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

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11. TOURISM DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES - JULY 2008 REPORT

Summary:

This report is presented to Council to summarise the activities and directions of the Walgett Shire Tourism Development Officer as at July 2008.

Discussion (including issues and background):

Primitive Camping Ground at Alex Trevallion Park

Alex Trevallion Park is currently a recreation reserve for use by the public. Facilities currently include; a caravan 'dump point', two toilets, barbeque facilities and sheltered picnic areas. The park has access to a septic system and is connected to both treated and untreated water.

For it to meet the requirements of a primitive camping ground it must have hot and cold running water, three female, two male toilets and a urinal. Two female showers and two male showers and two hand basins for each sex, one of each of these facilities must have disable access.

A letter was sent to the Department of Lands on 28/04/2008 regarding the change of purpose from a recreation reserve to a caravan park (primitive camping ground). A response was received on 01/07/2008 via email outlining that under its current purpose short term camping for caravans, motor homes and camping would be allowed provided the proper licence to operate a caravan park/camping ground is in place.

Two Rivers Meeting

It is envisaged that gaining access to the meeting of the Barwon and Namoi rivers would increase visitation to the area and dramatically increase the length of stay of visitors to the area. There is a crown reserve approximately 50 metres from the meeting point. However the actual meeting point of the rivers is on private property. A meeting has been set up with the current owner to explore possible options for opening up this significant point of interest to the public.

Signage

A series of interpretive signs are being developed for points of interest in the Shire. Installation of an Interpretive Sign for Burren Junction Bore Bath, signs to contain information including temperature, history, uses and information on the Artesian Basin. This sign will help to have Burren Junction Bore Bath signposted as a TASAC (Tourist Attraction Signposting Assessment Committee) recognised attraction. (This sign is to be developed in consultation with Catchment Management Authority).

Interpretive Sign to complement the fossicking heap at Lightning Ridge Visitor Information Centre. Sign to contain information on black opal, relevant terminology, the mining process, buying & selling Opal and warnings about fossicking on private land and sun protection. (This sign is to be

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developed in consultation with Lightning Ridge Miners Association & Lightning Ridge Tourist Association).

Interpretive signs for Alex Trevallion Park, sign to contain information on Walgett History including – immigration, settlement, Frederick Wolseley, Aboriginal history and culture and general tourist information. (This sign is to be developed in consultation with Walgett Historical Society and the Dharriwaa Elders Group).

Interpretive Sign for Collarenebri Lions Park. Sign to contain information on fishing, with a map showing public access to the river, species of fish found in the area, where to obtain a fishing license, bait etc (This sign is to be developed in conjunction with Collarenebri Precinct Committee)

Welcome signs at either major town entrances. Signs will welcome visitors to country from the traditional owners of the land; these signs will compliment new town welcome signs. (This sign is to be developed in conjunction with local elders groups)

Walgett Visitor Information Centre

3 new computers were installed in the visitor information centre in March. There has been a dramatic increase in usage over the last five months. This increase is due to the increased speed of the network, new programs and accessibility. The demographic of users has also altered with more young locals using the facility than tourists. However the installation of 'free to use' wireless internet will have a significant impact on tourists, many of whom stay in contact via the internet.

An LCD screen was installed in the visitor information centre in June, which will be used to display several promotional videos and emotive images of Walgett Shire.

On par with visitor numbers across NSW, visitor numbers are down approximately 4%. This has been attributed to rising fuel costs, disposable income being used on essential items rather than holidays and increased international holidays taken by Australians. However between November 2007 and February 2008 the Walgett Visitor Information Centre saw an increase of visitors by approximately 30%, due mainly to flooding in Queensland which encouraged holiday makers to holiday closer to home.

Walgett Tourist Association

The Walgett Tourist Association is in the initial stages of developing a tourism logo for the Walgett Community. They have held a photographic competition and a design competition to develop a gate to play on the well known nick name "The Gate." They are now seeking tenders from several design companies that will provide a number of logo design options that will be presented to the Walgett Community.

Kamilaroi Highway Committee

The Kamilaroi Highway Committee (of which we are a member) has purchased the online booking system "Book Easy", the program will be operated from a regional approach with one destination managing the payments and commissions while each visitor centre in the region will have access to the system to make and confirm bookings. The Book Easy system will provide the Kamilaroi Highway Committee and all Shires involved with a visible online presence as online bookings increase. The one off payment of \$10,728.00 will be paid by the Kamilaroi Highway Committee. A new Kamilaroi Highway brochure is currently being developed and will be sent to print in July. The Kamilaroi Highway Committee also welcomes Moree to the Committee.

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12. FORMER WALGETT RAILWAY STATION BUILDING

Summary:

Walgett Shire Council has owned the former Walgett Railway Station since 1994, but it has been unable to identify a clearly viable use for it. This report recommends that Council advertise an intention to dispose of the building and seek expressions of interest from the community for its reuse or demolition.

Discussion (including issues and background):

In 1994 the State Rail Authority donated the Walgett Railway Station building to the Walgett Shire Council because it was no longer in use and surplus to its needs (See Attachment A). The SRA submission indicates that Council:

- Held a 'community purposes' lease over premises between 1990 and 1994.
- Had not been able to find a community group to utilise the building.
- Intended to relocate the building to the Walgett swimming pool and restore it for use as a shelter shed and change rooms.

About 1994 the building was moved from the inactive railway line site to a nearby private property by Council. The apparent intention was for it to be temporarily stored at this site pending a viable use being found. Presently it remains on the property, supported on drums to keep it off the ground. It appears that no maintenance has been undertaken on the wooden building since 1994 and it is progressively decaying.

Periodic suggestions have been made about potential uses for the building, such as a letter dated 17 January 2008 from the Walgett District Historical Society which proposed that it be used as a dressing shed at the Walgett bore pool (See Attachment C). Walgett Shire Council's Heritage Adviser, Graham Hall, has also advocated reuse of the building (See Attachment D). Tentative fund raising concepts are suggested in these documents.

Earlier this year Walgett Shire Council's Health and Building Surveyor, Len Smyth, inspected the building with a view to assessing its condition and providing an estimate of the cost that might be incurred in relocating and renovating it (See Attachment B). The estimate of \$100,000 did not include any fit out costs. The age and type of building would necessitate significant ongoing maintenance expenditure. Council's Health and Building Surveyor ventured the opinion that it would be more cost effective to construct a new purpose designed building than to reuse this building.

It is appropriate to note that:

- Council already owns a number of relatively old buildings that require ongoing maintenance expenditure. Examples include the former Council Chambers, the old Masonic Hall and several town/village halls.
- Public buildings under Council management incur significant regulatory and duty of care obligations.

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- The building has not been proposed for listing as an item of local heritage at this stage because it is not 'fixed' on a site. As a result the local heritage fund cannot be used to assist with funding relocation and renovation.
- Although Council has owned the building for 14 years, it has not yet allocated a budget for its relocation and renovation.
- No significant alternative funding sources have yet been identified.
- No business case has been put forward for an alternative use.
- The Walgett bore pool site has a history of significant vandalism. An older timber building is substantially more vulnerable to fire than a newer masonry and/or steel building. As a result, Council needs to consider whether it is practical and appropriate to reuse the building at the Walgett bore pool.
- It is desirable for Council to make progress toward having the building removed from the private land where it is presently located.

In the above context it is recommended that Council advertise an intention to dispose of the building and seek expressions of interest from the community for its reuse or demolition.

Given the building's age and condition, it is not expected that it will have significant commercial value, either for reuse, or as demolition salvage. As a result, any offer to reuse or demolish the building that incurs no costs for Council will probably be worthy of detailed consideration.

The Walgett District Historical Society Inc has requested that this matter be considered by Walgett Shire Council after Council elections that are to be held on 13 September 2008.

SUBMISSION TO DONATE WALGETT STATION BUILDING TO COUNCIL.

PURPOSE:

This submission seeks approval to donate the Walgett Station premises to Walgett Shire Council.

BACKGROUND:

The Walgett Railway Station is surplus to operational requirements. Passenger services were withdrawn in 1983 and final closure occurred in the late 1980's. Trains now terminate at the grain silos about 2km from the station.

Council have held a Community Purposes lease over the premises since September 1990. Council have not been successful in securing a community group to utilise the premises.

The premises are subject to continuing vandalism and are in an advanced state of deterioration (see photographs).

CURRENT PROPOSAL:

Council General Manager Kevin Ryan has requested consent to relocate the premises to a site within the town's swimming pool complex. The premises would be restored and used as a shelter shed and change rooms. Council have not requested financial contribution from State Rail.

HERITAGE ASPECTS:

The Walgett Station opened in 1908 and saw its last passenger train in November 1983.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE S.R.A. 2 7 APR 1994 Establishing a Community Purposes lease was to assist the preservation of this heritage item, however, lack of community participation and the isolated location of the station have combined to result in continued deterioration.

The Council proposal will satisfy State Rail's objective of encouraging preservation of locally significant items by community groups.

Alternatively further deterioration would warrant demolition on safety grounds.

POLITICAL ASPECTS:

The Council have few items of heritage significance in their shire and are keen to preserve the station at a more useful location.

INSPECTION REPORT Railway Station Building – Walgett

To: Manager Planning and Regulation.

BACKGROUND

As requested, an inspection was carried out on 31st January 2008 to ascertain the extent of works and likely cost to relocate and renovate the original Walgett railway station building. A series of photos is available if required.

The building was relocated to it's present location some 10 years ago and it's condition has continued to deteriorate. The building is owned by Council having been donated by the NSW Railways and is currently stored on private land to the north of the town.

EXISTING STRUCTURE:

The building is constructed mainly of Cypress timber framing with shiplap external cladding in poor condition.

The timber framing appears to be in fair condition except for those areas which have been subject to a fire, and floor bearers which have been exposed to the weather or subjected to fatigue due to the uneven support of the building (on 44 gallon drums).

The corrugated iron roof appears to be in reasonable condition, however the front awning, gutters and downpipes are in need of replacement.

Flooring consists of chipboard in two rooms, with line over and of tongue and groove hardwood flooring in the central room. Considerable water damage has occurred to the chipboard flooring in one area of the building. Line coverings are beyond restoration.

Internal wall and ceiling linings consist of tongue and groove timber and asbestos cement sheeting. Asbestos cement sheeting has been severely damaged and will need replacement.

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ATTACHMENT B - HEALTH AND BUILDING SURVEYOR'S INSPECTION REPORT

RELOCATION AND REPAIR COSTS:

It is estimated that to relocate the building from it's present site to a more suitable location and to renovate the building to a usable condition would cost between \$95,000.00 and \$100,000.00;

The above estimates are approximations only, based on my knowledge of current costs.

In addition it is estimated that annual costs associated with maintenance and upkeep of the building would be in the vicinity of \$2,000.00 per annum.

These estimates do not include any costs associated with fitting out the building for a particular use.

RECOMMENDATION

It is my opinion that it would be more cost effective to construct a new purpose designed building than to relocate and repair this building.

Old Walgett Railway Station Building

Following the meeting between Mr Steven McLean, General Meeting, Mr Graham Hall, Heritage Officer, and members of the Walgett Historical Society, it was discussed that the Historical Society investigate ownership of the building, which it has done.

The Manager of RailCorp Land Titles, Mr Dunbar, forwarded a document dated in the 1980's (actual date is on the document at the Historical Society) formally donating the building to Walgett Shire Council for community purposes, signed by both the Walgett Shire Council and State Rail. Perhaps you have this document in your Legal Docs., if not we can supply a copy to you.

Recently a meeting was held in the Committee Room at the Council Chambers between the Administrator, Mr Smith, Former General Manager Mr Steven McLean, Manager Engineering Mr Alan Nelson and concerned members of the public about the possibility of reopening the Hot Bore Pool. There was discussion about reinstating the dressing shed at the pool. With this in mind, perhaps we could make a suggestion, that as Council already owns the Old Railway Station, it could make the ideal dressing shed (when restored) if placed on site. Cost of replacing the shed with a new shed could be deducted from any costs associated with replacing the old Railway Station within the fence confines of the pool. We have requested a quotation for restoration of the building and have been promised it will be made a priority and sent to the Historical Society.

Mr Graham Hall< Walgett Heritage Officer, has indicated that he is sure he could organise some funds over the next three years towards the restoration of the building.

We hope this suggestion appeals to you as a two in one action of Council, a historical building restored and also being utilised by the community as a dressing shed.

I refer to correspondence between Council and the Walgett District Historical Society concerning options for preserving the former Walgett Railway Station.

Society members and I met with the former General manager late last year to review the options for funding and location of the building. A copy of my paper, prepared in advance of that meeting, is attached, and should be read in conjunction with this memorandum.

It emerged at the meeting that a possible use for the building would be as an adjunct to the hot pool at the Walgett Swimming centre. This appears to me to be more viable than any previous options, and the former general manager appeared to share that view.

One issue which emerges is the ownership of the building. The Historical Society has now established that it is in fact the property of Council, and that it was acquired in order to facilitate its conservation. It might be noticed that the heritage Strategic Plan adopted by Council in 2003 and never rescinded, provides that Council will care for its own heritage items. It is unfortunate indeed that previous councils have not take action to conserve the building. It has now deteriorated, but can be saved.

The prime issue therefore is the cost, and finding the funds required. Council has its own and the Historical Society's estimates, both of \$100,000, to relocate and re-use the building. These appear reasonably accurate. The estimate prepared by Council's Building Surveyor includes the observation that construction of a new building would be more economical. That is undoubtedly correct. However if the proposed facility at the pool (or an alternative location) would have been required in any case, the cost of such new building could be set against the \$100,000 such that the real cost of preserving the Railway Station for its social and historical heritage significance would be reduced.

From a heritage perspective, the ideal solution would be for Council to budget the full cost and proceed with the work. However this would be a large capital item and may not be able to be accommodated.

It does seem feasible, however, to undertake the project in stages over several years, in conjunction with a community fund-raising program which perhaps the Historical Society could undertake.

ATTACHMENT D - HERITAGE ADVISER'S MEMORANDUM

The first stage would be to plan the final use, construct piers, relocate the building to the new site, and secure and weatherproof it. Repairs, painting, connection of services, fitting out and the construction of a platform could follow over say five years.

The building really does attract more community sentiment than most in Walgett. If it is not removed soon, it will continue to deteriorate and remains at risk of vandalism.

It is recommended that funds be set aside for the first stage outlined above, subject if desired to a formal agreement with the Historical Society undertake a fund-raising program.

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13. THE AUSTRALIAN OPAL CENTRE – LIGHTNING RIDGE

REPORTING SECTION: Planning and Regulatory Services

Summary:

A Development Application has been lodged to construct an opal and fossil museum at the Three Mile opal field, Lightning Ridge. It is recommended that the application be approved.

Discussion (including issues and background):

Lightning Ridge Opal and Fossil Centre Incorporated has lodged a Development Application to construct the Australian Opal Centre on Lot 1 in DP 1103508 at the Three Mile opal field, Lightning Ridge. The land is a special use Western Lands Lease (WLL 14607) for construction of an opal and fossil museum.

The site is located approximately three kilometres from the urban area of Lightning Ridge as shown in the figure below. Access will be from the Three Mile Road with approximately 1.4 kilometres of unsealed road to the site.

The proposed building includes a museum for public displays, a shop, café, offices and staff facilities, research library, workshop, cinema, storage and indoor garden.

The two storey building will be recessed into an excavated area approximately 28 metres by 90 metres by 11 metres deep.

The proposal includes on-site parking for 75 cars, 2 spaces for people with a disability and coach parking.

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


Figure 1 Location of proposed Australian Opal Centre

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


Figure 2 - Proposed Site Plan




Figure 3 - Level 1 Floor Plan

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


Figure 4 - Level 2 Floor Plan




Figure 5 - Section Plan

STATUTORY MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION:

79C (1)(a)(i) Provisions of any environmental planning instrument.

Under the Interim Development Order No. 1 – Shire of Walgett 1968 (IDO) the land is located within "Non-urban 1(a)" zone. Development consent is required to permit the development.

79C (1)(a)(ii) Provisions of any draft environmental planning instrument that is or has been placed on public exhibition.

Not applicable. There are no relevant draft environmental planning instruments on public display.

79C (1)(a)(iii) Any development control plan.

Not applicable. There are no current Development Control Plans in Walgett Shire, however the Walgett Shire Council Off-Street Parking Code was used as a guide to determining parking requirements.

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79C(1)(a)(iiia) Any planning agreement that has been entered into under section 93F, or any draft planning agreement that a developer has offered to enter into under section 93F Not applicable. No planning agreement has been proposed.

79C(1)(a)(iv) The regulations.

Section 92 and 92A of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000 prescribe additional matters for consideration (see comments below).

79C (1)(b) Likely impacts of the development, including environmental impacts on both the natural and built environments, and social and economic impacts in the locality.

Current land use on surrounding land is predominantly opal mining, residences located on mineral claims and Western Lands leases for residential purposes.

The proposal is designed to blend in with the surrounding land uses. Bulk and scale of the building will be minimised by recessing into an excavation.

Likely environmental impacts:

*Increase in traffic volume may impact on neighbours by the generation of dust on the unsealed portion of the access road. The potential for dust can be mitigated by development consent conditions.

*Increase in noise from activities taking place within the development, however this is expected to be minimised by the building being recessed into the 11 metre deep excavation.

*Increase in noise from traffic movements and parking.

*The site is currently significantly degraded by previous opal mining activity which is typical of the surrounding area. No threatened species were identified on the site and are unlikely given that the density and diversity of native vegetation is quite low. Limited landscaping is proposed in order to retain the current character of the site and to blend with the surrounding locality. There is unlikely to be significant degradation arising from the development.

*Security lighting may cause unnecessary glare. It would be appropriate to impose a development consent condition requiring directional lighting that does not intrude on adjoining properties. No other significant adverse impacts on the natural or built environments are likely.

Likely Social and economic impacts:

The proposal has potential to significantly benefit the Lightning Ridge community through: *provision of employment, (estimated to be 20 full time jobs in the first year of operation).

*demand for future goods and services,

*increased promotion of the opal industry

* increased revenue from visitors.

Existing tourist and service businesses in Lightning Ridge and the whole of the Walgett Shire, are likely to benefit should the development generate a significant increase in visitors to the area.

79C (1)(c) Suitability of the site for the development.

MINING: The site has been significantly disturbed by previous opal mining operations.

Appropriate foundations and construction methods would minimise the potential for subsidence from previous underground workings. It would be appropriate to impose conditions requiring the developer to ensure that existing mine workings do not adversely affect the building.

PUBLIC ROAD ACCESS: The development site will be accessed via the Three Mile Road which is maintained by Walgett Shire Council, then mining tracks from the end of the road to the site. The mining tracks pass through Permissive Occupancy 1985/19 held by Council for the purpose of opal mining administration. These tracks are predominantly maintained by the Lightning Ridge Miners Association. The department of Lands has stated that it intends to convert the Permissive Occupancy to a Crown Reserve with one of the purposes being "public access". This will ensure ongoing access for the public to the development site.

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There are no official records on the extent of underground mining at Lightning Ridge. Anecdotal evidence obtained from Council's Director of Planning and Regulation, Matthew Goodwin, indicates he believes that:

- 1. In the last 18 years there have been no ground subsidence events within 100 metres of the proposed access tracks
- 2. It is unlikely that there has been mining activity along the access track of a sufficient intensity and extent that it would be likely to result in subsidence.

OVERALL: There are no other known environmental or other factors that make the site unsuitable for the proposed development.

79C (1)(d) Submissions made in accordance with the Act or the regulations.

Not applicable. Under the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 the proposal is local development with no opportunity for submissions under the act or regulations.

79C (1)(e) The public interest.

Landowners within a 500 metre radius of the development site were notified of the Development Application and no objections were received. However three submissions were received in support of the proposed development.

The following matters must also be considered by Council in accordance with the respective clauses of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000 when making a decision on any Development Application.

92(1)(a) Coastal areas - Not Applicable.

92(1)(b) Demolition - Not applicable, no demolition work is proposed.

93 Fire safety and other considerations - Fire schedule attached to conditions of consent.

94 Consent authority may require buildings to be upgraded - Not applicable.

94A Fire safety and other considerations applying to temporary structures - Not applicable.

95 Deferred commencement consent - Not applicable.

97A Fulfilment of BASIX commitments - Not applicable.

CONCLUSION

Given that the proposed development is permissible with development consent, is for a community based enterprise that has potential to significantly benefit the Lightning Ridge community (and the whole shire) and is symbiotic with the surrounding opal mining land use, approval of the proposal appears to be appropriate.

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PRESCRIBED CONDITIONS

The Environmental Planning and Assessment Regulation 2000 prescribes the following conditions of development consent.

97A Fulfilment of BASIX commitments

- (1) This clause applies:
 - (a) on and from 1 July 2004, to all land within the initial BASIX area, and
 - (b) on and from 1 July 2005, to all land within New South Wales.
- (2) This clause applies to all development:
 - that involves the erection (but not the alteration, enlargement, extension or relocation) of a BASIX-affected building, or
 - (b) that involves a change-of-building-use-by-which-a-building-becomes a BASIX affected building.
- (3) For the purposes of section 80A (11) of the Act, fulfilment of the commitments listed in each relevant BASIX certificate for development to which this clause applies is a prescribed condition of any development consent for the development.

98. Compliance with Building Code of Australia and insurance requirements under the Home Building Act 1989

- (1) For the purposes of section 80A (11) of the Act, the following conditions are prescribed in relation to a development consent for development that involves any building work:
 - that the work must be carried out in accordance with the requirements of the Building Code of Australia,
 - (b) in the case-of-residential building work for which the Home Building Act 1989 requires there to be a contract of insurance in force in accordance with Part 6 of that Act, that such a contract of insurance is in force before any building work authorised to be carried out by the consent commences.
- (2) This clause does not apply:
 - (a) to the extent to which an exemption is in force under clause 187 or 188, subject to the terms of any condition or requirement referred to in clause 187 (6) or 188 (4), or

98A. Erection of signs

- (1) For the purposes of section 80A (11) of the Act, the requirements of subclauses (2) and (3) are prescribed as conditions of a development consent for development that involves any building work, subdivision work or demolition work.
- (2) A sign must be erected in a prominent position on any site on which building work, subdivision work or demolition work is being carried out:
 - showing the name, address and telephone number of the principal certifying authority for the work, and
 - (b) showing the name of the principal contractor (if any) for any building work and a telephone number on which that person may be contacted outside working hours, and
 - (c) stating that unauthorised entry to the work site is prohibited.
- (3) Any such sign is to be maintained while the building work, subdivision work or demolition work is being carried out, but must be removed when the work has been completed.

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- (4) This clause does not apply in relation to building work, subdivision work or demolition work that is carried out inside an existing building that does not affect the external walls of the building.
- (5) This clause does not apply in relation to Crown building work that is certified, in accordance with section 116G of the Act, to comply with the technical provisions of the State's building laws.
- (6) This clause applies to a development consent granted before 1 July 2004 only if the building work, subdivision work or demolition work involved had not been commenced by that date.

 Note. Principal certifying authorities and principal contractors must also ensure that signs required by this clause are erected and maintained (see clause 227A which currently imposes a maximum penalty of \$1,100).

98B. Notification of Home Building Act 1989 requirements

- (1) For the purposes of section 80A (11) of the Act, the requirements of this clause are prescribed as conditions of a development consent for development that involves any residential building work within the meaning of the Home Building Act 1989.
- (2) Residential building work within the meaning of the Home Building Act 1989 must not be carried out unless the principal certifying authority for the development to which the work-relates (not-being-the council) has given the council written notice of the following information:

CONDITIONS IMPOSED BY COUNCIL

The following development consent conditions are imposed by Council.

Gen 010.

It is possible that a covenant may affect the land, which is subject to this consent. The granting of this consent does not necessarily override any covenant. You should seek legal advice regarding the effect of any covenants that may affect the land.

Reason: To avoid breaching the requirements of any covenant.

Gen 020.

Any future development on the subject site or use of the subject land in a manner inconsistent with this development consent (approval) will require separate development consent to be obtained from council in writing prior to the commencement of any work.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.

Gen 030

Council is to be immediately informed in writing if arrangements for work are changed.

Reason: To enable Council to maintain an accurate record of approvals granted.

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Gen 040.

Prior to commencing any building works a Construction Certificate must be obtained from Council to authorise construction.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.

Gen 055

In addition to plans, elevations and sections, the application for a Construction Certificate is to include the following information:

- (a) The location of all fire safety, smoke detection and alarm systems together with a installation details and,
- (b) Details of the proposed method of termite treatment showing that compliance will be achieved with AS 3660,
- (c) All structural details including specifications, tie-down and bracing plans and slab design details.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

Gen 056

Where it is proposed to use performance based (alternative) solutions for compliance with the Building Code of Australia, the developer is to provide detailed evidence of compliance together with all necessary calculations and expert witness statements.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

Gen 065.

The use or occupation of the premises is not to commence until such time as the terms of Development Consent have been complied with and a final occupation certificate issued.

Reason: To restrict the use of the premises until the terms of the Development Consent have been complied with so as to ensure the health and safety of occupants of the building

APPROVED PLANS

Pln 010.

The development shall be implemented in accordance with:

- (a) All documentation and correspondence submitted by the applicant, or their agents, in support of the Development Application,
- (b) the details set out on the plans approved and stamped by authorised officers of Council, except as amended by the conditions of this development consent.

Reason: To ensure that the development proceeds in the manner proposed by the applicant and approved by Council.

SITE PROTECTION, FENCING AND LANDSCAPING

Fen 010.

Details of any boundary fencing and landscaping works are to be submitted to Council for approval prior to commencement of works.

Reason: To ensure the appearance of the development is sympathetic with the existing landscape.

Fen 015

A security fence is to be erected around the site whilst construction is in progress.

Reason: To prevent access to the site by unauthorised persons.

Fen 025

Appropriate barriers are to be established and maintained around all excavation works.

Reason: To minimise the risk of people falling down vertical faces.

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SITING/SETOUT

Set 015.

The developer of the property is to ensure that any building constructed is located within the confines of the lot.

Reason: To avoid any buildings being erected in a location where it would be inappropriate.

CONSTRUCTION

Con 010

The applicant shall ensure that noise pollution in minimised during the course of construction. The use of power tools and/or similar noise producing activities shall be limited to the following hours:-

Weekdays 7.00 a.m. to 7.00 p.m. Weekends & Public Holidays 8.00 a.m. to 7.00 p.m.

Reason: To ensure that public amenity is not unduly affected by noise.

Con 020.

All works are to be executed in a good and workmanlike manner and all materials are to be installed as per manufacturers' instructions and any applicable Australian Standards.

Reason: To ensure that the building work is completed in accordance with the approval and is in a safe and healthy condition for use by occupants.

Con 030.

The builder shall provide a temporary sanitary service to the building site before building operations are commenced.

Reason: To provide effective sanitation of the site during building construction.

Con 045.

All construction materials, sheds, skip bins, spoil, temporary water closets etc, shall be kept wholly within the property and not placed on public land.

Reason: To preserve the amenity of the locality.

Con 070.

All footings and/or slabs shall be constructed as per engineer's details.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

Con 080.

All timber framing shall comply with the NSW Timber Framing Manual and the Building Code of Australia.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

Con 090.

All steel framing shall comply with Part B1 of the Building Code of Australia and associated standards.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

Con 110.

Engineer's detail of the roof trusses with a truss layout plan, are to be submitted and approved by Council prior to any roof construction work commencing.

Reason: To ensure structural efficiency of the roof trusses.

Con 120.

All glass installation shall comply with the requirements of Australian Standard 1288 and 2047 as applicable. The installer shall provide certification that the glazing complies with the requirements of AS 1288 and AS 2047 immediately following installation.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

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Con 130.

All wet areas are to be waterproofed in accordance with Australian Standard 3740.

Reason: To ensure that the waterproofing of the wet areas comply with the relevant Australian Standards and the Building Code of Australia.

Con 140.

All external lightning is to be positioned and directed so as to prevent the intrusion of light to the adjoining premises.

Reason: To prevent the intrusion of light onto adjoining premises.

Con 205.

The door to fully enclosed sanitary compartments must:

- (a) Slide, or
- (b) Open outward, or
- (c) Be readily removable from the outside of the compartment.

NOTE: If lift-off hinges are used adequate space is to be provided between the top of the door and the doorway to allow the door to be removed from the hinges.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

Con 210.

All electrical work must be carried out by a licensed electrician in accordance with Australian Standard 3000 – SAA Wiring Rules and Australian Standard 3002.

Reason: To ensure compliance with Australian Standards.

DISABLED ACCESS

Dis 010.

Disabled access and facilities are to be provided in accordance with the Building Code of Australia and Australian Standard 1428.1 to 4. Design for Access and Mobility - New building work.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia and the Disability-Discrimination Act 1992.

Dis 040.

At least two (2) disabled car parking spaces shall be provided within the proposed car park. The parking spaces are to have minimum width of 3.8m, with the signage and marking complying with the requirements of AS 2890.1-2004. A continuous accessible path of travel complying with the requirements of AS 1428.1 is to be provided from the parking space to the building.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia..

TERMITE CONTROL

Ter 010.

Treatment against termites is to be carried out in accordance with AS 3660.1. Upon completion of the selected method of treatment:

- (a) a certificate is to be issued to Council by the licensed installer of the system certifying that the system installed is in accordance with the specific requirements of Council and AS3660.1.
- (b) A durable notice must be permanently fixed within the meter box indicating:
 - The method of protection
 - The date of installation of the system
 - Where a chemical barrier is used, it's life expectancy as listed on the National Registration Authority label and
 - The need to maintain and inspect the system on a regular basis.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia.

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VENTILATION

Ven 010.

Provide an approved system of mechanical ventilation in accordance with the requirements of Part F4.5(b) of the Building Code of Australia.

Reason: To provide adequate ventilation and to ensure that there are no adverse affects on the occupants or the building.

WATER, SEWER, AND STORMWATER

Plu 015.

Before any plumbing, stormwater or sewer drainage works are commenced an Activity Application and Annexure accompanied by a diagram of proposed works and the appropriate fees is to be submitted and approval granted in accordance with the requirements of Section 68 of the Local Government Act 1993.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Local Government Act 1993, Council's On-Site Sewage Management Guidelines, Australian Standard 3500.1-4 and the NSW Code of Practice, Plumbing and Drainage-2006.

Plu 080.

All plumbing and drainage works are to be completed in accordance with Australian Standard AS/NZS 3500-2003.1-4 *Plumbing and drainage* and the NSW Code of Practice, Plumbing and Drainage-2006.

Reason: To ensure that plumbing and drainage works are completed in a professional manner.

Plu 105

Reticulated water is not available to the site. The developer is to engage the services of an accredited Hydraulic Engineer for preparation of water storage and reticulation details, for fire services, external use and potable supply. The system design must include details of tanking, pumping methods, tank cleaning and filtration required to ensure maintenance of potable water.

Reason: To ensure water supply system is suitable for it's intended uses.

Plu 106

Arrangements are to be made for the regular testing of the potable water supply to ensure compliance with the Australian Drinking Water Guidelines-2004.

Reason: To ensure that water services are maintained in a healthy condition.

Plu 107

An On-site waste water (sewerage) management system must be established and maintained on the site to catch and hold all waste water in accordance with relevant Australian Standards and AS 3500-2003 *Plumbing and Drainage*. Details of the proposed system are to be submitted to Council for approval before the commencement of any construction.

Reason: To ensure that the facilities are maintained at a level of hygiene appropriate for their approved use and to comply with Section 68 of the Local Government Act 1993, Council's On-site Sewerage Management Guidelines.

Plu 135.

The land surrounding the completed building is to have a drainage system so that:-

- (a) surface water is diverted clear of structures on site; and
- (b) which will not create any nuisance to adjoining properties.

Reason: To minimise the potential for detrimental impacts to buildings or neighbouring properties.

Plu 150.

All new heated water installations shall, at the outlet of all sanitary fixtures used primarily for personal hygiene (shower and hand basins) deliver heated water not exceeding 50° C.

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Notes:

- Temperature control devices require routine maintenance and performance testing. Information on maintenance can be found in AS 4032.2
- It is the property owner's responsibility to ensure that the routine maintenance is carried out.

Reason: Temperature limits are required to minimise the risk of scalding.

Plu 190.

A minimum of 10000 litres water storage capacity is to be reserved in the main water storage tank for fire fighting purposes. The main water storage tank is to be fitted with a 65mm Stortz fitting and valve and pump set capable of being connected to the rural fire service equipment.

Reason: To ensure a sufficient supply of water for fighting purposes.

PARKING & TRAFFIC

Par 015.

The off street car parking area is to be constructed of all weather material and maintained so that it is trafficable, free of pot holes, corrugations, erosion and does not interfere with stormwater runoff. Parking spaces are to be clearly marked to comply with AS 2890.1-2004, *Parking Facilities. Part 1*. *Off-street car parking*.

Reason: So adequate off street parking is provided for the development and it is maintained in an appropriate manner.

Par 030.

Parking facilities for people with disabilities are to comply with Part D3.5 of Building Code of Australia and the requirements of Australian Standard 2890.1 – Parking Facilities – Off Street Car Parking.

Reason: To enable use of the car space by people with disabilities and to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Building Code of Australia.

Par 040.

All loading and unloading activities relating to the use of the premises are to be carried out wholly within the site.

Reason: To ensure the amenity of the area is maintained and minimise the potential for interference with traffic flow on public streets.

ACCESS ROADS

Rds 035.

Road access to the site shall be from "Three Mile Road".

Reason - To ensure that road access is provided via a designated route.

Rds 036

If subsequently requested by the General Manager of Walgett Shire Council, the developer shall take such steps that are specified to minimise the generation of dust from the unsealed portion of the access road.

Reason: Significant traffic movements may generate significant additional dust from the unsealed portion of the road. To reduce the risk of nuisance or health problems, Council may require the developer to take action to address this issue.

Rds 037

The developer is to take all necessary actions during construction to minimise the creation of dust by vehicles accessing the site.

Reason: To ensure that the effects of dust on the surrounding properties is minimised.

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ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Env 005

The developer must keep a legible record of all complaints made to the developer, or any employee or agent of the developer, in relation to dust, noise, light or any activity to which this development consent relates. The record must be kept for a period of 3 years after the complaint was made and be available on demand to authorised officers of Council. Details to be recorded as follows:

- (a) the date and time of the complaint;
- (b) the method by which the complaint was made;
- (c) any personal details of the complainant which were provided by the complainant or, if no such details were provided, a note to that effect;
- (d) the nature of the complaint;
- (e) the action taken by the developer in relation to the complaint, including any follow-up contact with the complainant; and
- (f) if no action was taken by the developer, the reason why no action was taken.

Reason: To ensure that complaints are recorded, considered and dealt with in an appropriate manner.

Env 010.

Run-off and erosion controls must be implemented before construction, and maintained to prevent soil erosion, water pollution or the discharge of loose sediment on surrounding land, as follows:

- (a) divert uncontaminated run-off around cleared or disturbed areas,
- (b) erect a silt fence to prevent debris escaping into drainage systems or waterways,
- (c) stock pile topsoil, excavated material, construction and landscaping supplies and debris within the site.

Reason: To prevent pollution from detrimentally affecting the public or environment.

Env 040.

No increase or interference with the amenity of the area is to be created by reason of any process or operation on the premises causing the emission of noise, dust, smoke or any other pollution discharge.

Reason: To prevent pollution from detrimentally affecting the public or environment.

Env 050

Noise from the development (LA10) shall not exceed the background (LA90) by more than 5dB (A) at any time including any allowance for impulsiveness and tonal characteristics, when measured at the most affected residence.

Reason: To prevent the generation of a noise nuisance.

Env 065

Photovoltaic systems used on the premises must not cause glare that would have a detrimental impact upon surrounding premises.

Reason: To ensure protection of amenity of surrounding properties.

OPAL MINING DISTURBANCE

Min 015.

On completion of site excavation works, the developer must:

- (a) engage a suitably qualified and experienced geotechnical engineer to provide an evaluation report which asses whether there is evidence of significant prior mining activity which may have an impact on the integrity of the walls or foundations of the proposed building.
- (b) Provide a copy of the geotechnical engineer's evaluation report to Walgett Shire Council prior to the issue of a Construction Certificate and commencement of construction of the building.

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Reason: There are no official records of the extent of opal mine workings within the Lightning Ridge area. Voids and backfilled areas resulting from mining activity may have an adverse impact on building stability and public safety. Council accepts that for design reasons the void for the building must be excavated prior to finalisation of the building's structural design.

Min 025

If the geotechnical engineer's evaluation report shows that prior mining activity may have an impact on the integrity of the walls or foundations of the proposed building, then the developer must also:

- (a) Engage a suitably qualified and experienced structural engineer to document how stability issues associated with mining activity will be managed.
- (b) Provide a copy of the structural engineer's documentation to Walgett Shire Council prior to the commencement of construction.

Reason: Building design must be managed to ensure building stability and public safety.

PLAYGROUND

Pla 010.

Any playground equipment incorporated in the building shall comply with 'Australian Standard 4685.1-6 2004 Playground equipment safety requirements'.

Reason: To ensure that playground equipment is suitable for use by children.

PUBLIC ENTERTAINMENT

Pub 005.

If 'public entertainment' is to be conducted in the building or part thereof, then the developer is to ensure that the building complies with the Building Code of Australia. (Note: In particular, NSW Part 101 Places of Public Entertainment other than Temporary Structures and Drive in Theatres).

Reason: The application documentation indicates that the facility will include a "cinema", which is a place of public entertainment.

FOOD PREMISES

Foo 010.

The fit out and operations of the food premises must comply with the requirements of:

- (a) Food Safety Standards.
- (b) Australian Standard 4674-2004 Design Construction and Fit Out of Food Premises.
- (c) The NSW Food Act 2003.

Reason: To ensure that the building conforms to the relevant performance requirements of the Building Code of Australia and Food Act 2003.

Foo 020.

Plans and specifications showing floor layout and design of all food preparation, food service, food storage, dining area, garbage disposal area, construction and method of installation of all fittings and fixtures, together with floor, wall and ceiling finishes are required prior to Council issuing a Construction Certificate.

Reason: To comply with AS 4674 and Building Code of Australia.

Foo 030.

Arrangements are to be put in place by the developer for the collection, storage, and removal of garbage from site on a regular basis. All garbage is to be stored in animal proof containers screened from public view and situated so as not to cause a nuisance to the occupants of the building or neighbouring properties.

Reason: To maintain the amenity of the site and surrounds.

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Foo 040.

All commercial kitchens must be provided with a kitchen exhaust hood that complies with the provisions of AS/NZS 1668.1 and AS 1668.2 as applicable.

Reason: To ensure compliance with the Building Code of Australia..

INSPECTIONS

The applicant is to advise Council of the name and address of the body nominated to act as the Principal Certifying Authority, on the "Notice of Commencement Form" forty eight (48) hours prior to work commencing.

Inspections at the completion of stages as indicated below are required to be carried out by the Principal Certifying Authority. **Work must not proceed past any inspection stage until approval is given by the Certifier.**

Critical Stage Inspections - Class 9

- At the commencement of the building work, and
- On set-out of the works and prior to any excavation.
- Footings after excavation and before pouring of any concrete
- Footings/piers and slab after placement of moisture barrier, reinforcement and prior to pouring of any concrete.
- Underfloor drainage prior to pouring concrete.
- On completion of blockwork/brickwork and prior to core filling.
- On completion of framing prior to covering.
- On completion of plumbing pipe installation (hot & cold water service) prior to covering.
- On completion of waterproofing of wet areas and prior to commencement of wall and floor tiling.
- Prior to covering any sewer or stormwater drainage pipe work and connection points.
- First floor slabs after placement of reinforcement and prior to the pouring of any concrete.
- Installation of sewerage system and effluent lines prior to backfilling.
- All external sewer drainage prior to covering in trenches, clearly visible and under hydrostatic test.
- Final Inspection before use of installed equipment.
- Final Inspection of Fire service installations
- Prior to covering any stormwater drainage connections, and
- After the building work has been completed and prior to any occupation certificate being issued in relation to the building.

Reason: Occupation Certificates cannot be issued if the Principal Certifying Authority does not carry out the designated inspections, and to ensure compliance with the approved plans.

FIRE SAFETY

Fir 060.

Fire Safety Equipment as per the attached Fire Safety Schedule, shall be installed and maintained on the premises and be the subject of the required annual Fire Safety Statement

15 July 2008 Page 153 of 207

FIRE SAFETY SCHEDULE -

The following fire safety services are to be installed in the building;

- (a) Fire Hose Reels complying with the requirements of Part E1.4 of the building code of Australia and AS 1121 "Fire Hose Reels", and AS 2441 "Fire Hose Reels Installation".
- (b) Portable Fire Extinguishers complying with the requirements of Part E1.6 of the Building Code of Australia and AS 2444 "Fire Extinguishers Selection".
- (c) Exit Signs complying with the requirements of Part E4.5 of the Building Code of Australia and AS 2293. "Emergency Evacuation Lighting". Such lighting to be located at each designated exit from the buildings.
- (d) Emergency Lighting complying with the requirements of Part E4.2 of the Building Code of Australia and AS 2293.1 "Emergency Evacuation Lighting".
- (e) Fire Hydrants and On-site Pump Set complying with Part E1.3 of the Building Code of Australia and AS2419.1 Fire Hydrant Installations.
- (f) Automatic Smoke Detection and Alarm System complying with the requirements of Specification E2.2a (Clauses 3 or 4 as applicable) of the Building Code of Australia and AS 1670.1 and AS 3786.
- (g) Fire Sprinkler System complying with Part E1.5 and Part H1 of the Building Code of Australia and AS 2118.1 Automatic Fire Sprinkler Systems.

On completion of the building and at least once in each period of twelve months following completion, the owner shall cause council to be furnished with Certification that each essential fire service installed in the building is capable of performing to a standard not less than they were originally required to achieve and perform to a standard not less than that determined using the corresponding Part I.1 Building Code of Australia provisions.

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14. ALCOHOL FREE ZONES

Summary:

Alcohol free zones in the towns of Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri are due to expire on 30 August 2008. This report recommends that Council resolve to re-establish the zones prior to their expiry.

Discussion (including issues and background):

Alcohol free zones in the towns of Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri are due to expire on 30 August 2008. At a meeting held on 20 May 2008 Walgett Shire Council resolved as follows.

106/08 Alcohol Free Zones

RESOLUTIONS:

It was resolved on the motion of the Administrator that Walgett Shire Council resolve to:

- Undertake consultation in accordance with Ministerial Guidelines on Alcohol Free Zones, issued by the Department of Local Government, about re-establishing the existing alcohol free zones in Walgett, Collarenebri and Lightning Ridge for another three years.
- 2. Use the draft notice regarding "Alcohol Free Zones proposed for Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri", as attached to this report, for the required consultation.

CARRIED

Notification of the proposal to establish an alcohol free zone was undertaken by:

- Sending details to all Aboriginal groups, ethnic groups, liquor licensees and Police stations that are located in or near the proposed zones (as listed in Attachment A).
- Sending details to the NSW Anti-Discrimination Board.
- Advertising the proposal in the Walgett Spectator on 21/5/2008, 28/5/2008 and 11/6/2008.
- Advertising the proposal in the Lightning Ridge News on 22/5/2008, 29/5/2008, 5/6/2008, 12/6/2008 and 19/6/2008.

Submissions were received from the Anti-Discrimination Board of NSW, the Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service and the NSW Police. Each submission has been reproduced as attachments to this report (Attachments B, C and D).

The key thrust of the Anti-Discrimination Board's objection (Attachment B) is that the proposed zones are "inconsistent with the Ministerial Guidelines on the Establishment of Alcohol Free Zones" because "they appear to extend over the majority of the towns". However, both the guidelines and the Local Government Act 1993 do not prohibit alcohol free zones over the larger parts of towns. The guidelines only suggest "that it would usually be inappropriate to zone the greater part of a town" "as alcohol-free".

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Section 644A (3) and (4) of the Local Government Act 1993 requires that Council "consider all representations and submissions" received in relation to alcohol free zone proposals. The Board, or any other party, does not have to the power to veto an alcohol free zone proposal via their submissions. Ultimately Walgett Shire Council is the determining authority, provided it makes it decision in accordance with the ministerial guidelines and the Local Government Act 1993.

The submission from the Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service notes that its directors "endorse the continuation of the zoning of Alcohol-free areas within the Walgett Shire" (Attachment C).

The submission from the NSW Police (Attachment D) supports the existing zone boundaries in Walgett and Collarenebri. It also requests that the zone in Lightning Ridge be extended to cover all "public areas". If this is not supported by Council, it seeks:

- To extend around the licensed premises (Hotel) located at the intersection of Morilla Street and Onyx Street, Lightning Ridge, so as to surround the establishment.
- To extend beyond the area bounded by Nettleton Drive and Opal Streets, Lightning Ridge.

Issues that arise in relation to the submission from the NSW Police include:

- Alcohol free zones can only be applied to car parks and streets.
- Ongoing opposition from the Anti-Discrimination Board to applying zones that cover the majority of a town.
- Extending the zone to over public streets near the Hotel located at the intersection of Morilla and Onyx Streets appears appropriate, and is unlikely to generate significant or well founded opposition.

Ultimately there appears to be general community support for the proposed alcohol free zones given that:


- The NSW Police Service applied for the zones.
- No objections were received from any local residents or groups during public consultation.
- The Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service endorses the proposal.

The following steps remain outstanding in the process to establish alcohol free zones in Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri:


- 1. The Ministerial Guidelines for alcohol free zones require that Council "give proper consideration to any representations, submissions or objections received and as a result may amend or withdraw a proposal to establish an alcohol-free zone" (page 6).
- 2. After complying with the above procedures, a Council may, by resolution, adopt a proposal to establish an alcohol free zone. The resolution establishes the zone.
- 3. Council must then inform any interested parties, including the applicant, the Anti-Discrimination Board, the local Police Patrol Commander, officer in charge of the local police station and affected liquor licensees.

The extent of the proposed alcohol free zones is shown in the diagrams below of Collarenebri and Walgett. For Lightning Ridge the area proposed during public consultation is shown plus an area that could be justifiably added to the zone (located in Onyx St near a hotel).



Financial Implications:

There will be a cost to renew existing signs, and some additional signs may also be required.

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Recommendations:

That Walgett Shire Council resolve to:

- 1. Note the written representations received from the Anti-Discrimination Board of NSW, the Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service and the NSW Police on the proposed alcohol free zones.
- 2. Establish alcohol free zones in Walgett and Collarenebri over the areas currently covered by Alcohol Free Zones, as shown in the maps included with this report.
- 3. Establish an alcohol free zone in Lightning Ridge over the existing area plus an additional area within Onyx Street near the hotel, as shown in the map included with this report.
- 4. Write to the Anti-Discrimination Board of NSW and state that:
 - a. Council notes the Board's objection to the establishment of alcohol free zones in Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri on the basis that it believes that the proposed zones are inconsistent with the Ministerial Guidelines on Alcohol Free Zones issued by the Department of Local Government, 1995.
 - b. Council received two other submissions regarding the proposed zones. One from the Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service noted that its directors "endorse the continuation of the zoning of Alcohol-free areas within the Walgett Shire". Another from the NSW Police supported the existing zones in Walgett and Collarenebri, as well as proposing an extension to the Lightning Ridge zone.
 - c. Council observes that both the guidelines and the Local Government Act 1993 do not prohibit alcohol free zones over the larger parts of towns. The guidelines only suggest "that it would usually be inappropriate to zone the greater part of a town" "as alcohol-free". The obvious inference is that the guidelines accept that unusual circumstances may require the greater part of a town to be established as an alcohol free zone.
 - d. Compared to the majority of towns in NSW, unusual circumstances do exist in Walgett, Lightning Ridge and Collarenebri with regard to the frequency, extent and repercussions of alcohol consumption in public streets and car parks.
 - e. It is quite clear that the zones are not inconsistent with the Ministerial Guidelines. In that context Walgett Shire Council resolved to establish alcohol free zones in Walgett and Collarenebri over the areas that it proposed. In Lightning Ridge it resolved to make a slight increase in the area of the zone.
- 5. Inform the local Police Patrol Commander, officer in charge of the local police stations, affected liquor licensees and Walgett Aboriginal Medical Service that a resolution has been made to establish the zones.

Proposed alcohol free zones in Walgett, Collarenebri and Lightning Ridge

I refer to your letter dated 20 May 2005.

You state that Walgett Shire Council (the Council) proposes to establish alcohol free zones in Walgett, Collarenebri and Lightning Ridge and you have invited submissions or objections on the proposal from the Board.

I have reviewed the maps enclosed with your letter and note that in each instance, the proposed alcohol free zone appears to extend over the majority of the towns. On the basis that the area appears excessive and accordingly, inconsistent with the *Ministerial Guidelines on the Establishment of Alcohol Free Zones* (the Guidelines), the Board does not support Council's proposal.

This issue has previously been the subject of correspondence in 2002 between the Council, the Minister for Local Government and the Board in regard to the proposed establishment of an alcohol free zone in Collarenebri.

By letter dated 20 December 2002 the Board advised Council that the proposal appeared to be inconsistent with the Guidelines and accordingly, the Board objected to the creation of the zone as proposed. It appears that, notwithstanding the Board's concerns about possible breaches of the Guidelines, in February 2003 Council moved to establish the alcohol free zone in Collarenebri pursuant to the amended proposal as notified to the Board.

The current proposal for Collarencbri appears to be identical to that proposed and subsequently created in 2003. On that basis the Board does not support the proposed renewal of the zone. The proposals for alcohol free zones in Walgett and Lightning Ridge appear similarly flawed and not in accordance with the Guidelines.

The Guidelines state:

"Generally an alcohol-free zone should be as small as is possible...

Alcohol-free zones should primarily be located to outlets supplying alcohol where drinkers congregate. In the absence of such an outlet a zone should be considered only in exceptional circumstances.

It is not appropriate to establish an entire council area, or a substantial part of that area as an alcohol free zone. Similarly, it would usually be inappropriate to zone the greater part of a town, suburb or urban area as alcohol-free."

To date, no information has been provided by the Council about why the circumstances in Collarenebri (and Walgett and Lightning Ridge) are so exceptional that Council believes it is justified in not complying with the Guidelines.

The Board is of the view that the Guidelines should be followed in all respects. Council should not regard alcohol-free zones as the primary measure to ameliorate anti-social, alcohol-related activity in the community but rather as part of a range of measures designed to address this problematic issue.

Further, the Guidelines state that where a council proposes to re-establish an alcohol free zone, the council is to have regard to the previous zoning and should carefully consider the factors that originally supported a zoning, the reasons for success or otherwise of the previous zoning and other additional matters.

The Board does not support the current proposals by Council and has written to the Minister for Local Government, the Honourable Tony Kelly MLC, about the matter. A copy of that letter is enclosed for your information.

Proposed alcohol free zones - Walgett Shire Council

I refer to the above issue and what appears to be a breach of the Ministerial Guidelines on Alcohol Free Zones (the Guidelines) by Walgett Shire Council.

As you are aware, councils which are listed in Appendix 2 to the Guidelines are required to send the Anti-Discrimination Board a copy of proposals to establish an alcohol-free zone and give the Board 40 days to make representations or objections about the proposal.

On 20 May 2005 Walgett Shire Council (the Council) wrote to the Board advising of its intention to establish alcohol free zones in the towns of Walgett, Collarenebri and Lightning Ridge. The maps provided by Council indicate that the proposed alcohol free zones cover the majority of each township area.

I note from the Board's files that the apparently excessive area of the proposed zone for Collarenebri was the subject of correspondence between the Board, the Council and the previous Minister for Local Government in 2002.

In response to a notification from the Council about the proposed zone in Collarenbri, the Board wrote to the Hon Harry Woods MP on 12 November 2002 outlining its objections and drawing to the Minister's attention the apparent breach of the Guidelines. It appears that Council nonetheless established the zone as proposed.

The Board again draws to the attention of your office what appears to be a breach of the Guidelines by the Council in its proposals to renew the established alcohol free zone in Collarenebri and re-establish alcohol free zones in Walgett and Lightning Ridge which will cover, effectively, the whole of the towns.

You may recall that the Board has recently drawn your attention to a similar issue in regard to proposals by the Council of the Shire of Bourke and earlier, in regard to a proposal by Moree Plains Shire Council.

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ATTACHMENT B - Submission regarding Alcohol free zone proposal

In response to the Board's letter about Moree Plains Shire Council's proposal, you wrote to the Board on 16 November 2004 attaching correspondence from the Department's Director General, Garry Payne, to Moree Plains Shire Council expressing concern about its proposal and drawing its attention to the relevant aspects of the Guidelines and the potential effect of Council failing to comply with those Guidelines.

As you are aware, the Guidelines state:

"Generally an alcohol-free zone should be as small as is possible...

Alcohol-free zones should primarily be located to outlets supplying alcohol where drinkers congregate. In the absence of such an outlet a zone should be considered only in exceptional circumstances.

It is not appropriate to establish an entire council area, or a substantial part of that area as an alcohol free zone. Similarly, it would usually be inappropriate to zone the greater part of a town, suburb or urban area as alcohol-free."

The Board reiterates its view that the creation of alcohol free zones should not be viewed by local councils as the primary method to address alcohol related, anti-social behaviour in a community. I also note that no information has been provided by the Council about why the circumstances in Collarenebri (and Walgett and Lightning Ridge) are so exceptional that Council believes it is justified in not complying with the Guidelines.

The Board is concerned that the zoning of such extensive areas as 'alcohol free' may lead to increased tension between police and members of the local community. It is for this reason that the Board draws to your attention Walgett Shire Council's apparent non-compliance with this aspect of the Guidelines.

The Board has written to the Council expressing its concerns about its proposal. I enclose, for your consideration, copies of the following:

- the Council's letter of 20 May 2005 to the Board; and
- the Board's letter in response.

16. PESTICIDE RESIDUE PIT AT THE WALGETT AERODROME

REPORTING SECTION: Planning and Regulatory Services

AUTHOR: Matthew Goodwin - Director Planning & Regulatory Services

Summary:

Recently a Remediation Action Plan was prepared for the pesticide residue pit at the Walgett Aerodrome. This report recommends that Council proceed with a project to excavate the contaminated soil from the pit and dispose of it at the Walgett Waste Depot in accordance with the Remediation Action Plan.

Discussion (including issues and background):

Prior to 1999 Walgett Shire Council established a wash down and storage facility at the Walgett Aerodrome for use by aerial agricultural spraying operators. A component of the facility was a holding dam where water contaminated by pesticide residues during the washing down process was held in a small earth pond and allowed to evaporate. The facility is located on land owned by Walgett Shire Council (Lot 11 DP 851,116).

Use of the facility ceased in 1999 after numerous complaints were received by Walgett Shire Council and the Environment Protection Authority (now Department of Environment and Climate Change) about noxious smells emanating from the pond and chemicals being dispersed from planes.

Searches of Council records have failed to locate any evidence of:

- Development consent being applied for, or granted, for the facility.
- Any contracts or agreements between Walgett Shire Council and parties that used the facility.

The pit is presently lined with wood chips to absorb chemical seepage and reduce odour problems. Prior to lining the pit early in 2002, especially during warm weather, there were numerous complaints lodged with Council about odour and illness issues perceived to originate from the pit. Since the application of the wood chip lining there has not been any formal complaints.

Walgett Shire Council subsequently engaged a specialist environmental assessment company to determine the extent and nature of any contamination on the site. The company engaged, URS, provided council with a document titled "Final Report – Site Investigation and Management, Walgett Airport, NSW", dated 9 July 2003.

That report provided an assessment of two options for addressing the contamination in line with current regulatory requirements. Those options were:

- Excavation and disposal (see section 5.1 of the report).
- Capping and containment (see section 5.2 of the report).

The report noted more advantages with the first option, hence the following recommendation (section 4.6):

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Whilst the pesticide-impacted soil does not necessarily pose any environmental or human health risk under the present conditions, it is recommended that the material be excavated and disposed to a suitable landfill, thereby avoiding any future land development constraints and avoiding potential future odour issues (currently managed via layer of mulch acting as a biofilter.

The report also noted that the contaminated soil could only be disposed of at a licensed land fill (section 5.1.2). After considering the URS report, Walgett Shire Council made the following resolution at a meeting held on 8 March 2004:

RESOLUTION:

It was resolved, Moved Clr J Treweeke, Seconded Clr R Hewlett that Council investigate seeking a licence from the Environment Protection Authority for the Walgett rubbish depot, or another site within the Shire so that the contaminated material associated with the pesticide residue pit at the Walgett Aerodrome can be legally disposed of at the rubbish depot.

Carried.

Subsequently the Environment Protection Authority granted a licence for the Walgett Waste Depot on 20 June 2006. Licence conditions imposed a requirement for a geotechnical assessment of the soil permeability and the establishment of groundwater monitoring bores. A hydrogeological investigation was undertaken in January 2007 by CM Jewell & Associates Pty Ltd which indicated that the soils at the waste depot have very low permeability and are suitable for containing leachate. As noted in another report within this business paper, ongoing ground water and leachate testing and monitoring is required for the Walgett Waste Depot.

Specialist skills are required to progress the excavation and disposal of the contaminated soil from the site. Given that URS has knowledge of the pesticide residue pit site from its previous work there, it was engaged to prepare a scope of works and remediation action plan for the site. The purpose of the report was to allow Council to understand the type and extent of work required to excavate and dispose of the contaminated soil, as well as the legal and safety issues that need to be managed. On 18 June 2008 URS submitted its report to Council which is titled "Final Report – Remediation Action Plan - Former Crop Dusting Washdown Area, Walgett Airport, NSW".

A number of issues arise from the report, including:

- Previous testing indicated that the contaminated soil can be disposed of at a licensed land fill as solid waste. Further work could disclose material that cannot be disposed of at a licensed land fill and hence on site disposal may be required (Section 5.4).
- The area required to be excavated is about 330 square metres up to 0.5m deep (Section 6.2).
- Validation soil sampling will be required to confirm that all significant contamination has been removed (Section 8.1).
- Section 6.2 of the report indicates that the parties used to transport the contaminated soil away from the site "must be licensed to carry hazardous waste". This contrasted with section 5.1.2 of the previous URS site investigation report from 2003 which indicated that the soil could be disposed of as "solid waste" and hence there is an inference there is no need for licensed hauliers. A requirement to use licensed hauliers would probably have significant cost implications for the project, so this matter was raised with URS. Their response e-mail (Attachment A) indicates that unless the soil is classified as "restricted waste" or "hazardous waste", then there is no requirement for a licensed haulier.

Stakeholders:

Financial Implications:

Current cost estimates for the excavation and disposal project are:

- \$34,000 to manage the project, including analytical work and environmental site supervision.
- \$30,000 for excavation and haulage expenses.

There is inadequate funding within the current Planning and Regulatory Services budget to undertake the project. A budget reallocation to enable the project has been proposed in the Budget 'Carry Forward' report elsewhere in this business paper.

The reallocation involves:

- Transferring an unexpended amount of \$40,000 from the 2007/2008 budget ledger 11.3857.2934 (Project LEP) to 11.3422.2715 (Pesticide Pit Remediation).
- Transferring \$30,000 in the 2008/2009 budget from ledger 11.3857.2934 (Project LEP) to 11.3422.2715 (Pesticide Pit Remediation).

If approved, the budget reallocations will leave:

- \$46,660 in restricted funds for pesticide pit remediation.
- \$30,000 in 2008/09 budget for pesticide pit remediation.
- \$54,471 in restricted funds for the LEP.

Recommendations:

That Walgett Shire Council resolve to:

- 1. Proceed with a project to excavate the contaminated soil at the Walgett Aerodrome Pesticide Residue Pit and dispose of it at the Walgett Waste Depot, in accordance with the document titled "Final Report Remediation Action Plan Former Crop Dusting Washdown Area, Walgett Airport, NSW", dated 18 June 2008, as prepared for Walgett Shire Council by URS.
- 2. Note that the budget reallocation proposed for the pesticide pit remediation in the Funds Restriction Report elsewhere in this business paper will be used to fund the pesticide pit excavation and disposal project.

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ATTACHMENT A - URS response to query regarding 'licensed' hauliers

Hi Matthew, good to hear from you!

I have checked with the NSW DECC with regard the new guidelines, and it would appear that if the soil to be disposed of is classified as general waste (ie within the criteria in the guidelines) then no license is required. The following is an excerpt from the updated guidelines:

Classifying a waste using both the SCC test and TCLP

To establish the waste's classification using both SCC and TCLP, the SCC and TCLP test values for each chemical contaminant must be compared to the threshold values set in Table 2.

Classification SCC value TCLP value

General solid waste ≤ SCC1 ≤ TCLP1 Restricted solid waste ≤ SCC2 ≤ TCLP2 Hazardous waste > SCC2 > TCLP2

If any of the SCC or TCLP threshold values specified in Table 2 are exceeded for general solid waste, the waste must be classified as restricted solid waste. If any of the SCC or TCLP threshold values specified in Table 2 are exceeded for Restricted Solid Waste, the waste must be classified as Hazardous Waste. Detailed interpretative guidance regarding the use of both SCC and TCLP values to establish a waste's classification is provided in Table 3.

If the contaminated soil is classified as "restricted waste" or "hazardous waste", a waste transport license will be required. This can be found at:

Unless the waste is classified as dangerous goods, there are no requirements for 'licensed' hauliers.

The NSW RTA administers funding under the Regional Roads REPAIR Program. It has now advised Councils of the outcome of the 2008/2009 round of funding.

Walgett Shire has the following three funding proposals before the program:

- RR333 Reconstruct and seal 39.6km to 46.1km from Walgett
- RR457 Reconstruct and seal 14.5km to 21.0km from Queensland Border
- RR329 Reconstruct and seal 62.0km to 68.5km from Collarenebri

None of these projects scored high enough to be funded in this round of the program. Refer attached ranking of projects.

Financial Implications:

Council's 2008/2009 – 2012/2013 had allowed \$300,000 of revenue from the REPAIR program for the RR333 Reconstruction project in 2008/2009 out of a total budget for this project of \$1.3M. It is not possible at this stage to identify if there will be savings in other programs to replace this shortfall. Therefore the scope of this project requires review to keep within the available funding.

Recommendations:

1. That Council note that it has been unsuccessful in obtaining REPAIR Program funding in 2008/2009 and that subject to further advice the RR333 Walgett – Carinda Road Reconstruction and Sealing project will be reduced in scope to \$1M in 2008/2009.

Summary:

The purpose of this report is to recommend a variation to the 2008/2009 2012/2013 Management Plan to allow for allocation of sufficient funding for Walgett Landfill environmental license compliance.

The Walgett Town Landfill has been licensed under EPA conditions since 2006. The Walgett Landfill is located on a recognised flood plain, and as such must be licensed as a potential environmental hazard. Under the conditions of the license, Council is required to conduct specified water quality and leachate monitoring on a quarterly basis to monitor and minimise the environmental impact of landfill contaminants.

Discussion (including issues and background):

For the bulk of its operational history, Walgett Town Landfill has not required an Environmental Protection Agency License for its legal operation. The landfill is located on a recognised flood plain. As such, recent changes to the relevant legislation require that the landfill be licensed. The landfill license specifies the groundwater quality and leachate contaminant levels to be monitored and recorded for the life of the landfill (predicted to be a minimum of fifty years).

Groundwater and leachate contaminant testing must be conducted on a quarterly basis under controlled conditions to establish sufficient baseline data to enable informed management decisions and comply with EPA licensing requirements.

Council will be required under licensing conditions to allocate sufficient funding in subsequent annual budgets to cover the cost of the groundwater and leachate monitoring for the remaining life of the landfill.

Informal quotes sourced indicate that the cost of required testing can be expected to range between thirty and sixty thousand dollars per annum over an unspecified term of contract.

Council does not currently possess the equipment, expertise or manpower resource to conduct the testing within its own resources. Council will be required to contract the service externally in the short term.

The following savings are considered achievable in the current management plan for a twelve month period:

- Ledger No 21.0401.2601 Kerbside Domestic Waste Management Collections \$15,000.00 (excl GST)
- Ledger No 21.0401.3883 Community Domestic Waste Management Collections \$15,540.00 (excl GST)
- Total \$30,540.00 (excl GST)

A new finance ledger code will need to be created to account for ongoing expenditure.





Mungindi – Menindee Advisory Council President's Report – July 2008

Introduction

The extended drought, cap and other water reform issues have continued to dominate our thoughts and efforts during the past 12 months. This has been the case for the past 7 years.

The year has been one of mixed blessings, with extremely low flows in the first 6 months; good flows from December 07 – March 08, and then back to low flows March to now.

The lower part of the river received high and sustained flows through Dec 07 to March 08 as handy flows emanated from the Weir, Moonie, Namoi, Castlereagh, Macquarie, Bokhara, Bogan Culgoa and Warrego Rivers. These flows dramatically eased the pressure on town, stock and domestic water supplies and allowed irrigators to fill storages and grow crops.

The water supply into Menindee Lakes has been significantly boosted and the NSW government lifted the B & C class pumping embargo in January 2008.

The numbers below show much improved flows over the previous two years and the impact of the lower tributaries in 2007/08.

Outlook for 2007/08

The outlook for next water year is unclear but has been shaping up to be dry. After little rainfall in the catchment during autumn the river has fallen to dangerously low levels again. Mungindi has experienced no flow since early May the last month and all other gauges are close to cease-to-flow conditions.

Most irrigation storages on the river have water supply and farmer have been busy planting winter crops & planning for a summer crop. Approx 800 GL flowed into Menindee Lakes over summer, relieving the critical water supply problems. The Lakes currently hold 550,000Ml.

Cap Management

Since our March decision to legally challenge cap implementation, I have been providing info to Solicitors Jackson Smith. Solicitor Peter Jackson has been briefing two barristers. Preparations are underway to lodge a challenge in the courts. I will shortly issues invoices to each water user on a \$ per Meg basis to pay the expected courts costs.

As part of the cap management plan we were meant to have a completed set of trading rules in place for permanent and temporary trades plus access to concessional conversions. Obviously these rules

and other elements of the plan are not in place. These "breaches of agreement" have given our solicitors further issues to work with regarding the legality of the cap management plan.

We have recently received notification from Richard Wheatley and Dennis Milling that they have "reviewed the Barwon/Darling policy and trading rules etc and will soon be seeking to brief local water user representatives on the contents". Richard and Dennis have requested contact details for water user groups along the river so that briefings can be organised.

Water Sharing Plan for the Barwon-Darling

All other major rivers in NSW have a WSP which specifies the volumes of water that can be diverted for irrigation & includes licensing conditions and policy. We have been promised a WSP since the late 90's. The excuse has always been that cap had to be completed first.

When the current cap management plan was introduced, the Minister agreed that the BS WSP could roll together 4 elements and that no further restrictions would be placed on Barwon-Darling irrigators. These four element s would include:

- The cap management plan;
- The current EFRs;
- Provisions of the current North West Unregulated Flow Plan, and;
- Current licensing policy including the conditions of our current licences,

Given that we have suffered dramatic reductions in licensed AVL there should be no further adjustments to volume and access conditions. To do this would compromise the average extractions promised under cap and further erode the economic strength of local communities along the Barwon-Darling River system

After the Bourke meeting in March 2008 it is clear that there is no urgency and no resources to complete this work. The earliest we can expect any significant work on a WSP is 2010.

It is important that MMAC continues working as the main representative body of water users along the Barwon-Darling. We need to strengthen the Council with appropriate resources to tackle the immediate jobs that lie ahead.
