Junction and hall upgrading at Carinda.

Completion of the Home and Community Care building in Lightning Ridge will occur in 2007/08.

Nearly \$2 million will be spent on plant and vehicle replacement in 2007/08, with significant purchases including a grader, patching truck and roller.

Included in plant purchases is a community bus.

Council has sought an exemption from needing to make a local contribution towards the cost of rehabilitation of the Walgett town levee. In the event that this exemption is not approved, Council will need to expend several million dollars from its own resources on this project over the next few years.

WASTE SERVICES

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

\$80,000 was spent on preconstruction activity to establish a new landfill site at Lightning Ridge.

The contractor at Walgett has made sound progress with on site improvements.

The Walgett Landfill was licensed for the first time in 2006/07 and stringent licence conditions need to be complied with.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Geotechnical testing on the site for the Lightning Ridge Landfill will need to be carried out to ensure suitability, after which the site can be acquired and pre-construction activities completed.

Council will increase its efforts to educate the community on matters relative to waste management.

WATER SUPPLY SERVICES

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Routine maintenance on all water supply schemes in the Shire.

Testing on the new sub-artesian bore in Rowena.

Commencement was made on relocating the pump intake on the Namoi River in Walgett to improve the raw water supply to the town's filtration plant.

Substantial progress was made on the implementation of telemetry at all water supply installations, to improve the monitoring and response to operational difficulties in the future.

Water has been carted from the bore at Cumborah to public tanks at the Grawin Opal Fields on numerous occasions throughout 2006/07.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Installation of water meters and the introduction of water billing based upon cost of service and water consumption (user pays).

Water meters will be introduced in all towns and villages which have water supply schemes in operation.

Council will hold discussions with the Burren Junction community to ascertain if that community wishes to pursue a water scheme within the next few years.

Works commenced in 2006/07, to better drought proof the Walgett water supply, will be completed in 2007/08.

In addition, telemetry work commenced in 2006/07 will be completed in 2007/08. A new, larger reservoir in Rowena is planned for 2009/10 at an estimated cost of \$200,000.

SEWERAGE SERVICES

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Routine maintenance on Walgett's sewerage scheme, and common effluent schemes in Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri.

Commenced an initiative to acquire the site upon which the Collarenebri effluent ponds are located.

Installation of telemetry for the same reason telemetry is being installed in the water schemes.

Total expenditure in 2006/07 on sewerage activities was nearly \$800,000.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Telemetry commenced in 2006/07 will be completed in 2007/08.

Renewal of electrical installation at Walgett Sewerage Treatment Works will be undertaken in 2007/08 at an estimated cost of \$28,000.

STORMWATER MANAGEMENT

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Routine maintenance.

Small lengths of failed kerb and gutter were replaced where adjacent road shoulder reconstruction was being carried out.

Council has not, as yet, moved to introduce a stormwater management charge as is provided for in the Local Government Act.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Routine maintenance including drain clearing, gutter sweeping and associated activities.

No firm proposal, to develop a specific stormwater programme and introduce a stormwater management charge to cover this activity, has been brought forward.

PLANNING AND REGULATION

WHAT COUNCIL ACHIEVED IN 2006/07

Recognition from the Department of Planning for being amongst the top five Council's in the state during 2005/2006 with the highest proportion of complying development certificate (CDC) applications (51%) relative to development applications (49%). State wide the proportion of CDC applications is 11%. The high proportion of CDC applications shows that where appropriate, Council has been active in ensuring that applicants avoid the unnecessary greater complexity and expense of the development application and construction certificate process.

Consultation with State Government agencies regarding the draft Walgett Shire Growth Management Study and Draft Strategy was finalised towards the end of the period.

Appointment of a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) coordinator, who will be progressively updating Council's mapping data. Amongst other things, this will allow Council to better manage infrastructure, improve maintenance planning, as well as to bring rural and urban addressing in line with Australian Standards.

Burial plot maps for the Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri cemeteries have been revised and digitised using GIS.

WHAT COUNCIL IS PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE

Council has been offered a \$20,000 grant for 2007-2008, to assist with the cost of a rural addressing program. It is expected that the bulk of the rural addressing work will be completed in the year.

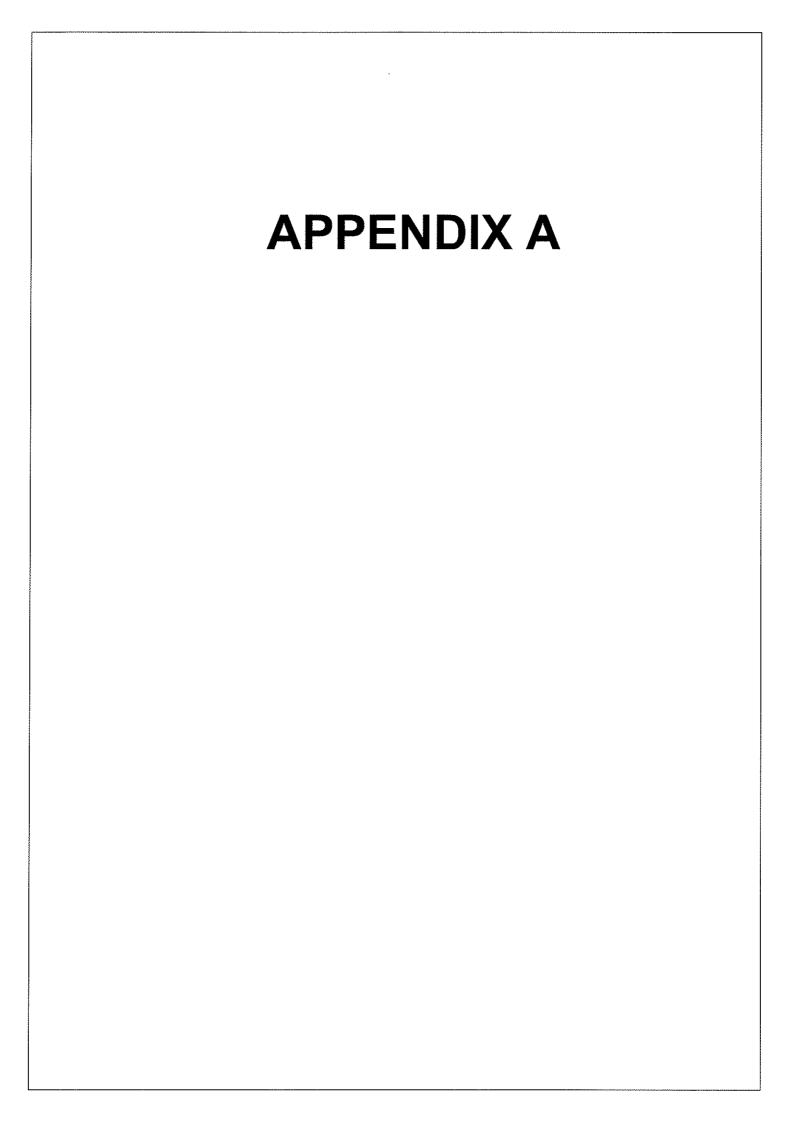
Public exhibition of the Walgett Shire Growth Management Study and Draft Strategy will be completed prior to the exhibition of a draft Local Environmental Plan (LEP). A new LEP will provide greater certainty for developers and the community about that types of land uses are permissible, as well as those that are not, in a given location.

Council expects to finalise a list of local heritage items for inclusion in a LEP.

Burial plot maps for the Burren Junction and Carinda cemeteries will be revised and digitised.

Implementation of a rural addressing program to ensure that rural addressing in the Shire complies with the principles of relevant Australian Standards.

Implementation of centralised record keeping of building and development approvals using Authority software to improve staff efficiency and the management of approval records.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 30 June 2007

Note 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. Basis of Preparation

1.1 Compliance with Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards

This general purpose financial report has been prepared in accordance with Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) as they apply to not-for-profit entities, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board, Urgent Issues Group Interpretations, the NSW Local Government Act 1993 and regulations thereunder and the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting.

1.2 Compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards

AIFRS include certain specific provisions relating to not-for-profit entities that are not included in the International Financial Reporting Standards. In addition, Australian Accounting Standard AAS 27 Financial Reporting by Local Governments also applies. Except to the extent that these special provisions require, these financial statements comply with International Financial Reporting Standards.

1.3 Historical Cost Convention

The financial report has been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, except where specifically indicated in these Notes, in accordance with the historical cost convention.

1.4 Critical Accounting Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with AIFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates, and requires management to exercise its judgement in applying Council's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgement or complexity, or cases where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are specifically referred to in the relevant sections of this Note. Nothing contained within this report may be taken to be an admission of any liability to any person under any circumstance.

2. The Local Government Reporting Entity

Walgett Shire Council is incorporated under the NSW Local Government Act 1993 (as amended) and has its principal place of business at 77 Fox Street, Walgett. These financial statements include the consolidated fund and other entities through which the Council controls resources to carry on its functions. In the process of reporting on the Council as a single unit, all transactions and balances between activity areas and controlled entities have been eliminated.

The following Special Rate funds and Committees established pursuant to the Act are included:

- Walgett Shire Water Supply Fund
- > Walgett Shire Sewerage Fund
- Activities subject to Special Benefit Rates

2.1 The Trust Fund

In accordance with the provisions of Section 411 of the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended), a separate and distinct Trust Fund is maintained to account for all monies and property received by the Council in trust which must be applied only for the purposes of or in accordance with the trusts relating to these monies. Trust monies and property subject to Council's control have been included in these reports.

Trust monies and property held by Council but subject to the control of other persons have been excluded from these reports. A separate statement of moneys held in the Trust Fund is available for inspection at the Council Office by any person free of charge.

3. Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue is recognised when the Council obtains control over the assets comprising the revenue, or when the amount becomes an enforceable debt, whichever first occurs.

Note 1 - Significant Accounting Policies (cont)

Where grants, contributions and donations recognised as revenues during the reporting period were obtained on the condition that they be expended in a particular manner or used over a particular period, and those conditions were undischarged as at the reporting date, the amounts subject to those undischarged conditions are disclosed in these notes as restricted assets. Also disclosed is the amount of grants, contributions and receivables recognised as revenues in a previous reporting period which were obtained in respect of the Council's operations for the current reporting period.

4. Cash Assets and other Financial Instruments

Cash Assets include all amounts readily convertible to cash on hand at Council's option with an insignificant risk of changes in value with a maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

Receivables for rates and annual charges are secured over the subject land, and bear interest at rates determined in accordance with the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended) and the Regulations and Determinations made thereunder. Other receivables are generally unsecured and do not bear interest. Loans made to sporting and community groups at concessional interest rates are recognised at their nominal amounts; interest revenues foregone by the Council effectively being a reduction of interest revenue in the period to which it relates.

All receivables are reviewed as at the reporting date and adequate provision made for amounts the receipt of which is considered doubtful.

All financial instruments are recognised at fair value at the date of recognition. Financial instruments classified as *loans and receivables* and *held-to-maturity* are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Other financial instruments classified as *fair value through profit and loss* and *available-for-sale*, are subsequently measured at fair value where an active market exists, or at cost. Details of classifications of financial instruments are given in Note 15.

5. Inventories

Inventories held in respect of stores have been valued by using the weighted average cost on a continual basis, after adjustment for loss of service potential. Inventories held in respect of business undertakings have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

5.1 Real Estate Assets Developments

Real Estate Assets developments have been classified as Inventory in accordance with AASB 102 and are valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Cost includes the costs of acquisition, development, borrowing and other costs incurred on financing of that acquisition and up to the time of sale. Any amount by which cost exceeds the net realisable value has been recognised as an expense.

Revenues arising from the sale of property are recognised in the operating statement when settlement is completed.

5.2 Other Real Estate held for resale

Properties not acquired for development, but which Council has decided to sell as surplus to requirements, are carried at the carrying value at the time of that decision.

Certain properties, auctioned for non-payment of rates in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Local Government Act but which failed to meet the reserve set by Council and are available for sale by private treaty, are recorded at the lower of the unpaid rates and charges at the time of auction or the reserve set by Council. Holding costs in relation to these properties are recognised as an expense when incurred.

6. Infrastructure, Property, Plant & Equipment

6.1 Transitional Provisions

Council has elected not to recognise land under roads in accordance with the deferral arrangements under AASB 1045.

6.2 Recognition

All non-current assets purchased or constructed are capitalised as the expenditure is incurred and depreciated as soon as the asset is held "ready for use".

Crown reserves, and improvements thereon, under Council's care and control are recognised as assets of the Council. While ownership of the reserves remains with the Crown, Council retains operational control of the reserves and is responsible for their maintenance and use in accordance with the specific purposes to which the reserves are dedicated.

Council has title to, and is the registered owner of, (number) rural fire appliances and associated rural fire fighting equipment. These assets are under the control of the Rural Fire Services to enable that Department to provide the bushfire protection defences set out in their Service Level Agreement with Council, and accordingly have not been recognised in these reports. In accordance with normal Rural Fire Service funding arrangements, Council continues to contribute to the costs of maintenance of this equipment.

6.3 Materiality

Assets with an economic life in excess of one year are only capitalised where the cost of acquisition exceeds materiality thresholds established by Council for each type of asset. In determining (and in annually reviewing) such thresholds, regard is had to the nature of the asset and its estimated service life. Examples of capitalisation thresholds applied during the year under review are provided in Note 9 to these accounts.

6.4 Valuation

Detail of valuations, methods and valuers are provided at Note 9. Plant, equipment and similar assets are carried at historical cost less accumulated depreciation.

6.5 Depreciation of Non-Current Assets

Other than land, all assets recognised are systematically depreciated over their useful lives in a manner which reflects the consumption of the service potential embodied in those assets.

Depreciation is recognised on a straight-line basis. Major depreciation periods for each class of asset are provided in Note 9 to these accounts. Depreciation periods for infrastructure assets have been estimated based on the best information available to Council, but appropriate records covering the entire life cycle of these assets are not available, and extreme care should be used in interpreting financial information based on these estimates.

6.6 Impairment

Assets that have an indefinite useful life are not subject to depreciation and are reviewed annually for impairment. Assets that are subject to depreciation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount (which is the higher of the *present value of future cash inflows* or *value in use.*

For assets whose future economic benefits are not dependent on the ability to generate cash flows, and where the future economic benefits would be replaced if Council were deprived thereof, the *value in use* is the depreciated replacement cost. In assessing impairment for these assets, a rebuttable presumption is made that the current replacement cost exceeds the original cost of acquisition.

6.7 Borrowing Costs

Borrowing costs in relation to qualifying assets (net of offsetting investment revenue) have been capitalised in accordance with AASB 1023 *Borrowing Costs*. The amounts of borrowing costs recognised as an expense or as part of the carrying amount of qualifying assets are disclosed in Note 4, and the amount (if any) of interest revenue offset against borrowing costs in Note 3.

7. Payables

7.1 Goods & Services

Creditors are amounts due to external parties for the supply of goods and services and are recognised as liabilities when the goods and services are received. Creditors are normally paid 30 days after the month of invoice. No interest is payable on these amounts.

7.2 Payments Received in Advance & Deposits

Amounts received from external parties in advance of service delivery, and security deposits held against possible damage to Council assets, are recognised as liabilities until the service is delivered or damage reinstated, or the amount is refunded as the case may be.

8 Borrowings

Loans are carried at their principal amounts which represent the present value of future cash flows associated with servicing the debt. Interest is accrued over the period to which it relates, and is recorded as part of "Payables".

9. Employee Benefits

9.1 Salaries, Wages & Compensated Absences

Liabilities for employees' entitlements to salaries, wages and compensated absences expected to be paid or settled within 12 months of reporting date are accrued at nominal amounts (including payroll based oncosts) measured in accordance with AASB 119 *Employee Benefits*.

Liabilities for employee benefits not expected to be paid or settled within 12 months are measured as the present value of the estimated future cash outflows (including payroll based oncosts) to be made in respect of services provided by employees up to the reporting date. Present values are calculated using government guaranteed securities rates with similar maturity terms.

Weighted average discount rate

6.35% (2006, 5.78%)

Apart from that pertaining to Council policy, no accrual is made for sick leave as Council experience indicates that, on average, sick leave taken in each reporting period is less than the entitlement accruing in that period, and this experience is expected to recur in future reporting periods. Council does make payment for a proportion of untaken sick leave in accordance with the following policy:-

"That after completion of 3 years continuous service with Council, provided the employee has sufficient untaken sick leave to their credit they may be paid one weeks untaken sick leave for each year of service up to a maximum of 5 weeks pay for 5 years or more of service".

9.2 Superannuation

The Council makes employer superannuation contributions in respect of its employees to the Local Government Superannuation Scheme. The Scheme has two types of membership, each of which is funded differently.

Accumulation Fund Members

The accumulation fund receives both employer and employee contributions on a progressive basis. Employer contributions are normally based on a fixed percentage of employee earnings in accordance with Superannuation Guarantee Legislation (9% in 2006/07; 9% in 2005/06). No further liability accrues to the employer as the superannuation benefits accruing to employees are represented by their share of the net assets of the Fund.

Defined Benefit Members

Council makes employer contributions to the defined benefits categories of the Scheme at rates determined by the Scheme's Trustee. The rate is currently 0.95 times members' contributions (0.95 times members' contributions in 2005/2006). Employees also make member contributions to the Fund. As such, assets accumulate in the Fund to meet the member's benefits, as defined in the Trust Deed, as they accrue.

The Fund's Defined Benefit Plan is a multi-employer sponsored plan. As the Fund's assets and liabilities are pooled and are not allocated by employer, the Actuary is unable to allocate benefit liabilities, assets and costs between employers. As provided by AASB 119.32(b), Council does not use defined benefit accounting for these contributions.

10. Construction Contracts

Construction works undertaken by Council for third parties (principally the Roads & Traffic Authority for works on national and state highways) are generally on an agency basis where the third party reimburses Council for actual costs incurred, and usually do not extend beyond the reporting period. As there is no profit component, such works are treated as 100% completed. Reimbursements not received are recognised as receivables and reimbursements received in advance are recognised as "payments received in advance".

Note 1 - Significant Accounting Policies (cont)

11. Joint Ventures and Associated Entities

Council participates in cooperative arrangements with other Councils for the provision of services and facilities.

12. Leases

Lease arrangements have been accounted for in accordance with AASB 117.

In respect of finance leases, where Council substantially carries all of the risks incident to ownership, the leased items are initially recognised as assets and liabilities equal in amount to the present value of the minimum lease payments. The assets are disclosed as assets under lease, and are amortised to expense over the period during which the Council is expected to benefit from the use of the leased assets. Lease payments are allocated between interest expense and reduction of the lease liability, according to the interest rate implicit in the lease.

In respect of operating leases, where the lessor substantially retains all of the risks and benefits incident to ownership of the leased items, lease payments are charged to expense over the lease term.

13. GST Implications

In accordance with UIG Abstract 1031 "Accounting for the Goods & Services Tax"

- > Receivables and Creditors include GST receivable and payable.
- Except in relation to input taxed activities, revenues and operating expenditures exclude GST receivable and payable.
- Non-current assets and capital expenditures include GST net of any recoupment.
- Amounts included in the Statement of Cash Flows are disclosed on a gross basis.

14. Budget Information

The Income Statement, Cash Flow Statement and Note 2 provide budget information of revenues and expenditures by type and for each of the major activities of the Council. Budget figures presented are those approved by Council at the beginning of the financial year and do not include Council approved variations throughout the year. Short explanations of the most significant variations are given in Note 16, and further information of the nature and amount of all variations is available from the Council office upon request.

15. Rounding

In accordance with the Code of Accounting Practice all amounts shown in the Financial Statements are in Australian currency and have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars.

16. New Accounting Standards & UIG Interpretations

Certain new accounting standards and UIG interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for the 30 June 2007 reporting period.

Council has not recalculated the depreciation for 2007 financial year as the effect is deemed to be immaterial.

Note 16 - SIGNIFICANT VARIATIONS FROM ORIGINAL BUDGET

Council's original budget comprised part of the Management Plan adopted by Council on 22 June 2006. The original projections on which the budget was based have been affected by decisions and new grant programs initiated by State and Federal Governments, by the weather, and by decisions made by the Council.

Revenues

1. User Charges & Fees

User charges and fees revenue was up \$2.039 million (87%) on budget mainly due to a very conservative estimate being made in the budget for RTA Claims – state road fee income.

2. Interest Received

Investment revenues was up \$298,000 (58%) on budget. Interest receipts have been effected by changes in interest rates available on the short term money market. Planned Capital expenditures were delayed resulting in the monies being available for short term investments.

3. Grants & Contributions - Capital

Grants & Contributions revenue for capital projects was up \$5.818 million (581%) on budget mainly due to an additional contribution of \$5.6 million received from the AusLink Strategic Regional Programme. This additional revenue is to be expended on capital road works to be completed by June 2010.

4. Profit from Disposal of Assets

An additional amount of \$38,000 (40%) was received from the disposal of Plant & Equipment with the proceeds from the trade in of plant exceeding budgetary projections.

Expenses

5. Materials & Contracts

Council's budget is based on a "normal" mix of self-constructed and contract works. The process of calling and accepting tenders during the year can result in substantial changes in this mix, resulting in significant budget variations in this item.

Note 18 - CONTINGENCIES & ASSETS & LIABILITIES NOT RECOGNISED IN THE STATEMENT OF FINANCIAL POSITION

The following assets and liabilities do not qualify for recognition in the Statement of Financial Position but knowledge of those items is considered relevant to user of the financial report in making and evaluating decisions about the allocation of scarce resources.

Potential Insurance Losses

Council is a multi-purpose organisation providing a large range of building, parks infrastructure, playgrounds and other facilities accessible to the public. At any time, it is likely that claims will have been made against Council that remain unsettled.

Council insures against all known insurable risks using a range of insurance policies, each of which is subject to a deductible "insurance excess", the amount of which varies according to the class of insurance.

Potential claims not reported to Council may have existed at reporting date.

Statewide Mutual

Council is a member of Statewide Mutual, an organisation formed for the purchase and management of certain insurances on behalf of its members. Council is liable to contribute its proportionate share of any shortfall arising through the scheme.

The Scheme is now in surplus and Council now longer has a share of prior year losses. As at 30 June, 2007 Statewide Mutual's total assets exceed total liabilities by \$7,277,219.

StateCover Mutual Ltd

Council has been a member of Statecover Mutual Ltd, a corporation formed for the purchase and management of workers compensation insurances on behalf of its members, since 1 July 2001.

Statecover has issued shares with no par value and may make calls on its members to meet trading losses and to comply with prudential requirements. There is no recognised market for the sale of Statecover shares.

Council has been advised by StateCover that it does not anticipate any capital shortfall as defined in clause 20.1 of the StateCover constitution and does not anticipate any calls to be made or proposed to be made on Walgett Shire Council as at June 2007.

Rural Fire Fighting Assets

Council has title to, and is the registered owner of, (22) rural fire appliances and associated rural fire fighting equipment. These assets are under the control of the Rural Fire Services to enable that Department to provide the bushfire protection defences set out in their Service Level Agreement with Council, and accordingly have not been recognised in these reports.

In accordance with normal Rural Fire Service funding arrangements, Council continues to contribute to the costs of maintenance of this equipment.

Barwon Darling Alliance

Council is a member of the Barwon Darling Alliance which is committed to the establishment of the Barwon Darling Credit Union.

Council has resolved to commit to subscribing to \$5000 X \$10 permanent (non-redeemable) Foundation shares totalling \$50,000 to be lodged upon incorporation of the Credit Union.

Waste Management Facilities

Council operates seven waste management facilities to service the needs of its community and will have to rehabilitate some of the site in the future. At balance date Council is unable to reliably estimate the financial cost of such work.

Note 21 - EVENTS OCCURRING AFTER BALANCE SHEET DATE

Sebsequent to balance date, towards the end of July 2007, and up to the date of this report, global financial markets have experienced significant volatility as a result of the US Sub Prime Mortgage crisis.

Whilst Walgett Shire Council did not directly invested in this market, a small proportion of Council's investment portfolio that has been invested in Collaterilized Debt Obligations (CDO's)at 30th June 2007 has been affected as a result of contagion market volatility.

The CDO's held by Council are of a long term nature which can potentially fluctuate both positively and negatively in terms of market value. The downward movement in the market valuation since year end is approximately \$132k based on the 30th September 2007 report from Council's Fund Manager.

Audit Report - Year Ended 30 June 2007

We are pleased to advise completion of the audit of Council's books and records for the year ended 30 June 2007 and that all information required by us was readily available. We have signed and attached our reports as required under Section 417(1) of the Local Government Act, 1993 and the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting to the General and Special Purpose Financial Reports.

Our audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards so as to express an opinion on both the General and Special Purpose Financial Reports of the Council. We have ensured that the accounts have been prepared in accordance with Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) and the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting.

This report on the conduct of the audit is also issued under Section 417(1) and we now offer the following comments on the financial statements and the audit;

1. RESULTS FOR THE YEAR

1.1 Operating Result

The operating result for the year was a Surplus of \$6.570 million as compared with \$1.670 million in the previous year.

An adjustment to the previous year's workers compensation insurance premium resulted in a refund of \$203,000 and, together with increased roads to recovery grants and RTA contributions, accounted for almost all of increase.

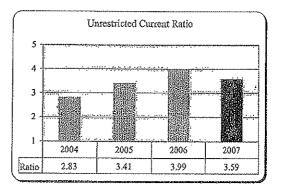
2. FINANCIAL POSITION

2.1 Current Ratios

2.1 Unrestricted Current Ratio

The Unrestricted Current Ratio is a financial indicator specific to local government and represents Council's ability to meet its debts and obligations as they fall due.

After eliminating externally restricted assets and current liabilities not expected to be paid within the next 12 months net current assets amounted to \$6.294 million representing a factor of 3.59 to 1.



2.2 Available Working Capital – (Working Funds)

A more meaningful financial indicator specific to local government is the level of *Available Working Capital*. Net Current Assets are adjusted by eliminating both external and internal reserves held for future purposes.

At the close of the year the Available Working Capital of Council stood at \$2.964 million as detailed below;

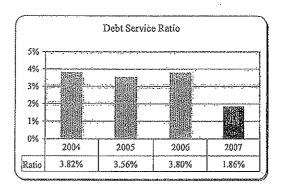

The balance of Available Working Capital should be at a level to manage Council's day to day operations including the financing of hard core debtors, stores and to provide a buffer against unforeseen and unbudgeted expenditures. Taking into consideration the nature and level of the internally restricted assets (Reserves) set aside we are of the opinion that Available Working Capital as at 30 June 2007 was sound.

2.3 Debt

Operating revenue (excluding special purpose grants and contributions) required to service debt (repayment of loans) was 1.86%.



2.4 Summary

Council's overall financial position, when taking into account the above financial indicators is, in our opinion, sound.

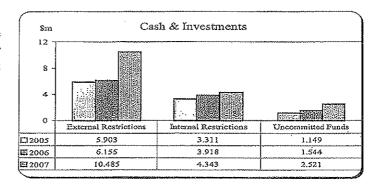


3. CASH ASSETS

3.1 Cash & Investments

Cash and investments held at the close of the year amounted to \$17.349 million as compared with \$11.617 million and \$10.363 million at the close of financial years 2006 and 2005 respectively.

The table alongside summarises the purposes for which cash and investments were held.



Externally restricted cash and investments are restricted in their use by externally imposed requirements and consisted of unexpended loans (\$152,000), unexpended grants (\$6.493 million) and water and sewerage fund (\$3.840 million).

Internally restricted cash and investments have been restricted in their use by resolution or policy of Council to reflect forward plans, identified programs of works, and are, in fact, Council's "Reserves". These Reserves totalled \$4.343 million and their purposes are more fully disclosed in Notes 6 of the financial statements.

Unrestricted cash and investments amounted to \$2.521 million, which are available to provide liquidity for day to day operations.

3.2 Cash Flows

The Cash Flow Statement illustrates the flow of cash (highly liquid cash and investments) moving in and out of Council during the year and reveals that cash assets decreased by \$4.020 million to \$7.597 million at the close of the year. In addition to operating activities which contributed net cash of \$9.615 million were the proceeds from the sale of assets (\$213,000) and repayments from deferred debtors (\$113,000). Cash outflows other than operating activities were used to repay loans and finance leases (\$246,000), purchase investment securities (\$9.750 million) and to purchase and construct assets (\$3.965 million).

4. RECEIVABLES

4.1 Rates & Annual Charges (excluding interest & extra charges)

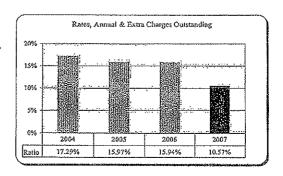
Net rates and annual charges levied during the year totalled \$5.951 million and represented 23.53% of Council's total revenues.

Including arrears, the total rates and annual charges collectible was \$6.850 million of which \$6.361 million (92.86%) was collected.



4.2 Rates, Annual & Extra Charges

After providing for doubtful debts of \$774,000 (2006 - \$595,000), arrears of rates, annual & extra charges stood at \$747,000 (2006 - \$1.022 million) at the end of the year & represented 10.57% of those receivables.



4.3 Other Receivables - Receivables (other than rates, annual & extra charges) totalled \$1.893 million. Those considered to be uncertain of collection have been provided for as doubtful debts and this provision amounted to \$213,000 as shown below.

5. PAYABLES

Employees Leave Entitlements - Council's provision for its liability toward employees leave entitlements and associated on costs amounted to \$1.465 million. A cash reserve of \$500,000 was held at year end representing 34.13% of this liability and was, in our opinion, sufficient to enable Council to meet unbudgeted and unanticipated retirements.

GENERAL PURPOSE FINANCIAL REPORT

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

SCOPE

We have audited the *general purpose financial report* of Walgett Shire Council for the year ended 30 June 2007, comprising the Statement by Councillors and Management, Income Statement, Balance Sheet, Statement of Changes in Equity, Cash Flow Statement and accompanying Notes to the Financial Statements. The financial statements include the consolidated accounts of the economic entity comprising the Council and the entities it controlled at the year's end or from time to time during the year. The Council is responsible for the preparation and presentation of the financial statements and the information they contain. We have conducted an independent audit of these financial statements in order to express an opinion on them to the Council. In respect of the original budget figures disclosed in the Income Statement, Cash Flow Statement and Note 2(a), we have not examined the underlying basis of their preparation. Similarly, we have not examined the variations from the adopted budget disclosed in Note 16 and therefore express no opinion on them.

Our audit has been conducted in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. Note 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. The Special Purpose Financial Reports

These financial statements are a Special Purpose Financial Report prepared for use by the Council, the Department of Local Government, and the Department of Energy, Utilities and Sustainability. They have been prepared to report the results of business units determined by Council in accordance with the requirements of National Competition Policy guidelines, and the specific requirements relating to Best Practice Management of water and sewer business units.

In preparing these reports, each business unit has been viewed as a separate unit, and accordingly transactions between different business units, and between business units and other Council operations, have not been eliminated.

2. Basis of Accounting

2.1 Compliance

The financial reports comply with the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting and the Local Government Asset Accounting Manual, and with the principles of the June 1996 NSW Government Policy Statement "Application of National Competition Policy to Local Government", the Department of Local Government's July 1997 guidelines "Pricing & Costing for Council Businesses: A Guide to Competitive Neutrality" and the Department of Energy, Utilities and Sustainability's May 2004 guidelines "Best-Practice Management of Water Supply and Sewerage".

Except where directed to the contrary by the above documents, the financial report also complies with all applicable Australian Accounting Standards and professional pronouncements, and is based on information consistent with that forming the basis of Council's general purpose Annual Financial Statements for the year.

2.2 Basis

The financial report has been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and, except where specifically indicated in these Notes or in the Notes to the general purpose Annual Financial Statements, in accordance with the historical cost convention.

3. National Competition Policy

In accordance with the framework set out in the June 1996 NSW Government Policy Statement "Application of National Competition Policy to Local Government" and other guidelines and documentation in relation to this matter, Council has declared that the following are to be considered as Business Units:

Walgett Shire Council Combined Water Supplies

Comprising the whole of the operations and assets of the water supply systems servicing the towns of Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri, each of which are established as separate Special Rate Funds (see item 4 below). As the total annual operating revenues are less than \$2,000,000, it is defined as a "Category 2" Business Unit.

Walgett Shire Council Sewerage Service

Comprising the whole of the operations and assets of the sewerage reticulation and treatment system servicing the towns of Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri which is established as a Special Rate Fund (see item 4 below). As the total annual operating revenues are less than \$2,000,000, it is defined as a "Category 2" Business Unit.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 30 June 2007

Note 1 - Significant Accounting Policies (cont)

The Department of Local Government's July 1997 guidelines "Pricing & Costing for Council Businesses: A Guide to Competitive Neutrality" outline the process for identifying and allocating costs to activities and provide a standard of disclosure requirements. These disclosures are reflected in Council's pricing and/or financial reporting systems and include taxation equivalents, council subsidies, rate of return on investments in business units and dividends paid. The Department of Energy, Utilities and Sustainability's May 2004 guidelines "Best-Practice Management of Water Supply and Sewerage" include specific requirements relating to the calculation and payment of "dividends" by water supply and sewerage business units.

3.1 Taxation Equivalent Payments

Council does not pay certain taxes and duties that are paid by equivalent private sector operations, but is liable for others. The Special Purpose Financial Reports disclose the effect of imputing these taxes to the declared business units at the several rates that would have applied to equivalent private sector operations. From 30 June 2004 the Department of Energy, Utilities and Sustainability's May 2004 guidelines "Best-Practice Management of Water Supply and Sewerage" require that imputed amounts be paid into the general funds of the Council where it may be applied for any permitted purpose of the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended).

Details of the rates of each tax or duty applicable to each different business unit are set out in the table forming item 7 of this Note. The narration "applies" indicates that the tax or duty has in fact been paid to the taxing authority by the Business Unit, and that these costs have been included in actual Operating Expenses, and the narration "various" indicates that Council has based the calculation of imputed tax on the differing rates of tax or duty applicable to different purchases.

3.2 Council Rates, Charges & Fees

Council rates have been *imputed* in relation to all non-rateable land, and *applied* in relation to all rateable land, owned or exclusively used by all business units. Annual and User Charges, and Regulatory and Other Fees, have been *applied* in relation to all services supplied to business units by Council or other business units.

3.3 Loan & Debt Guarantee Fees

The debt guarantee fee is designed to ensure that Council's business units face equivalent commercial borrowing costs to private sector competitors. In order to calculate the debt guarantee fees, Council has determined the average differential between actual and commercial borrowing rates for each business unit.

3.4 Corporate Taxation Equivalent

In accordance with the Code of Local Government Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting, income taxation has been calculated on the Operating Result before Capital Amounts disclosed in the Statements of Financial Performance of the Special Purpose Financial Reports. No allowance has been made for non-deductible items, timing differences or carried forward losses. Australian Accounting Standard AASB 112 "Income Taxes" has not been applied.

3.5 Dividends Paid

In accordance with National Competition Policy guidelines, it is expected that business units will pay dividends to its owner, Council, equivalent to those paid by private sector competitors. In accordance with the Code of Local Government Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting, the rate of dividend paid has been expressed as a percentage of the Change in Net Assets Resulting from Operations after Taxation.

Council is permitted, but not required, to pay a dividend to the general funds of the Council from surpluses generated by water supply and sewerage operations. The maximum amount of such dividend permitted under the "Best-Practice Management of Water Supply and Sewerage" guidelines is set out at the foot of the relevant Statements of Financial Performance. Actual payment of the dividend is subject to compliance with the procedures set out in the guidelines.

3.6 Return on Investment (Rate of Return)

The Policy statement states that Category 1 businesses "would be expected to generate a rate of return on capital funds employed that is comparable to rates of return for private businesses operating in a similar field." In accordance with the Code of Accounting Practice, the rate of return on monopoly businesses such as water and sewerage services has been set at an amount sufficient to cover costs and replace assets needed to maintain services. For competitive markets, the rate of return has been set equal to or better than the return on Commonwealth 10 year bonds.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 30 June 2007

Note 1 - Significant Accounting Policies (cont)

In accordance with the Code of Accounting Practice, the rate of return has been calculated as the Operating Result before Capital Amounts plus Interest Expense expressed as a percentage of the carrying value of Property, Plant & Equipment at the reporting date.

3.7 Notional Subsidy from Council

Government policy requires that subsidies provided to customers and the funding of those subsidies must be explicitly disclosed. Subsidies occur where Council provides services on a less than cost recovery basis, or accepts a lower rate of return on its investment in the business unit than would be acceptable to a private sector competitor.

In accordance with the Code of Accounting Practice, this amount has been calculated as the dollar difference between the required and actual rates of return.

4. Special Rate Funds

The Local Government Act 1993 (as amended) requires that moneys raised by way of Special Rates (or for Domestic Waste Management) be used only for those purposes, except for "dividends" payable in accordance with the "Best-Practice Management of Water Supply and Sewerage" guidelines, which also impose limits on the amounts payable. Accordingly, imputed amounts in excess of the permitted limits have been retained in those funds, and added back to Accumulated Surplus.

For Business Units not involving Special Rate Funds, *imputed* amounts have been transferred to Council's General Fund and are available to Council for utilisation for other purposes.

All such amounts have been eliminated in the course of preparation of the Council's general purpose Annual Financial Statements.

5. Other Accounting Policies and Notes

Other accounting policies relating to the determination of revenues and expenses, and assets and liabilities, not specifically referred to above are reported in Note 1 to the Council's Annual Financial Statements, and should be read in conjunction with this Note. Note references in the Statements of Financial Performance of Business Activities and the Statement of Financial Position of Business Activities that are prefixed "A" refer to the Notes to the Annual Financial Statements.

6. Rounding

In accordance with the Code of Accounting Practice all amounts shown in these statements are in Australian currency and, other than Notes 2 & 3, have been rounded to the nearest thousand dollars; amounts in Notes 2 & 3 are shown in whole dollars to meet the requirements of the Department of Energy, Utilities and Sustainability.

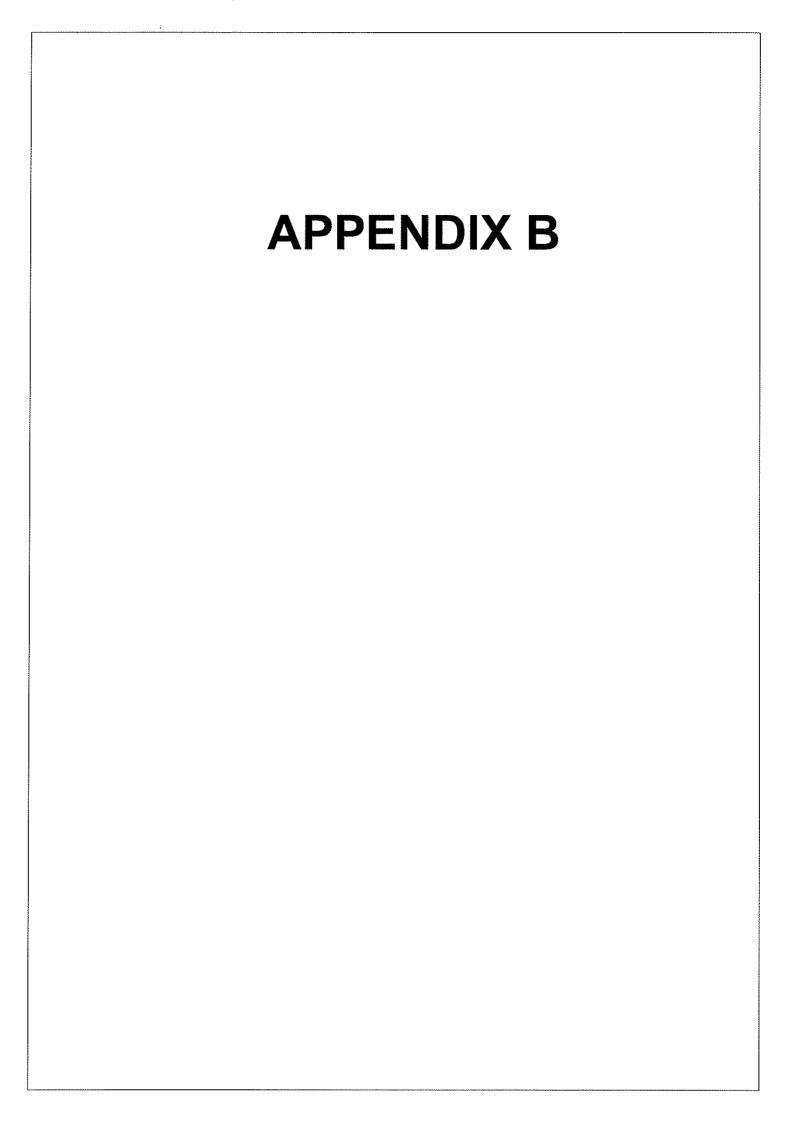

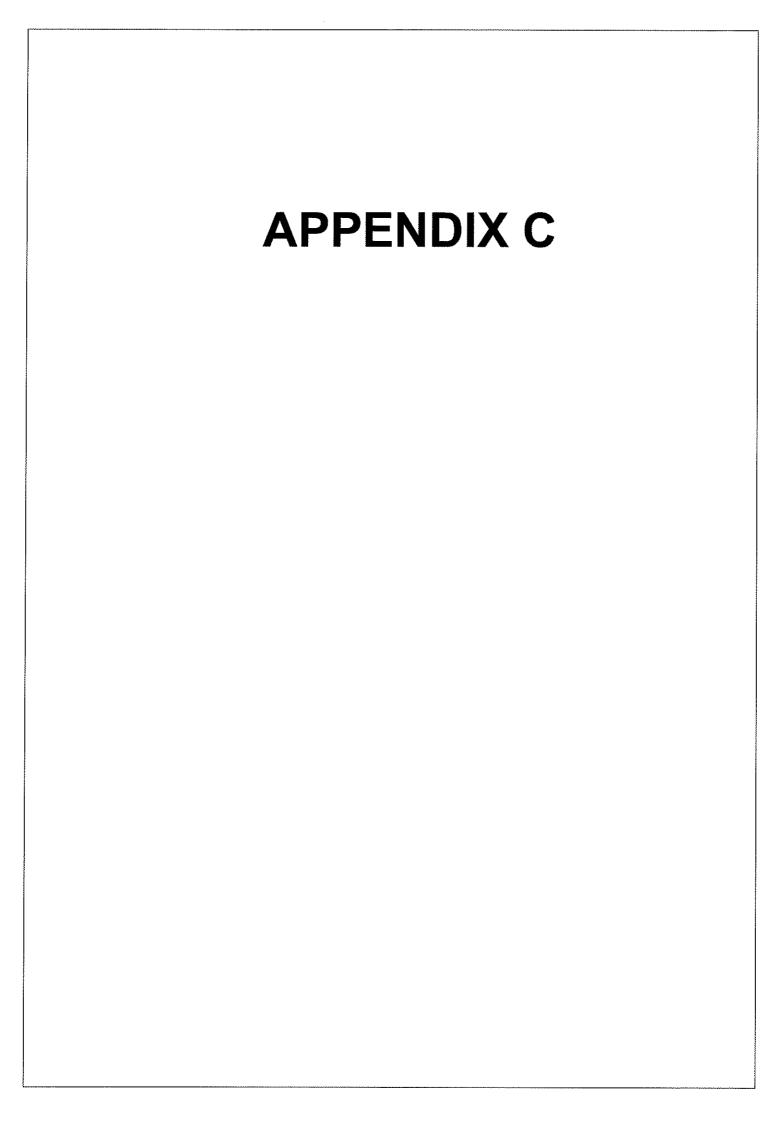

SUPPLEMENTARY

STATE OF THE ENVIRONMENT REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 2006 - 2007

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1 INTRODUCTION

The Local Government (General) Regulation 2005 requires that Council's prepare annual State of the Environment Reports. This report is a "supplementary" State of the Environment Report prepared under Clause 224 of the regulation. Supplementary reports provide an update on existing issues, as well as outlining new ones that have arisen since the previous State of the Environment Report. Comprehensive State of the Environment Reports are required to be prepared in the "year ending after each election of the councillors for its area".

Certain criteria for the preparation of the report are specified by clauses 218 to 226 of the regulation, including that the report must use a pressure, state and response model for addressing various issues associated with various environmental sectors.

1.1 COMMUNITY CONSULTATION

Consultation with the community regarding the draft State of the Environment Report was undertaken by advertising in local newspapers and on the internet that Council was inviting the public to comment on the report.

Advertisements appeared in the Lightning Ridge News on 13th and 27th September 2007, along with the Walgett Spectator on 12th and 26th September 2007. The advertisements indicated the draft report was available from Council's web site, written submissions were welcome and submissions should be lodged with Council by 30th September 2007. A single submission was received from the Western Catchment Management Authority.

1.2 GUIDELINES

The Department of Local Government has published two documents to guide Councils in the preparation of State of the Environment Reports. They are:

- o Practice Note 13 State of the Environment Reporting, published September 1995.
- Environmental Guidelines State of the Environment Reporting by Local Government, published December 1999.

Clause 220 of the regulation requires that Council consider the guidelines produced by the Department of Local Government when preparing a State of the Environment Report. Further

work is required to properly integrate the State of the Environment Report with Council's Management Plan and comply with the guidelines.

2 WALGETT SHIRE - BACKGROUND

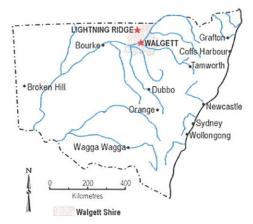


Figure 1 - Location of Walgett Shire in NSW.

The Shire has a total area of 22,330 square kilometres and is located in north-western New South Wales as shown in Figure 1. Walgett Shire adjoins a number of other shires, and the state of Queensland (Figure 2).

2.1 LAND TITLES

Administratively Walgett Shire is separated into the Central Division (11,310 km²) and the Western Division (11,030 km²). The Barwon River separates the two divisions, as shown in Figure 3. Freehold land titles are dominant within the Central Division, while most of the Western Division consists of Crown Land held under Western Lands Leases.

- o 250 square kilometres (25,000 hectares) of Nature Reserves and National Parks.
- o 36 square kilometres (3,600 hectares) of State Forest.

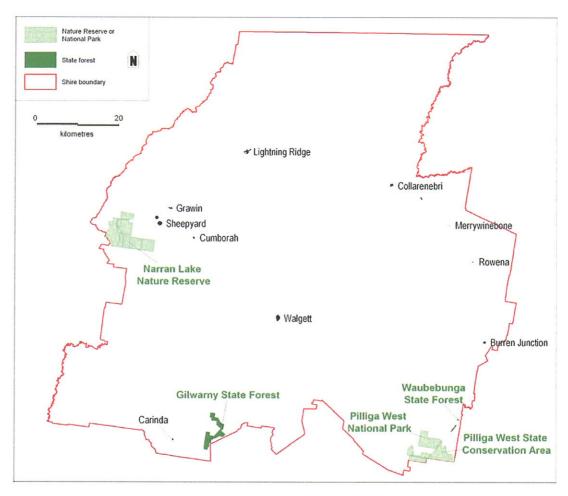


Figure 4 - Nature reserves and state forests within the Walgett Shire.

2.2 NATURAL ENVIRONMENT

2.2.1 Climate

The climate of the region is semi-arid with peak monthly rainfall usually occurring in summer and a smaller peak from May to July. Average daily temperatures, considered on a monthly basis, show a minimum of 5°C in July and a maximum of 35°C in the summer months.

2.2.2 Landform

A number of rivers pass through the Shire including the Barwon, Namoi, Macquarie, Castlereagh, Narran and Moonie rivers. The dominant landform is a floodplain, with an elevation between 120 and 145 m above sea level. In the northern portion of the shire there are a number of ridges that reach a maximum elevation of about 160 m above sea level.

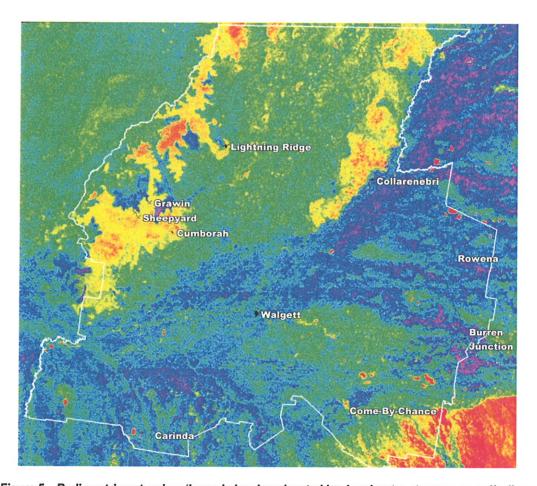


Figure 5 – Radiometric potassium 'image' showing elevated land and water storages as red/yellow, and flood plains as green and purple (data courtesy of NSW Department of Primary Industries).

Both the floodplain and ridge landforms can be seen in Figure 5 which is an 'image' showing the relative levels of radiometric potassium detected from aerial surveys conducted by the NSW Department of Primary Industries in the mid 1990s. Red and yellow coloured areas represent land that has comparatively elevated levels of radiometric potassium while green and purple coloured areas have comparatively lower levels. The red and yellow areas are generally ridge landforms or major man made water storages.

2.2.3 Geology

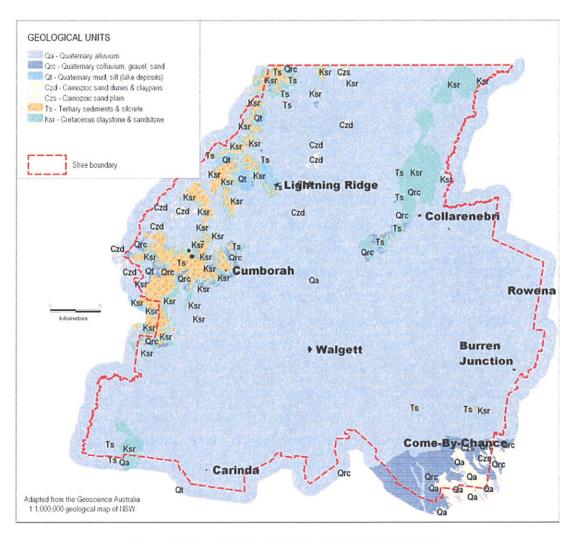


Figure 6 – Simplified geological map of the Walgett Shire.

Extensive flood plains of unconsolidated Quaternary alluvial silt and clay dominate local geology, as shown in Figure 6 below. There are also some comparatively small claypans and intermittent lakes that typically contain finer grained sediments such as mud and silt.

Ridges composed of Cretaceous claystone and sandstone exist in the Lightning Ridge, Cumborah and Collarenebri areas. They are typically covered with a veneer of unconsolidated Tertiary alluvial gravel, that in some areas is consolidated forming a rock known as silcrete.

2.2.4 Vegetation

Significant areas of flood plain have been cleared of native vegetation, primarily for the purpose of dryland and irrigated cropping. Dominant tree species within these areas include *Eucalyptus populnea* (bimble box), *Callitris glaucophylla* (white cypress pine), *Eucalyptus microtheca* (coolibah), *Eucalyptus largiflorens* (black box) and *Eucalyptus camaldulensis* (river red gum). Open woodland areas have a similar dominant tree species.

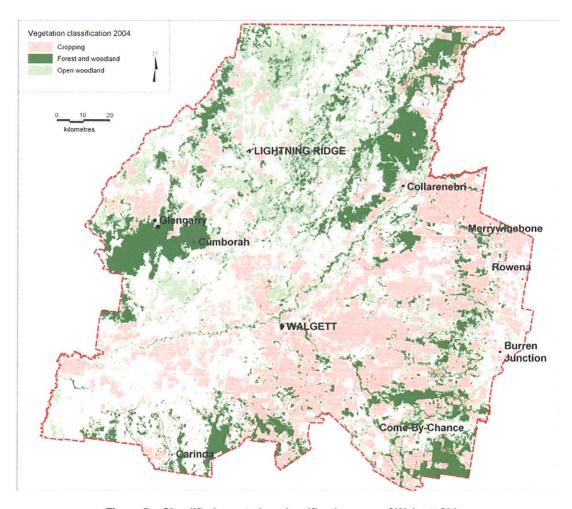


Figure 7 – Simplified vegetation classification map of Walgett Shire.

2.3 POPULATION

Urban centres within the Shire include Burren Junction, Carinda, Collarenebri, Cumborah, Cryon, Lightning Ridge, Rowena and Walgett. There are also numerous people living in mining camps on the opal fields at Grawin, Glengarry, Sheepyard and Lightning Ridge.

2.4 ECONOMIC

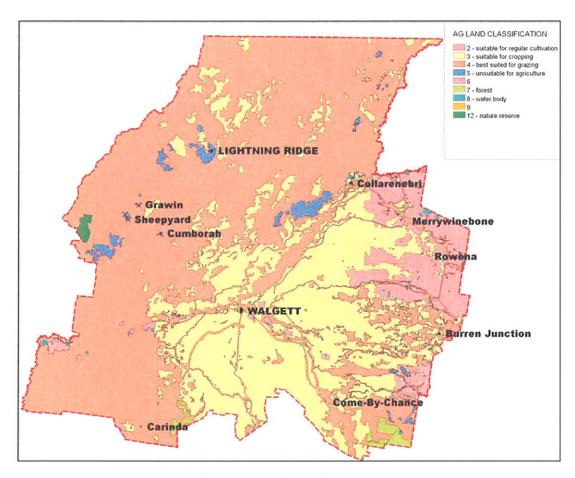


Figure 8 - Land capability map. ²

Dominant industries within the region include cropping (wheat, cotton, chickpeas), grazing (sheep, cattle), opal mining and tourism. Most of the land in the south east of the Shire is suitable for cropping while the land in the west and north tends to be better suited for grazing, as shown in Figure 8.

3 LAND

3.1 CLEARING

3.1.1 Pressure

There is a widespread desire within the local agricultural community for a reduction in regulatory controls which restrict or inhibit land clearing. Many landholders would like the opportunity to clear additional land for the cultivation of crops such as wheat and chickpeas. This desire has been stimulated by progressive improvements in cultivation techniques that preserve soil moisture and maximise crop yields, as well as by the ongoing comparatively low returns available from sheep and cattle grazing.

There are a range of land degradation issues that can arise from inappropriate land clearing, including:

- Soil erosion The removal of endemic vegetation and cropping of marginal lands can result
 in increased rates of soil erosion. Drought conditions can further accelerate rates of soil
 erosion.
- Dryland salinity Clearing reduces the abundance of deep rooted perennial vegetation which
 is replaced with comparatively shallow rooted crops and pastures. This can then result in
 rising water tables.
- Loss of flora and fauna Clearing reduces the extent and diversity of native vegetation communities, and the habitat available for occupation by native fauna. Many plant and animal species cannot adapt to the changed environmental conditions.
- Water quality degradation Clearing and cropping near watercourses can reduce surface
 water quality by increasing soil erosion and sediment loads within watercourses, as well as
 by allowing pesticides and nutrients to more readily flow into watercourses.
- Chemical alteration of soil Removal of native vegetation and its replacement with a
 grazing or cropping system driven by man will change the level of organic carbon,
 potentially increase the amount of man made chemicals such as pesticides and fertilisers, as
 well as possibly alter the nature of biological activity in the soil.
- Weed establishment The elimination of native vegetation can often result in an increase in
 the variety and density of weeds species. Weeds tend to be species that can grow relatively
 quickly on an opportunistic basis and they often benefit from reduced competition for
 nutrients and water as result of clearing.

3.1.2 State

At least 5,500km² of the Shire is used for cultivation, and hence has been cleared of native vegetation. The majority of the cultivated land is held under freehold title and is located within the central division.

3.1.3 Response

There has been ongoing regulatory reform of native vegetation legislation in NSW in recent years. The Native Vegetation Act 2003 has the stated aims of changing laws relating to the management of native vegetation in NSW by:

- ending broad scale clearing unless it improves or maintains environmental outcomes;
- encouraging revegetation and rehabilitation of land with native vegetation; and
- · rewarding farmers for good land management.

Clearing can only be undertaken in accordance with a development consent or a gazetted property vegetation plan (PVP). A 'Public Register of Approved Clearing PVPs and Development Applications' is now established which provides information on development consents and Clearing PVPs issued by the various Catchment Management Authorities (CMA).

As of 22 October 2007 Council had been notified that within the Shire:

- o The Central West CMA approved 0 PVPs (total).
- o The Border Rivers Gwydir CMA approved 0 PVPs (total).
- o The Namoi CMA approved 3 PVPs (total).
- o The Western CMA approved 6 PVPs (total).

3.2 OPAL MINING

3.2.1 Pressure

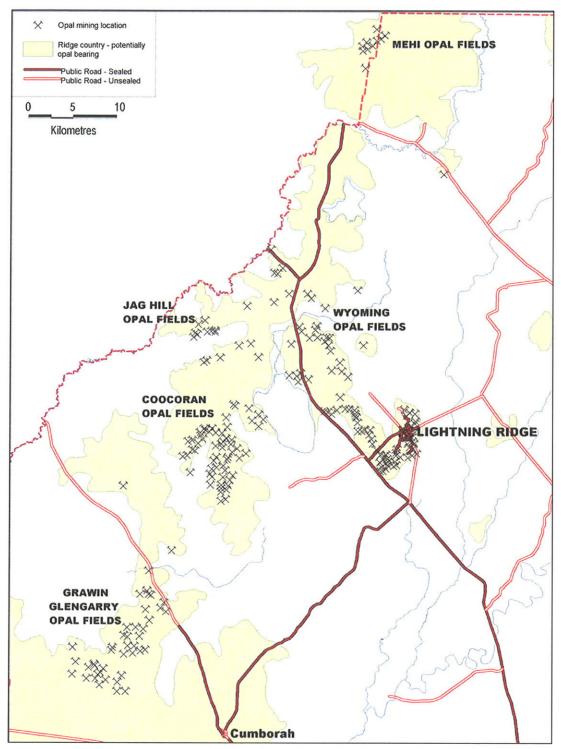


Figure 9 – Location of major opal fields.

Active opal prospecting and mining occurs to varying degrees on the opal mining 'fields' shown in Figure 9. Opal prospecting is generally undertaken by drilling holes in the ground that range from 0.1 to 1m in diameter and are up to 25m deep. Once opal has been found in an area, underground and open cut mining techniques may be used to extract the opal bearing claystone.

Opal mining can have a number of detrimental environmental impacts, including:

- Soil compaction and erosion initiated by passenger vehicle and truck movements.
- Destruction of flora and fauna through land clearing and establishment of mullock stockpiles and tailings dams.
- Chemical alteration of soil and surface water due to moderate levels of salinity within mullock.
- Mine shafts and exploration drill holes pose a hazard for livestock and fauna which can become injured, sometimes fatally, by falling into holes.

3.2.2 State

One of the most active opal mining areas continues to be the Mulga 'rush' in the Grawin Glengarry area, discovered late in 2000. Mineral Claim statistics shown in Table 2 suggest that there has been a steady decline in the number of claims in recent years.

3.2.3 Response

In April 2004 the Department of Primary Industries (now Department of Primary Industries) released a draft document titled 'Review of Environmental Factors for Opal Mining Within the Narran Warrambool Reserve, Lightning Ridge' (REF) for public comment. The REF provided an assessment of the environmental impacts associated with opal mining, current mitigation strategies and proposals for additional mitigation strategies.

After considering the REF the Department of Primary Industries introduced a requirement that any person seeking an Opal Prospecting Licence or Mineral Claim within OPA4 must first attend an course in environmental awareness and complete a Mine Operation Plan (MOP) for each Mineral Claim. The Department is also requiring that a MOP be submitted for any Mineral Claim registered in a new opal field within existing Opal Prospecting Areas.

The Department of Primary Industries was unable to supply information on how many claims were satisfactorily rehabilitated during the year. This represents a gap in the information available on mining.

4 AIR

There is no significant new data relating to air quality to report on since the previous Walgett Shire Council State of the Environment Report.

5 WATER

5.1 URBAN WATER SUPPLIES

5.1.1 Pressure

Walgett Shire Council supplies water to numerous residential and commercial residences within urban areas as outlined in Table 3 below. The 'sites' figure represents the number of properties on which Walgett Shire Council levies water rates (includes some vacant lots).

Council has an obligation to ensure that water supplies are suitable for their intended uses. The Australian Drinking Water Guidelines 2004 (ADWG)⁴ are the key standards against which NSW Health and local Councils assess drinking water quality. The guidelines specify thresholds for drinking water quality amongst other things.

The quality of water supplied by Council may vary for a number of reasons, including:

- Environmental changes affect raw water quality, for example river water invariably has an increased sediment load during flood periods.
- Human activities also affect raw water quality, for example river water can carry pesticide residues.
- The types and effectiveness of water treatment processes that are applied to raw water prior to its distribution within urban areas.

• The age and condition of water mains and storage reservoirs. For example periodic cleaning of reservoirs is required to remove sediment.

5.1.2 State

Walgett Shire Council assesses potable water quality via a number of sampling programs as detailed within Table 5.

5.1.3 Response

From Table 7 it is apparent that total coliforms were found on a number of occasions in the various potable water supplies. The ADWG indicate that coliforms can be present in drinking water as a result of:

- faecal contamination
- the presence of biofilms on pipes and fixtures
- contact with soil as a result of leaks, fractures or repair works.

Due to their widespread occurrence in soil and water environments, total coliforms (in the absence of *E. coli*) are not regarded as a specific indicator of faecal contamination. The relative abundance of coliforms makes them useful in monitoring the efficiency of water treatment and disinfection processes.

Several samples from the Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri water supplies were contaminated with *E. coli* during the year. The contamination was addressed by chlorination to destroy the *E. coli*. Follow up testing was undertaken to confirm that the contamination had been dealt with.

A new water supply bore was commissioned at Rowena early in the year and this has replaced the previously unpotable water supply bore. Although the water is not ideal, as shown in Table 6, it is far superior to that supplied from the previous bore.

Problems in previous years at Carinda with ongoing *E. coli* contamination appear to have been eliminated by the commissioning of a new elevated water supply reservoir.

5.2 RIVERS - FLOW AND SALINITY

5.2.1 Pressure

River water is used in a number of ways within the Shire, including for cotton irrigation, rural domestic water supplies, watering domestic livestock and for urban water supplies in towns such as Walgett and Collarenebri. The Shire is located in a semi arid environment downstream of numerous other water users, including cotton irrigators. Such circumstances contribute to significant variations in the volume and quality of river water flowing through the Shire.

5.2.2 State

Water quality can be assessed in many ways and one of the most common methods within Australia is by salinity. The electrical conductivity of water is generally indicative of the levels of total dissolved solids (TDS), and one of the most common dissolved solids is salt.

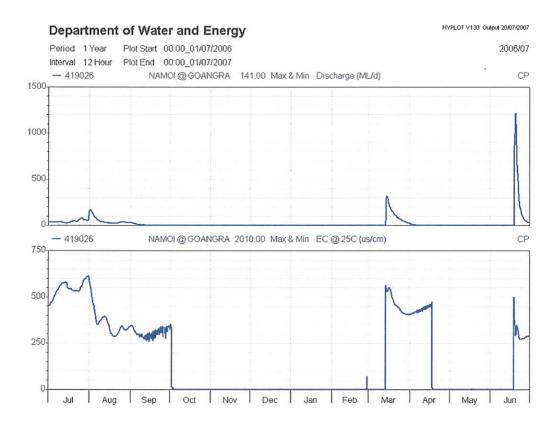


Figure 10 - Data on discharge & electrical conductivity in the Namoi River at Goangra 5.

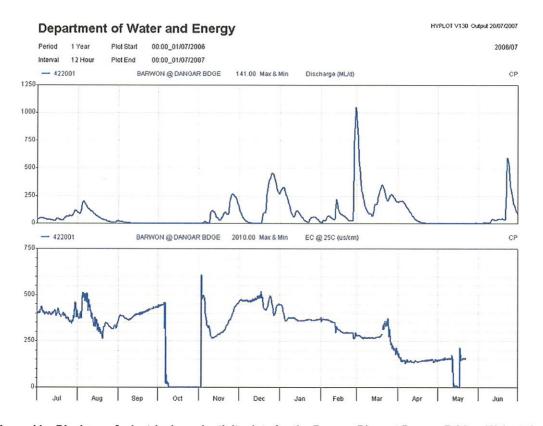


Figure 11 - Discharge & electrical conductivity data for the Barwon River at Dangar Bridge, Walgett.6

The Department of Water and Energy operates a number of river monitoring stations that provide data on electrical conductivity, water levels and volumes. Data derived from a station on the Namoi River at Goangra and another on the Barwon River at Walgett are presented in graphs in Figures 10 and 11. Those graphs indicate that during most of the year discharge volumes were

nil in the Namoi River, while electrical conductivity was quite high for a brief period in June 2007. Discharge volumes were more variable in the Barwon River.

The Australian Drinking Water Guidelines 2004 (ADWG) indicate that the TDS in water should not exceed 500mg/L due to taste considerations. An equivalent figure in electrical conductivity units can be roughly determined by doubling this figure, which is 1,000 us/cm. From the data in Figures 10 and 11, the salinity levels were adequate for human consumption except for a brief period in June 2007.

5.2.3 Response

Salinity levels are influenced both by natural processes and the activities of man. In this context it is important to consider medium and long term salinity trends to determine whether river water quality is declining or improving. Electrical conductivity has been monitored for about ten years, but there is probably insufficient data available to conclusively determine at this stage whether salinity is rising or falling.

Ongoing operation of river monitoring stations by the Department of Water and Energy within the Shire provides essential data for understanding variations in river water quality. The data is also important for providing an indication of whether actions being taken by Catchment Management Authorities and the community are improving river water quality.

5.3 RIVERS - ALGAE

5.3.1 Pressure

Periodic blue green algae blooms within local rivers can degrade water quality and in the most severe cases make water toxic to the extent that it is unsafe for consumption by people or livestock. Causes of blue-green algal blooms include:

- High water temperature (20-30°C).
- High pH (8-10) and low CO₂ concentration.
- Abundant zooplankton (microscopic animals).
- Low nitrogen to phosphorous ratios (less than 29:1).
- · High phosphorous levels.
- · Calm water conditions.
- · Low light intensity.

In 1991 and 1992 water quality in the Barwon-Darling River system received substantial media and community attention when contamination by blue-green algal blooms made the water toxic and unsuitable for consumption by livestock and people. As a result, a State of Emergency was declared for numerous shires, including Moree, Walgett, Brewarrina, Bourke and Cobar.

5.3.2 State

River water samples are collected by Walgett Shire Council staff and analysed by the Department of Water and Energy in Sydney. Sampling is usually undertaken fortnightly in winter and weekly in summer from the Barwon River at Collarenebri, the Barwon River near the Dangar Bridge in Walgett and the Namoi River in Walgett.

High alerts are issued when samples show more than 15,000 algae cells per millilitre, while medium alerts are issued when there are 2,000 to 15,000 cells per millilitre. High and medium algal alerts issued by Department of Water and Energyduring 2006-2007 are listed in Table 7.

5.3.3 Response

The town water supply for Walgett is drawn from a weir on the Namoi River. As a result, during periods when there are medium or higher algal alerts current for the river, activated carbon is used in the water treatment plant to reduce the toxins in the town's filtered water supply.

Collarenebri's town water supply is drawn from a weir on the Barwon River. The water treatment plant uses a micro-filtration process and, like Walgett, activated carbon is used during periods of medium or higher algal alerts.

6 BIODIVERSITY

6.1 ENDANGERED ECOLOGICAL COMMUNITIES

6.1.1 Pressure

A number of types of woodlands that exist within the Shire have been extensively cleared and modified since the arrival of European man. Fragmentation, overgrazing, weed invasion and alteration of flood regimes, amongst other things, can pose a threat to the long term viability of such ecological communities.

6.1.2 State

The NSW Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995 establishes an independent Scientific Committee, not subject to the control and direction of the Government, to determine which species, populations and communities are to be listed as threatened. That committee has determined that a number of ecological communities which are known to exist within the Shire should be regarded as endangered under the Act. Table 8 summarises the communities listed under that Act.

Under section 78A(8)(b) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, any Development Application which involves land that is critical habitat, or is likely to significantly affect threatened species (listed in Appendix B), populations or ecological communities or their habitat, must be accompanied by a 'species impact statement'. A species impact statement prepared in the manner prescribed under Division 2 of Part 6 of the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995.

6.1.3 Response

Data on the extent and viability of the various ecological communities within the Shire is incomplete.

6.2 KEY THREATENING PROCESSES

6.2.1 Pressure

The viability of natural populations of flora and fauna are affected by a wide range of variables. As an example, clearing may reduce the extent of a vegetation community which certain animals are dependent upon for food and shelter. Reductions in the area of the vegetation community will in turn decease the potential for the whole of the previous population of animals to survive.

⁺ Note: The Commonwealth's Endangered Species Protection Act, 1992 has been superseded by the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act, 1999.

6.2.2 State

The NSW Threatened Species Conservation Act establishes an independent Scientific Committee, not subject to the control and direction of the Government, to determine which species, populations and communities are to be listed as threatened. That committee has determined that a number of key threatening processes exist within the Shire, as listed in Table 9.

Under section 78A(8)(b) of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, any Development Application which involves land that is critical habitat, or is likely to significantly affect threatened species (listed in Appendix B), populations or ecological communities or their habitat, must be accompanied by a 'species impact statement'. A species impact statement must be prepared in the manner prescribed under Division 2 of Part 6 of the Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995.

6.2.3 Response

Data on the extent and viability of the various ecological communities within the Shire is incomplete.

7 WASTE

7.1 URBAN WASTE DISPOSAL

7.1.1 Pressure

The main waste depots within the Shire are located near the two largest towns, Walgett and Lightning Ridge. Both facilities will come to the end of their useful life in the short to medium term. Smaller facilities are operated at Burren Junction, Carinda, Collarenebri, Rowena and Come-by-Chance. Substantial expenses are incurred by Walgett Shire Council to establish, operate and maintain the waste depots.

7.1.2 State

The drum muster program, which recycles used agricultural chemical containers, continued operating at the Walgett waste depot. Opportunistic recycling is also undertaken at Walgett and Lightning Ridge waste depots. No kerbside recycling is undertaken in any of the communities within the Shire. Vegetation removed as a result of Council maintenance operations is chipped and reused as mulch where possible.

7.1.3 Response

Walgett Shire Council is in the process of reviewing options for a new waste disposal site at Lightning Ridge. Two preferred sites were identified during the year, but both have been subsequently ruled out due to public opposition during community consultation processes. Work is proceeding to determine a new preferred site prior to further community consultation occurring.

8 NOISE

8.1 DOMESTIC NOISE

8.1.1 Pressure

Noise is rarely regarded as a significant issue within the Shire as there are few substantial noise generating developments. Most problems arise in a domestic context with issues such as a barking dog or loud music. Such issues tend to occur more frequently in association with camp mineral claims on the opal mining fields.

8.1.2 State

Council receives sporadic complaints about the noise created by generators operating at what are perceived as "late" hours by the complainant.

Although the issue is relatively simple in itself, complications arise from community attitudes that vary from acceptance that "it is part of living on the opal fields" through to an expectation that legislative requirements should be rigorously enforced. In some cases it appears that personality conflicts may be a significant factor in the complaint.

8.1.3 Response

In the majority of situations Walgett Shire Council advocates that any party concerned by generator noise should discuss the matter directly with the owner of the generator. The suggested objective of the discussion is to develop a mutually acceptable outcome. Other situations are dealt with on a case-by-case basis.

9 ABORIGINAL AND NON-ABORIGINAL HERITAGE

9.1.1 Pressure

At this stage a Local Environmental Plan, which includes a schedule of heritage items that are of local significance, has not yet been gazetted. A community based heritage study is nearing completion which will include a list of local heritage items recommended for inclusion in a Local Environmental Plan. Until such time as local heritage items have been scheduled they may face greater risk of inappropriate development.

9.1.2 State

There are no items listed in the State Heritage Register as of September 2007 for Walgett Shire. Items recorded by the Australian Heritage Commission in the Register of the national estate database, as of September 2007, are listed in Table 10. Ultimately the present state of heritage items in the Shire is relatively poorly understood.

9.1.3 Response

Items of local heritage significance are normally listed in a heritage schedule attached to a Local Environmental Plan (LEP), but Walgett Shire currently does not have an LEP. Council's Heritage Adviser, Graham Hall, has prepared a draft list of potential heritage items in consultation with members of the community who had previously participated in Council's now disbanded Heritage Study committee. The list includes buildings in towns and villages and on rural properties, engineering structures, items on the opal fields and moveable items.

During the year letters were written to owners of items included on the draft list informing them that Council was considering the listing item in a heritage schedule attached to the LEP. A comparatively small number of objections were received.

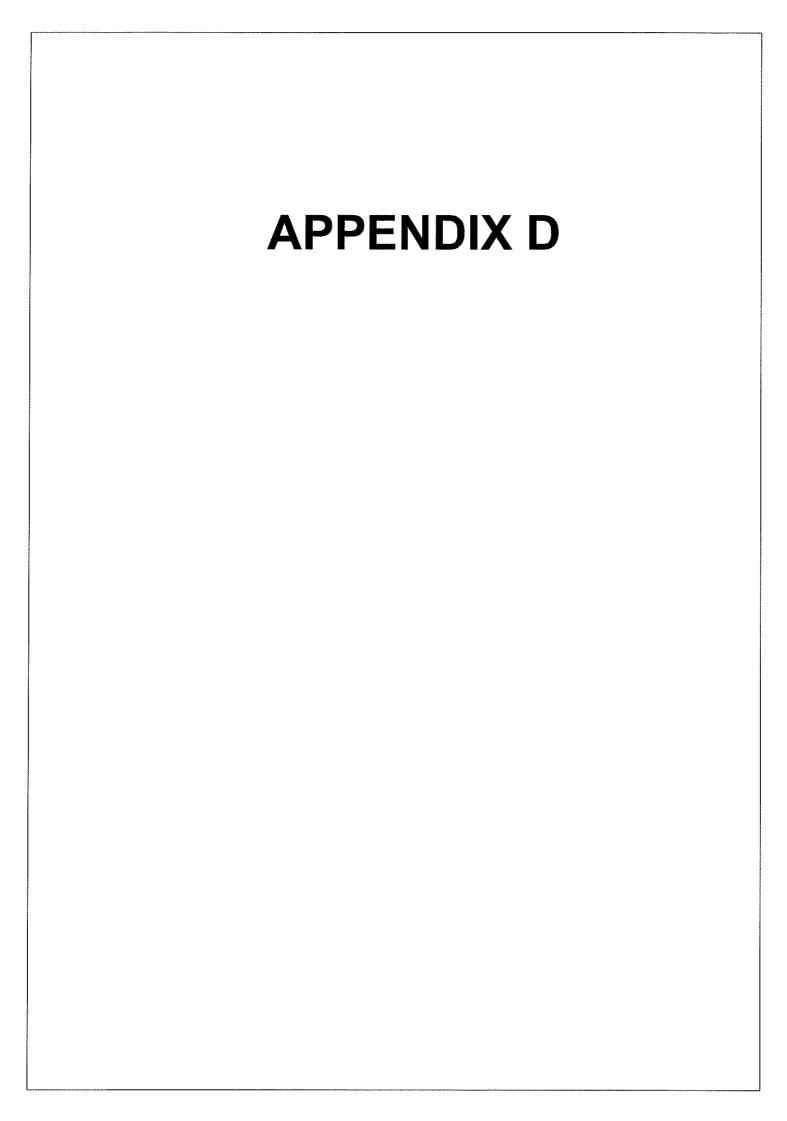

REPORT ON THE CONDITION OF PUBLIC WORKS

PUBLIC WORKS

PUBLIC BUILDINGS

Council has a total of twenty-two (22) public buildings on which an amount of \$584,255 was expended on maintenance during 2006/2007 in order to maintain them at a satisfactory standard. With regards to public housing Council has twenty-nine (29) dwellings on which an amount of \$160,097 was expended during this period to maintain them at a suitable standard. All of Council's buildings are subject to a cyclic maintenance program to ensure they remain at a satisfactory standard.

Council commenced construction of a community services building in Lightning Ridge, completion of which at a total cost of approximately \$1 million will occur in 2007/08.

PUBLIC ROADS AND BRIDGES

Within the Walgett Shire area there is approximately 2,908kms of public roads Council is responsible for; this includes Council and classified roads, State Highways and Regional Roads. Of this, 690km is sealed with the remainder being gravel or natural formation surfaces. Council is also responsible for 57 bridges within the shire. During 2006/07 Council expended an amount of \$7,366,907on maintaining and improving these public roads and bridges. The estimate to replace such infrastructure would amount to \$51.4m for \$10.4 m for bridges.

PUBLIC WORKS

Walgett Shire is responsible for water and sewerage in the three larger populated centres that are Walgett, Lighting Ridge and Collarenebri. In addition basic water supply schemes operate in the villages of Rowena and Carinda. An artesian bore, supplying a standpipe is available in the village of Cumborah.

In 2006/07, Council expended a total of \$786,313 on maintenance and operations for the sewer schemes and a total of \$1,618,813 for the water supply schemes. Commencement was made on works subsidised by the NSW Government to allow the Walgett water supply to combat drought periods more effectively. These works will be completed in early 2007/08.

The current replacement costs of the sewerage schemes within the Shire have been estimated at \$11.7m with the water schemes being \$15.9m.

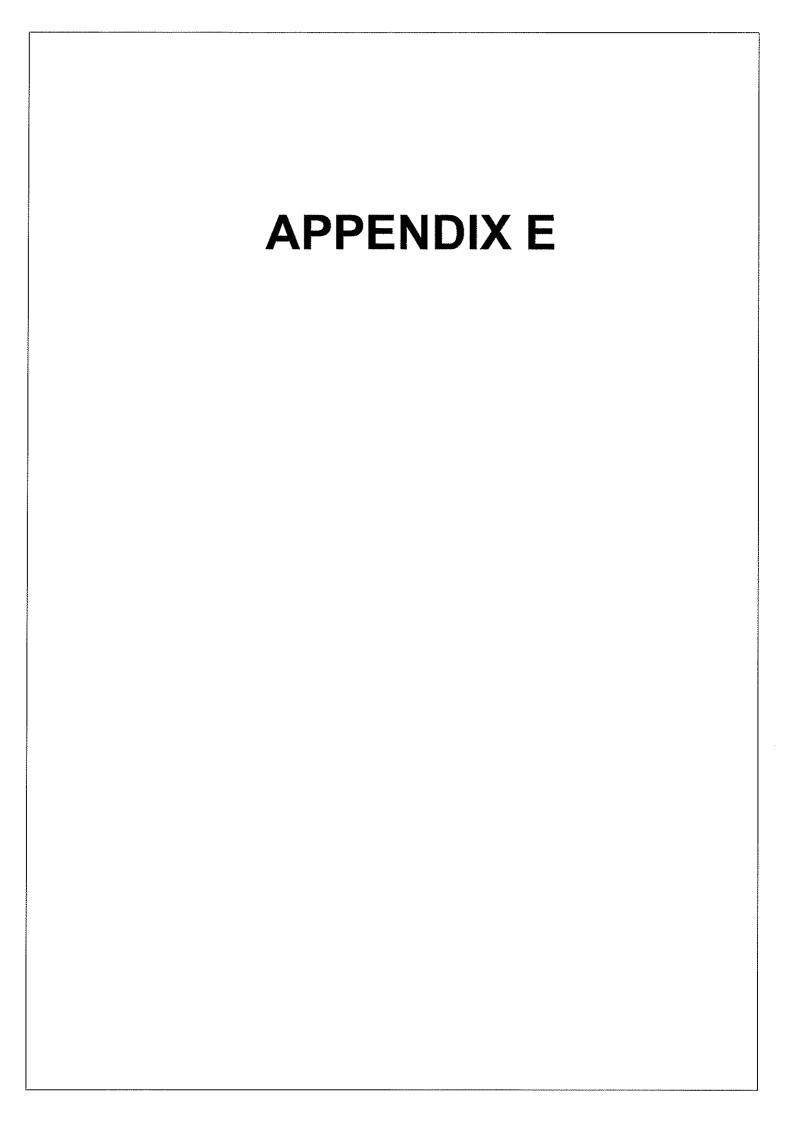

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1. Executive Summary

1.1 Walgett Shire Council Vision Statement

That the community be able to utilise the opportunities that arise within our environment, to improve their quality of life, while embracing their own culture and social diversity to the benefit of all.

1.2 Executive Summary

The Walgett Shire Community Plan 2007 - 2010 is an update of the 2003 - 2006 Walgett Shire Community Plan/Profile.

This plan was developed by Walgett Shire Council in consultation with community groups who were invited to submit comments.

These community groups were given the opportunity to raise concerns regarding community strengths and issues and to explore meaningful and appropriate solutions.

The following organisations provided comments:-

- Walgett Community College.
- Lightning Ridge Community Facilitator.
- Walgett Community Working Party.
- Lightning Ridge Home and Community Care.

This document has been prepared with reference to the "Release of the Social/Community Planning and Reporting Guidelines", Circular 98/41 released by the Department of Local Government on 20 May 1998.

The Plan aims to recognise and build on the existing Council efforts to promote the well-being of all community members and meet their needs through effective social planning.

Social/community planning is a vital corporate tool to help Councils increase their accountability, guide the future of their communities and develop effective planning partnerships with other government and non-government agencies.

Walgett Shire Council is committed to co-operating with the Murdi Paaki Regional Council, Community Working Parties and Interagency Structures within the Council of Australian Government (COAG) Trial. The COAG Trial is an agreement, signed by Federal, State and Local Governments, to work in partnership by setting a workable structure to address local issues. The COAG Trial is due to end on 30th November, 2007. It is anticipated these partnerships will continue working within the established structures.

Social or Community Planning is an evolving process. It involves continual updates, assessment, planning, implementation, monitoring and review. The Plan will regularly be updated as social objectives are achieved, new strategies emerge and as the community evolves and changes.

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The mandatory target groups for Council's Social Plan are as follows:-

- Young People
- Women
- Older People
- People with Disabilities
- Aboriginal People
- People from Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Backgrounds (CALD)

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2. COMMUNITY PROFILE

Walgett Shire Local Government Area is located in the far north west of New South Wales and covers an area of 22,007 square kilometres.

Walgett Shire borders with Queensland to the North, Moree Plains and Narrabri to the East, Coonamble to the South and Brewarrina to the West.

The Shire is located on Gamilaraay country in the southern and eastern sector, and to the north is on Yuwaalaraay country. Acknowledgement of the traditional land is displayed on signs along main roads entering into the Walgett Shire.

The Shire is geographically on the productive black-soil plains of New South Wales, part of which is in the Central Division and part in the Western Division. In the north and north west of the Shire is opal bearing country.

Council's Administrative Building is located in Walgett, on the Castlereagh Highway, 275 kilometres north of Dubbo. Walgett township is situated near the junction of the Namoi and Barwon Rivers.

Walgett Shire comprises of thirteen towns / villages / hamlets spread throughout the Shire. There are seven villages and two rural divisions and the preserved opal fields of Grawin, Glengarry and Sheepyard. Each community has its own identity, through cultural expression, cultural diversity and economic structures and development.

Income is derived from traditional farming and grazing activities, to-gether with cotton and other irrigated crop production. Opal mining, tourism, and service industries are other sources of income for residents of the Shire.

The drought has had an impact on the Shire over these years, as it has on other areas in remote and rural Australia. This has certainly affected employment opportunities within and around the Shire.

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2.1 Population Profile

The population of the Shire is very difficult to collate due to the high number of people in the mining areas and the Aboriginal communities who chose not to complete the census. There are also a number of people who reside in the mining areas for different periods of the year but whose main residence is in other Local Government Areas.

The ABS Postal Area Population Estimate in 2006 showed the Walgett Local Government Area population to be7503.

4.1 Demographics

Young people are defined as people aged between 15 and 24 years who have individual needs requiring support and assistance in the transition from childhood to adulthood.

Statistics are from the 2006 Census QuickStats -Postal Area.

Collated statistics show 11.5% of the population or 883 people are aged between 15 and 24 years.

Young people are a diverse group and include high school students, those who are dependent on the family, those living independently and those who are establishing families.

Accurate enrolment figures are difficult to collate due to the transience of some community families.

Police Citizen's Youth Club

The PCYC currently operate a pilot program from a van equipped with play stations, TV screens, sporting equipment and BBQ in Walgett on a fortnightly basis and also travel to Collarenebri and Goodooga during the school holiday period. Council has allocated \$40,000 per annum commencing 1st July 2007 to assist PCYC remaining in the Shire on a permanent basis and expand their service provision to all towns and villages in the Shire. Further funding is being sought to allow the employment of a permanent PCYC co-ordinator for the Castlereagh Local Area Command and to allow the van to visit other locations in the Castlereagh Local Area Command at regular intervals. 4.3 Walgett Shire Council operated services

Council is currently reviewing the number of parks and open spaces within the Shire with a plan to upgrade the standard of some parks whilst reducing the overall number of parks by reason of limited use throughout the Shire.

Council is currently in the process of auditing all playground equipment in the Shire. A five year replacement program is currently within the Council's Management Plan for 2007/2008-2011/2012 to replace all playground equipment in the Shire that currently does not meet Australian Standards (AS 4685).

Funding is regularly sought by Council for specific projects relating to parks and playing fields.

Funding will be sought through grant applications to assist with a replacement program for equipment established for parks and playing fields throughout the Shire.

5.1 Demographics

Statistics are taken from the 2006 census QuickStats – Postal Area. Collated statistics show 44.8% of the population or 2251 people were female.

By contrast 55.2% of the population or 4152 were males.

Social indicators demonstrate that women not only have lower socio-economic status, but have less employment and educational opportunities, lower incomes, are poorly represented in high status occupations and high income brackets and are over represented in part-time and casual work.

For many women, lack of accessible and affordable child care restricts their opportunities to gain employment.

Collated statistics show 27% of the population or 2026 people were aged 55 years or over.

The average age of Australians is increasing and the with the retirement of the 'baby boomers' ageing of the population is forecast to increase even further over the coming years.

The 'aged', 'older persons', 'senior citizens', 'elderly' are all terms used by society to describe people judged by society to be advanced in years in comparison with others.

While Council does not operate services for Older People, the services that are available in the Walgett Shire are supported by Council.

6.4 Recommendations

- 6.1.1 Council support initiatives to meet the demand for facilities and services in aged care including housing, personal care, transport and recreational needs.
- 6.1.2 Council support proposals to increase service provision of programmes aimed at the 'well' aged to assist them to remain at home in order that they can continue to self-care.
- 6.1.3 Council support funding submissions by organisations and agencies for Independent Living Unit Accommodation.
- 6.4.4. Council support proposals for increased mental and general health care agencies for ageing people through the State and Commonwealth Government for residents of the Shire.

The high growth rate of older age groups has created a corresponding increase in demand for community support, medical, hospital, and geriatric services and nursing home and hostel accommodation.

Additional pressure is placed on families, friends, and neighbours to provide care to people whose functional abilities have diminished as a result of ageing.

Government funding now supports people to remain in their own homes in the community for as long as possible and recognizes that provision of community support services is less costly than providing supported accommodation.

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8. ABORIGINAL PEOPLE

8.1 Demographics

Walgett Shire Council respectfully acknowledges the Aboriginal people of the Shire.

By striving towards a common sense of purpose, working together through issues and sharing experiences, we believe that reconciliation will be advanced at the local level. The community, as a whole, will then be better informed about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander aspirations and concerns.

Reconciliation activity at the local level is essential to the future of a better society. Change for the better comes about when local communities have an opportunity to participate in change. We need to identify the common ground and develop with quality the nature of our relationship.

Statistics collated from the 2006 Census QuickStats - Postal Area show that 2204 Aboriginal people live in the Shire. This is 29.37% of the total population.

ABS 2006 data indicates there is a continuing increase in the number of indigenous people who live in the Walgett Shire. The Australian Bureau of Statistics suggests that the increase in population counts is partly due to an increasing willingness to self-identify and to report all members of the household as being Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (ATSI).

The age distribution of the indigenous population and total population differ in that the indigenous population is much younger. This reflects the high birth rate and mortality rates of the indigenous population who are considered to be 'old' at the age of 45 years.

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There appears to be a consensus amongst Government departments and service providers that the Aboriginal people are represented by larger numbers in Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri than those actually identified in the 2006 Census Collection. Walgett has the largest Aboriginal community in the Shire.

Aboriginal Strategy

Strategies are to be developed in consultation with the Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri Community Working Parties, the Community Action Plan and the employment of the Community Facilitators (until 2008) whose roles are to implement the Community Action Plans under the Murdi Paaki Partnership Program. These strategies will include improving education, housing, health and employment opportunities, and reducing the level of alcohol and substance abuse, gambling and anti social behavior.

8.2 Current Services in Walgett Shire

While the main aim of services in the Walgett Shire is to help the Aboriginal communities, non-Aboriginal people are also welcome to access the services. In many cases, both formal and informal partnerships are evident for events and services.

<u>Murdi Paaki Partnership Program Community Facilitators, Walgett / Collarenebri and Lightning Ridge/Goodooga</u>

The facilitators of the programs are primarily responsible for facilitating the implementation of initiatives and strategies to assist in the resolution of social and economic issues in the Walgett Local Government Area of NSW as part of the Murdi Paaki Partnership Program.

One of the objectives is to build on the strong working relationship between Walgett Shire Council, the Community Working Parties in each town, the business Communities as well as State and Commonwealth Government and the Shire Community in general.

Networking and Community Consultation with Aboriginal Communities

The Community Facilitators, Interagency and Community Working Parties are the main conduits for consultation between the Aboriginal communities and Government agencies. There are in the main, three groups of Aboriginal people in the Shire with many sub-groupings that are variable. Variations can occur according to the issue under discussion, the state of inter-family relationships and the fluidity of internal community politics. Extensive community consultations are important with each issue raised.

Community Working Parties

Since 2001 Council has supported the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) Trial by working closely with actively networking with the Community Working Parties. It is planned that Council will maintain ongoing networking relationships with the Community Working Parties.

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Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service Co-operative Limited (WAMS)

Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service (WAMS) provides a comprehensive Health Service and Healthy Living Programs for Aboriginal people and other members of the Shire Community.

Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service also provides outreach service to Collarenebri and other locations in the Shire.

WAMS Services include:-

General practitioner, dental, community nursing, health screening, health education, referrals, advocacy and crisis intervention, transport.

9. PEOPLE FROM CULTURALLY AND LINGUISTICALLY

9.1 Demographics

Currently Walgett Shire residents represent some 65 different countries. The Shire's largest Cultural and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) community is in Lightning Ridge where over 55 different nationalities have been counted.

Prior to the 1996 census, residents of the Lightning Ridge CALD community organised a publicity campaign so that the ethnic community would be accurately represented in the data gathered.

Unfortunately, many people chose not to participate and consequently census figures do not accurately represent the ethnic diversity or accurate population of Lightning Ridge.

9.2 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Lightning Ridge and Regional Transcultural Community Council

The Lightning Ridge and Region Transcultural Community Council Inc. (TCC) started operating in Lightning Ridge in January 1996 with State and Federal Funding for the employment of one worker.

The service operates from the Neighbourhood Centre and is available to migrants, service providers, and general community for information and referral service assistance also providing information for the access of Translator Interpreter Services (TIS).

The Migrant Information and Referral Service (MIRS) worker is available on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

The TCC continues to play a very proactive role in the community, working towards cultural harmony and better understanding of cultural differences.

TCC Migrant Information and Referral services are available to all communities in the Shire on a needs basis.

Walgett Shire Council's LEAPS aims to achieve the following outcomes over the next 3 years:

- People from the wider community and people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds in Walgett Shire will enjoy mutual respect for each other.
- The Walgett Shire community will value and respect the cultural diversity and the similarities
 of its people.
- Council services will be better able to meet the needs of the people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.
- People from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds will be better able to meet their own needs.

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 People from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds will be more aware of and able to access Council's services and facilities

9.3 Walgett Shire Council Operated Services

While Council does not operate services for people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, the services that are available in the Walgett Shire are supported by Council.

9.4 Recommendations

- 9.4.1 Due to the ageing of CALD residents Walgett Shire Council support service providers seeking to secure additional hostel and nursing home beds, especially for people with dementia.
- 9.4.2 Walgett Shire Council continually review LEAPS with the view to the ongoing education of staff when dealing with people from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds.
- 9.4.3 Walgett Shire Council continue staff training sessions for better understanding and compliance with EAPS guidelines.
- 9.4.4 Walgett Shire Council ensure people from diverse cultural backgrounds have equitable access to services.

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10. ACCESS AND TRANSPORT

10.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Public transport in the Walgett Shire is limited to air and road.

Air

Walgett and Lightning Ridge have airstrips provided by Walgett Shire Council and regulated by the Australian Government's Civil Aviation Safety Authority. Burren Junction, Carinda and Collarenebri have Aircraft landing Areas which are not regulated.

The Air Ambulance Services also use these strips when patients have to be flown out to larger medical centres. In times of emergencies, the strips at Walgett and Lightning Ridge are of a suitable standard for large fixed wing aircraft to land. Walgett Shire Council has also provided several wider stretches of road between Walgett and Brewarrina that are designed to be used by aircraft in emergencies.

Charter flights are common from all towns in the Shire and some individuals either have their own plane or hire a plane from the Aero Club in Walgett. Hangers are provided for lease at Walgett. In Lightning Ridge, privately owned hangars are built on land purchased from Council.

Air Link provides a week day service from Dubbo to Coonamble, Walgett and Lightning Ridge and return. Passengers change aircraft in Dubbo to continue their journeys elsewhere.

Road

The majority of roads in the Walgett Shire are a combination of black soil and bitumen with some red soil and gravel in the northern part of the Shire. Walgett Shire Council continues to seal roads as funding becomes available. Black soil roads become impassable in wet weather.

Walgett township has two major highways in N.S.W. crossing each other in the centre of the town. The Kamileroi Highway passes through the Shire from east to west. The Castlereagh Highway passes through the Shire from north to south. Approximately 15km north of Walgett, the Gwydir Highway joins the Castlereagh Highway. The Gwydir Highway travels north east through Collarenebri to Moree and beyond.

A return daily coach service operates between Lightning Ridge, Walgett and Dubbo, stopping at all towns between Dubbo and Lightning Ridge so that passengers can connect with the XPT to Sydney. The coach departs Lightning Ridge and then Walgett in the early morning 2 days per week to allow people time in Dubbo if they need to access specialist and other appointments in Dubbo and return home the same day.

Collarenebri has no public transport but has a community bus which travels to Moree one day per week.

Access in towns and Villages

Council recognises the need to continue to upgrade and/or develop footpaths, curbing and guttering in towns and villages to allow ease of pedestrian access for residents across the Shire.

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10.2 Recommendations

- 10.1.1 Council support proposals to provide and improve transport services between towns and outlying villages in the Shire and to regional centres.
- 10.1.2 Council continue to audit the condition of footpaths in the central business districts of towns and prioritise areas in greatest need of replacement and up grading to allow ease of access for residents.
- 10.1.3 Council, through it's Engineering Department, lobby for additional funding to upgrade footways throughout the major towns within the Shire and outlying villages.
- 10.1.4 Council provide in kind and support to service providers who are endeavouring to seek funding to improve transport and access for residents within the Shire.

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11. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

11.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Throughout the Shire, individuals in organisations are working to develop the communities by helping people to achieve for themselves rather than solving a problem for them.

Murdi Paaki Partnerhsip Project

The Murdi Paaki Partnership Project has appointed two community facilitators, one for the Lightning Ridge/Goodooga communities and one for the Walgett/Collarenebri communities.

Community Working Parties working under the Council of Australian Government's Murdi Paaki Region Trial operates in Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri. NSW Premier's Department oversees Interagency meetings held monthly in Lightning Ridge and Walgett for all Service Providers.

Neighbourhood Centre Lightning Ridge

The Neighbourhood Centre in Lightning Ridge is the only formal centre of its type in the Walgett Shire and is mainly operated by volunteers.

Funding from Department of Community Services and the Department of Transport pays for the services of 1.5 staff. Non Government Organisation funding pays for two ethnic advisory officers who work from the Neighbourhood Centre. A range of services includes issuing emergency relief vouchers, transporting frail aged and disabled people to specialists' appointments out of town and to functions in town, acting as a referral point for the community and assisting elderly people living in camps on the opal fields with a range of services that allow the person to remain independent and to retain dignity.

Community Organisations

Community organisations, clubs and associations exist throughout the Shire. Each community organisations has a particular focus and consists of members with similar interests or beliefs. While each organisation, club and association is contributing to the social infrastructure of the community, it is suggested that more interaction and communication would reduce the duplication of services and polarisation of individuals.

Many informal local networks exist between service providers who refer clients to the most appropriate avenue of assistance. Lightning Ridge Service providers and Walgett Service Providers hold regulars meetings. These networks offer opportunities for information sharing, a networking communal approach to planning and lobbying for services, advocacy and support.

In order to sustain effectiveness, these networks need to continually self evaluate their direction and purpose.

Community Halls

Walgett Shire Council owns Community Halls in Collarenebri, Rowena and Carinda, which are available for community purposes.

12.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Education

Education provides the opportunities for our children, youth and individuals at large, to have the opportunity to have equal bargaining power, to enter the labour force with equity.

A wide variety of school environments exist across the Shire. It is important that education is seen as a lifetime job and that acquisition of skills, formally or informally acquired, is conducive to an improved quality of life.

The Council strives to provide adequate facilities and works with other agencies to encourage all families to maximise their educational potential.

Many children in Walgett Shire travel long distances by bus to attend school and for those for whom this is not possible, Distance Education is available. Distance Education is offered by the Community College - Public School (through the Bourke Campus), and Walgett Community College - High School

After completing Primary School, some young people leave to attend Boarding Schools for High School education. The reasons given for this are family tradition, better education and broader curriculum available at larger schools. This can then impact on the overall results of the High Schools in the Shire.

Educationalists find it difficult to convince many students that formal educational qualifications are important because of the lack of local employment opportunities and the belief that opal mining and other labouring employment opportunities do not need formal qualifications.

To gain tertiary qualifications and some trades, students have to go to a city or larger towns. Many students do not have the necessary financial and familial support to take up education, training and employment opportunities outside the Shire. This means that the students who remain in the Shire must be educated to live a better quality of life within their community environment.

Both Walgett Community College and Lightning Ridge Central School offer programs and opportunities to encourage young mothers and mature age students to further their education.

Best Employment assist job seekers to find work and that helps employers find suitable staff.

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The Department of Employment, Workplace Relations and Small Business is located in Orange. The Walgett Aboriginal Education Unit a part of this department.

Barwon Darling Alliance was born out of a desire of the Murdi Paaki Regional Council of ATSIC and the Shires of Bourke, Brewarrina, Central Darling, Coonamble, Moree Plains and Walgett to address their common regional concerns regarding high unemployment and serious quality of life issues including education. The Alliance includes 24 towns and covers almost 20 per cent of NSW

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13. HEALTH

13.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Health Services in Walgett Shire are part of the Castlereagh Sector of the Greater Western West Area Health Service. The administration for the Castlereagh Sector is in Coonabarabran.

The area is subdivided into sectors for management purposes.

Walgett Hospital and Health Service

The Walgett Health Service is the major Health Service in the Shire and Walgett District Hospital is a second schedule hospital under the provisions of the Public Hospitals Act 1992. The Service provides health care for all residents and visitors in the Shire with most patients coming from Walgett and the surrounding districts. When necessary, the hospital accepts referrals and patients from the Lightning Ridge, Collarenebri and Goodooga Health Services.

Walgett Health Service Comprises of 31 beds, 23 acute and 8 aged care (Peg Cross Nursing Home). Other services provided are general medical, pathology, radiology, paediatrics, midwifery, palliative, respite, 24 hour accident and emergency and a 3 bed high dependency unit. The Walgett Hospital and Health Service includes an operating theatre that is used by visiting specialists for minor surgery. Nursing staff care for patients in both aged and community areas.

Lightning Ridge Multi Purpose Centre and Health Service

2006 saw the completion of a multipurpose service facility in Lightning Ridge under the Rural Hospitals and Health Services Program with 24 beds – meeting acute care, aged care and respite needs.

There are 4 holding beds for patients being transferred to a referral centre. Emergency patients currently are transferred to Walgett for minor conditions, and usually to Dubbo if further treatment is required. The Emergency Department operates from the Multi Purpose Centre and is open from 7.30 to 10.30 with a call out service provided after hours.

Goodooga (which is situated in the Brewarrina Shire) has its own community health service and low level hospital. However its residents access Walgett and Lightning Ridge Health Services for specialist and other services.

Visiting medical specialist services including ophthalmologist, surgeon, gynaecologist, obstetrician, podiatrist, physiotherapist, pathologist, occupational therapist are provided on a regular basis at both Walgett and Lightning Ridge

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Collarenebri Multi Purpose Centre and Health Service

2006 saw the completion of a multipurpose service and facility under the Rural Hospital and Health Service Program, incorporating acute, aged care and allied health, outpatients, emergency, community and Aboriginal Health Services. There is usually one medical officer in town who provides a general practice and on call services. Radiology services are provided by licensed registered nurses. Regular visiting health staff come from Walgett, Dubbo, Lightning Ridge and Moree.

The Villages of Burren Junction, Rowena, Pokataroo, Carinda, Come By Chance, Cumborah, and opal mining areas of Grawin, Glengarry, Sheepyard are communities within the Shire who access services in the larger centres or have access to visiting Community Health Services.

Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service (WAMS)

WAMS is a community controlled organisation Members vote for the nine directors annually. WAMS charter is to provide high quality pro-active health care in includes Post Natal Clinics, General Practitioner Clinics, Dental, Eye, Family, Ear, Men's, Public, Mental, Sexual, Diabetes Health and Drug and Alcohol Counselling. WAMS has an Aboriginal Health Workers based in Collarenebri, operates the Goonimoo Mobil Children Services, Vacation Care Programs and manages the Brewarrina Aboriginal Medical Health Service. Many of these services are provided on an outreach basis to more remote towns and villages. Specific program funded services also travel to other locations beyond the Walgett Shire

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14. RURAL

14.1 Demographics

Walgett Shire is recognised as a major grain growing area in Australia. In good seasons it can be the biggest chick pea growing region in the world and have the largest grain receival sites in the Southern Hemisphere. Cattle feedlots, and to a lesser extent, sheep feed lots also operate in the Shire. Walgett Shire has suffered ongoing drought conditions for the past six years which has caused economic, physical and mental health issues in all communities in the Shire.

When detailing the problems and lifestyle difficulties that are faced by a rural and remote community, the people who live out of town on properties need to be included. These people contribute as much to the whole community as do the people in town though their problems and requirements may differ.

Walgett Shire Council Rate Assessments show that currently there are 903 rural properties in the Walgett Shire that usually contribute approximately \$2,822.462 in general rate revenue i.e.72.30 % of total general rates.

Agricultural activities have historically been the major income producer in the Shire. However, the ongoing drought has severely reduced all agricultural activities and potential income.

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15. HOUSING

Walgett

Walgett township is situated on a black soil flood plain with the town perimeter a levee bank. Walgett has both public and private housing and includes housing owned by Aboriginal Housing, Aboriginal Land Council and Murdi Paaki Housing.

Private rental accommodation is very scarce. The greatest call on housing in Walgett is in the rental market for local people, transient professionals and employees, other than teachers and police whose housing is owned by their relevant departments and is rarely available for other rental opportunities.

Because such a large percentage of the Walgett population is in receipt of a pension or benefit, many people find it impossible to save the required deposit for the purchase of their own home.

Aboriginal and Murdi Paaki Housing is specifically for Aboriginal people and have funding to purchase or build further houses to relocate Aboriginal people and relieve the overcrowded conditions in which some people live. Namoi Village and Gingie Mission are two Aboriginal communities outside the levee bank.

The Department of Housing has a limited stock of houses that are fully occupied. An officer from the Department visits Walgett every fortnight for the convenience of tenants.

Centrelink now allows people in receipt of pensions and benefits to elect have rent payments automatically deducted from their payments. This has been greatly appreciated by both tenants and landlords.

Lightning Ridge

Housing in Lightning Ridge includes housing in the township with supplied amenities and houses and camps on mining leases with no available running water or electricity. There are no Department of Housing homes in Lightning Ridge.

Private rental accommodation is also scarce and expensive. This adds to the difficulty of attracting professional staff to Lightning Ridge.

Barriekneal Housing Corporation is an Aboriginal owned and controlled housing company that builds and manages housing stock specifically for Aboriginal people.

Providers of human services in Lightning Ridge are anticipating an additional shortage of housing suitable for elderly people in the next few years as individuals who are at present just coping with living independently, will soon no longer be able do so.

<u>Collarenebri</u>

Housing and land in Collarenebri is currently cheaper than in other centres in the Shire. Rental accommodation again is scarce. Services are limited in the town and unless an individual has access to private transport, life can become very restrictive. Wolli, an Aboriginal Reserve is situated one kilometre from Collarenebri.

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Other villages

Housing and land are cheaper in all villages than they are in the three major centres in the Shire. Again rental accommodation is very scarce. All services are very limited in villages. Residents need to be able to access private transport to be able to visit other areas.

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16. ARTS AND CULTURE

16.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Culture and the arts need to be recognised as playing an essential role in the well being of sound communities.

The identification of arts and cultural issues within a community needs to be seen as a key aspect of Walgett Shire Council's responsibility.

Aboriginal Art and Culture is a large feature in the Shire.

The Shire recognises there are many local talented artists and performers living within its boundaries. The people in a culturally diverse rural and remote Shire such as ours would benefit profoundly if the community had an equitable opportunity to participate in arts and crafts. It is recognised that arts and crafts offer a powerful tool in developing self esteem for our geographically as well as culturally isolated community.

The youth in the Shire, in particular, experience cultural isolation, and need to be offered an opportunity to participate in the arts and develop a better awareness of the arts.

Arts and crafts offer people an opportunity to new ways of thinking and expression. The opportunity of self-expression through the arts is very rewarding for individuals, groups and communities and the community as a whole benefit from recognizing the value of arts and culture within it.

The arts and cultural industries are to be defined as including the following activities:

Museums, antiques and collectables, environmental heritage, libraries and archives, literature and print media composition and publishing, theatre, music, visual arts and crafts, design, film, television and other electronic broadcasting and distribution.

Outback Arts Council

Walgett Shire Council makes a contribution to the Outback Arts Council towards the development of arts and culture and the enjoyment of the arts and culture.

Outback Arts Incorporated offers and establishes innovative and operational plans for the continued development of arts and culture in the Walgett Shire.

Art

- Arts and Crafts produced by local people are offered for sale through local businesses and tourist facilities located across the Shire.
- Art Galleries situated in Lightning Ridge offer works of art for sale and viewing.
- Aboriginal Artwork and crafts are for sale in Lightning Ridge while limited sale opportunities exist in Walgett.
- Museums, Historical Societies and libraries are situated in Walgett and Lightning Ridge.
- 'Waste to Art' competitions are conducted in Walgett and Lightning Ridge.

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Historical Societies

Museums are located in Lighting Ridge and Walgett and are operated by committees and volunteers.

Lightning Ridge

17.2 Walgett Shire Council Operated Services

Library Services

The Walgett Shire is a member of the Northern Regional Library and Information Service, located within and managed by Moree Plains Shire Council.

The Northern Regional Library and Information Service provide an informational and recreational resource to the residents of the shires of Brewarrina, Moree Plains, Walgett and Gwydir.

The Northern Regional Library and Information Service (NRL) aims to develop, maintain and conserve a range of collections, resources and services in order to satisfy the Northern Region community, educational, informational and recreational needs. Staff training and expert advice are provided by the Northern Regional Library to Branch Staff, Council Managers and Councillors.

Walgett Shire pays an annual fee to Moree Plains Shire for provision of library related services and resources. However, Walgett Shire employs the library officers and operates and maintains the two library facilities located in Walgett and Lightning Ridge.

The NRL Library Manager and support staff regularly visits the libraries. NRL also provides support for the library officers, by means of phone support, regular book exchanges and IT support. NRL provide activities such as Story Time for children.

The Walgett Library is located in Wolseley House beside the Walgett Visitor Information Centre. The Lightning Ridge Library is situated next door the Arts and Crafts Shop adjacent to the Sporting Complex. These two libaries are open 15 hours per week.

There are also three library deposit stations in the Shire operated with volunteer support.

- Collarenebri Deposit station is situated in the CWA Rooms and is open either Saturday mornings or on request.
- Burren Junction Library Deposit Station is located in the Burren Junction Post office and is open business hours.
- The Carinda Deposit Station is located in the Carinda Store and is open business hours.

The library services aim to provide a high standard and quality library service that adequately meets the needs of all sections of the community.

- Promotion of exciting changes in Library services.
- Literacy programs.
- · Relationship with educational institutions
- Promotion of youth and children's programs

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18. INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION

18.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Never before has so much information been available to so many people. Print and electronic media can provide information on any subject. Unfortunately many people do not have the skills to access IT information. This may be due to shortcomings in their education or because technology is not available, accessible or affordable.

Four categories cover the main issues, concerns and needs raised by residents of the Shire.

Cooperation and Networking

The amount of information available is so vast that is impossible for any one organisation to know everything. In order to maintain an acceptable level of service provision to local communities it is necessary that cooperation and sharing of resources, collective development and maintenance of community information resources, and strong links to specialised services and between local services be encouraged.

Information Needs of Clients

It is essential that information is given to people in ways that make sense to them. The delivery of information to the community needs to be conducted in appropriate language and documentation that meets the divers communication skills within the community and is easy to understand and is user friendly.

Often people do not access centrally based information services due to:

- barriers to communication.
- fear of stigmatisation and lack of confidence when dealing with accessing particular information.
- not knowing where to look, or whom to approach, for information.
- are too busy to look for the information.

Information Technology and Communication Infrastructure

Most people are endeavouring to modernise their communication system. CDMA and satellite networks now provide mobile phone coverage for most of the Shire, however CDMA will be shut down early 2008 and the NextG network rolled in. Efficient Internet access is limited.

A large percentage of the population of the Shire are denied access to information technology. Reasons for this include:

- computers are too expensive.
- people are computer illiterate.
- people view computers as being 'too complicated' for them to cope with.
- people view the Internet as being too expensive and too complicated.

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19. LEGAL AND SAFETY

19.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

Walgett is the headquarters for the N.S.W. Police Force Local Area Castlereagh Local Area Command. The area covered includes Walgett, Lightning Ridge, Collarenebri, Pilliga, Coonamble, Goodooga, Carinda, Gulargambone, Burren Junction and Gwabegar.

In Walgett Shire, Lightning Ridge and Walgett stations have a larger proportion of officers while one or two officers serve the other sectors of the police command.

Crime statistics show a variation in the type of crime with most of the crime in the Patrol being alcohol related and domestic incidents, juvenile petty crime and traffic offences. There is a lower level of property crime in Walgett compared with Lightning Ridge partially due of the 'ratting' of opal mines in that town. Statistics currently show a lowering level of street, anti social and behaviour offences in Walgett.

Local courts operate in Walgett and Lightning Ridge with the District Court sitting in Coonamble.

Anecdotal evidence suggests Domestic Violence and Sexual Abuse as major concerns within the Shire. Unfortunately because of the sensitive nature of these offences, often people are unwilling to report, address or even acknowledge the serious implications arising from these issues. The long slow process of community education and awareness will be the main strategies that help to minimise these social crimes.

Crime Prevention Plans.

A template for Crime Prevention Plans is to be developed by the N.S.W. Attorney General's Department and forwarded to all local governments in N.S.W. for their use in developing new Community Safety Precinct Plans.

Council, in consultation with the N.S.W. Attorney General's Department, the Castlereagh Local Area Command and the Shire Community is to form a Community Safety Precinct Committee who will then develop a Community Safety Precinct Plan for the Shire.

CCTV in Walgett.

The Walgett Crime Prevention Committee believe effective CCTV coverage in areas in Walgett identified by the local Police as potential 'hot spots' should reduce anti-social behaviour and malicious damage and should encourage business house owners to remove the existing bars and grills.

A recent Safety Audit conducted in Walgett by the Walgett Police Force and submitted to Council recommended, in order:

- 1. Upgrading and expanding the CCTV in identified areas.
- 2. Upgrading lighting in identified areas.
- 3. Town beautification.
- Gradual removal of bars and grills.

As a result of this audit, Walgett Shire Council is currently seeking funding to upgrade and expand the CCTV coverage in Walgett, with the support of both the Police and the community.

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20. RECREATION

20.1 Current Services in Walgett Shire

In Walgett Shire, residents have access to a wide variety of recreational activities.

Each town in the Shire has an Olympic size swimming pool, though these are closed between Easter and the October long weekend. Carinda and Burren Junction have smaller public pools. Adjacent to the pool in Lightning Ridge is a water theme park and a yet to be completed diving pool.

Lightning Ridge, Walgett and Burren Junction have hot bore baths. The Lightning Ridge Bore Bath is very popular with members of the northern European countries who use the pool as a place for social gatherings. The Bore Bath in Walgett has a hoist for disabled people. The Burren Junction Bore Bath has recently been upgraded.

The Norman 'Tracker' Walford Walkway in Walgett is wheelchair accessible and follows the river bank. The track is used regularly and enjoyed by all users. The track signage highlights local vegetation and bush tucker.

Recreation facilities for active sports are quite well provided for within the Shire. Ovals in each town are used for winter and summer sports as well as for occasional outdoor entertainment events. Walgett has a show ground/race course with pavilions and grand stands. Lightning Ridge has a Racecourse and a Rodeo Arena. Collarenebri has a Racecourse.

Council also maintains a number of parks throughout the Shire. With the assistance of a grant, Council is currently establishing a Fitness Track with exercise stations in Apex Park in Walgett

Libraries are located in Walgett and Lightning Ridge. Walgett Shire Council is part of the Northern Regional Library & Information Service and pays an annual fee for the service. Book stock is ex changed every month. Libraries are open for limited hours with paid library officers and volunteers also assist in Lightning Ridge. Library deposit stations are situated in Carinda, Burren Junction and Collarenebri.

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
